WOMEN PROMINENT IN TYPEWRITER ANNIVERSARY'S CELEBRATION, ILION, N. Y.

Addresses Give Emphasis to Invention's Part in Economic Progress of the Sex

The village of Ilion, Herkimer County, New York, lying in the famous Mohawk Valley, celebrated the 50th birthday of the invention and manufacture of the first practical typewriter machine, Sept. 12. All factories were closed and the people of the section entertained distinguished visitors in a program commemorating the day fifty years ago when the manufacture of the first practical typewriter began in the Remington gun works in this town. Emphasis was laid upon the part played by the machine in the economic emancipation of women. This was the feature of the afternoon's program, when the memorial to the inventor, Christopher Latham Sholes, was unveiled by two of his grandchildren, Christopher Latham Sholes IV and Miss Elizabeth Latham Sholes of Newark, N. J.

Mrs. Lena Lake Forrest of Detroit, Honorary President of the National Federation of Professional and Business Women's Clubs, and Mrs. Elizabeth Sears of New York, President of the New York League of Business and Professional Women, told of the typewriter's service to womankind.

Following the unveiling exercises, one hundred typewriter girls staged an attractive pageant and organizations from all parts of the Mohawk Valley joined in a procession. Fireworks and dances continued through the evening.

Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, and former Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, were the chief speakers on the morning program. They paid tribute to the service of the inventor and to the men who developed his machine.

Other speakers were Owen D. Young, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the General Electric Company, and Henry H. Benedict of New York, the sole survivor of the founders of the typewriter business.

Colonel John W. Vrooman, President of the Herkimer County Historical Society, under whose auspices the celebration was held, introduced

NEW CAVERNS FOUND IN OREGON CAVES

GRANTS PASS, Dec. 16.—The Caverns, booster organization of Josephine county, will undertake the exploration of the newly discovered caverns in the Oregon Caves. These caverns, which extend for an unknown distance into the mountain, were found on the last day the resort was open and the guides were taken out before the full extent of the find could be explored.

Rebels forces claim a victory near Acapulco, state of Guarrero, where federal forces are said to have been captured. They also claim that order prevails in all districts held by the revolutionists.

Loyal supporters of Obregon claim dissension has broken out among rebel leaders and that violence and anarchy are rife at rebel headquarters.

A battle is imminent near Apicacple, where Obregon reviewed his troops.

Tampico is quiet and General Calles said he is preparing to raise a loyal army to protect the oil fields. Part of the state of Morelos has gone over to the rebels.

General Francisco Mendoza, commander of the federals there, offering his service to Huerta, who accepted.

the report, "we are obtaining good co-operation. The chief of police of Portland is an efficient

and honest man, and the others officers there are doing everything possible to assist us in our work."

Governor Pierce, in commenting upon the report submitted by Mr. Cleaver, declared himself satisfied with the operations of the department, and had no criticism to make regarding the director.

It is likely that the next legis-

lature will be asked to place the maximum appropriation for the enforcement of the liquor and narcotic statutes at \$40,000 annually. Such an amount would make it possible for the department to cover the entire state.

Money to conduct the state prohibition department is taken from fines and seizures and is not derived from any tax imposed upon the property owners of the state.
