WILL AWARD HIGH SCHOOL JOURNALISTS

Newspaper Men, Authors, and Educators Are Judges.

CONTESTS ARE VARIED

Winners Will Be Announced At H. S. Press Assn. Convention January 11-12.

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 19.—A number of leading newspapermen, authors and educators are included among the number of judges who will determine the awards in the annual high school journalism efficiency contest conducted by the University of Oregon of journalism. Winners of the awards will be made known at the convention of the High School Students Body Officers at the university, January 11 and 12. The several contests and the judges who have agreed to serve follow:

1. For the best example of a reporter's work on a high school paper: Ben Hur Lampman, local staff, Portland Oregonian; Frank Jenkins, editor of the Eugene Register; George Turnbull, professor of journalism, University of Oregon.

2. For the best original editorial: N. J. Levinson, editorial writer, Portland Telegram; Geo. Putnam, publisher of the Salem Capital Journal; Colin V. Dymont, dean of the college of literature, science and the arts, University of Oregon.

3. For the best mechanical makeup of a newspaper: Elbert Bede, editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel; Paul R. Kelly, news editor of the Portland Oregonian; Robert C. Hall, professor of journalism, University of Oregon.

4. For the best record of service to a high school publication: Judge Jacob B. Kansler, Portland; W. A. Reid, secretary of the Corvallis chamber of commerce; Earl Kirkpatrick, dean of the University of Oregon.

5. For the best method of obtaining and handling advertising for a high school newspaper or magazine: Harry Marcus, advertising manager of the Oregon Journal, Portland; G. Lansing Hurd, manager of the Corvallis Gazette-Times; W. F. G. Thatcher, professor of advertising, University of Oregon.

6. For the most adequate production of a mimeographed newspaper: Floyd W. Esterfield, manager Springfield News; Grace Edgington, editor Old Oregon, University of Oregon; Mary E. Kent, university extension division.

7. For the best high school notes section in a Portland paper: Charles Fisher, editor Eugene Guard; Hal E. Hoos, managing editor Oregon City Enterprise; Eric W. Allen, dean of the university of journalism.

8. For the best high school notes section in a paper outside of Portland: I. D. Felsheim, editor of the Western World, Bandon; Arthur Rudd, editor of the University of Oregon Emerald; Alfred Powers, assistant director, University extension division.

9. For the best advertising and business management of a high school year book. Staff of the university of journalism.

10. For the best story in a high school magazine: Edison Marshall, Medford; Charles Alexander, Albany; Mable Holmes Parsons, Portland.

11. For the best high school magazine: Hugh Hume, editor of the Spectator; Prof. Victor L. O. Chittick, English department Reed College, Portland; John T. Hotchkiss, J. K. Gill Co., Portland; Ralph D. Casey, associate professor of journalism, university. High school editors and publishers are invited to send regularly copies of their newspapers, magazines, and annuals to the university school of journalism. No school may enter the competition for awards which has not forwarded publications to the university long enough in advance of the convention to enable the judges to have plenty of time for examination of the publication.

JEWELER CONFESSES TO SHOOTING BRADY

YREKA, Cal., Dec. 19.—Joseph Chenis, 33, widely-known Shastina jeweler and prominent in lodge circles yesterday confessed to Sheriff A. S. Calkins and District Attorney C. E. Johnson that he had shot and killed James Brady, pugilist of Omaha, Neb., whose mysterious death last week had been made center of a thorough investigation by Siskiyou officers. Chenis confessed he was returning to his store from the post office after dark and was accosted from the street by Brady, who asked for money. When he refused, Brady attempted to "strong arm" him. He drew his gun and struck Brady over the head. In the scuffle which ensued the gun discharged and Brady fell.

WOULD HIRE WARSHIPS TO DRY UP U. S.

Rented Navy Boats Best Way to Enforce Prohibition Says Syracuse Man

FINES PAY EXPENSE

Theory That "Dry" Law Was Put Over is Denounced as "Propaganda."

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Dec. 19.—Solution of the prohibition problem in the United States rests in the renting by the Internal Revenue Board of ships from the American Navy and their assignment to prohibition duty. So declares Dr. Charles Wesley Flint, chancellor of Syracuse University and one of the foremost educators in the United States. The Syracuse chancellor believes fines and confiscations by the naval fleet warring upon rum smugglers would pay a large part of the cost of enforcement. Referring to the changed attitude of Great Britain toward the proposal for a twelve-mile limit, Chancellor Flint said he was glad Great Britain had come to realize that the Union Jack was in a mighty small and questionable business when floating over a cargo of booze on the three-mile limit. Grills Propaganda "We must recognize the fact there is a desperate propaganda regarding prohibition and enforcement, for the purpose of bringing about its nullification by condoning or permitting lawlessness." "Many persons are victims of propaganda when they say prohibition was 'put over' on the American people. "For more than seventy-two years of definite agitation by temperance societies and other organizations the question was before the people.

"On no subject ever before the American people was there more discussion pro and con or more literature distributed. On no issue was more money spent by those interested on either side. It was discussed not only during election but for twelve months every year. "Ninety-five per cent of the area of the United States and 70 per cent of the population were under either local or State prohibition before the Eighteenth Amendment was passed. This should be proof the move was not a sudden one. Popular Move "Forty-six of the forty-eight states adopted the amendment, with 78.5 of the members of the assemblies voting for it, while 84.6 of the members of the senates voted for it. "Governor Smith and others have objected to one-half of one per cent as the point at which liquor would be decided to be intoxicating, yet that was used as the basis for defining intoxicating liquor long before the prohibition law was adopted. "We cannot approve the suggestions of the group now calling for a change in the law, for the reason this group wants intoxicating liquor of some kind. Any change would mean chaos in law enforcement. "We must get enforcement out of politics, whether city, state or national. While I am an admirer of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, I have felt it was unfortunate the enforcement of the law was given to his department."

SLIGHT HOPE HELD FOR RECOVERY OF WOMAN

ASTORIA, Dec. 19.—The attending physician stated that Mrs. George B. Demers, who was terribly burned with acid as the result of an automobile accident Saturday night, had some sleep last night and as a result her condition was improved today. He would, however, give out but little hope for her recovery. Mrs. Demers today told the physician that the car which she met just before the accident its lights as she did those of her car. The approaching machine however, hung to the middle of the pavement, and in trying to avoid a collision her auto was forced over the embankment.
