NOVEMBER PROHIBITION FINES TOTAL \$745

November fines in this county for violation of the prohibition law totalled \$745, according to the books of the county treasurer says the Mail Tribune. \$186.26 sent to the State Treasurer Hoff, as 25 per cent of the fines collected, has been returned under the provision of the state law that provides that when the fines remitted exceed a certain amount in any one year, all above that amount shall be returned to the county. As a result of this ruling fines collected this month for prohibition infractions will all be returned by the county. The law will become operative again January 1st.
