SHE WENT OUT TO TOLL WHILE HE LAY IN BED (Continued from page 1)

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—The champion lazy man who refused for years to get up in the morning to go to work came to light before Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May in Brooklyn when Mrs. Margaret Hannigan asked for annulment of her marriage to James Hannigan because he refused to work.

Mrs. Hannigan, a very pretty girl of twenty, put on the stand by Lawyer John S. Bennett, testified that when she married Hannigan he declared that she had a position and was making a good salary.

She Goes to Work

"The morning after we were married," she said, "he refused to get up and go to work. I thought it was strange. The next day he did the same thing, and so on for three weeks. Then I made inquiries and learned that he had deceived me. He had not had a job in years.

"I had to go to work myself. Then he sat around our house all day and smoked cigarettes. I pleaded with him to be a man and get something to do, like other young married men, but he would only shrug his shoulders and say what was the use.

"My mother and my brother then took him in hand, but he simply defied them in the same way that he had defied me. I stood this for a year, and then I left him. He is still out of work and is living with his mother."

Throws on Cold Water

Lawyer Bennett then explained to Justice May that the boy's mother had admitted to him that she had been unable to get him to do anything for a living.

"The mother told me," Bennett said, "that she had to pull the bed mattress from under him to get him out of bed every day. Sometimes even that did not have any effect, and then she had to resort to throwing cold water on him. She told me that he was the laziest boy she had ever seen."

Hannigan did not make any defense to his wife's suit, and allowed the case to go by default. Justice May granted the annulment.
