BANKERS HELP THE KIDS
 Northern Michigan Bankers are out to give the youngsters in their part of the country a lift on the road to better dairying. A group of bankers met with some of the agricultural men in their section and pledged their support in backing up calf club work.



Virginia, Minnesota, Bankers have faith in "kids." Meeting with a committee from the Virginia Chamber of Commerce they formulated plans for the establishment of Calf Clubs and "Pure Bred Bull Associations." Banks all over St. Louis county have pledged their support to this work.

An Arkansas bank loaned a youngster \$70 in 1920. The boy bought a purebred Poland China gilt from a breeder in a neighboring state. Being the first purebred gilt brought into the county for boys and girls club work, she has furnished more stock than any other sow in the section. With the start that the bank gave the youngster he has been able to refute the claim that hog raising in his county was not profitable, for at the present time he has more than \$1,000 to his credit as a result of the original bank loan and investment.
