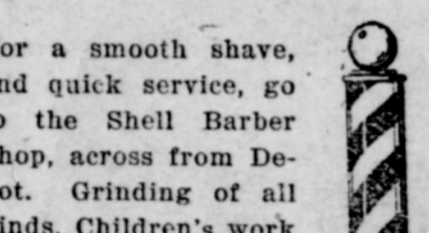

Health Hints

Edible leaves, in their fresh condition, contain large amounts of water. Hence, they should not be valued too highly per pound, as it is only the dry weight that counts as food. However, as leaves are not to be relied upon for the fuel supply of the diet, this watery condition or low calory rating does not count heavily against them.

The high value of leaves as food is attributed to the fact that they contain the active, growing cells of the plant. This same thing is true of buds and very tender shoots, or of seed-pods in the immature stage of development. Thus asparagus tips and string beans may, for practical purposes, be considered in the leafy vegetable group of foods. Some of these same attributes are found in the immature green corn or green pea.

There are a few foods classed as vegetables commercially which botanically rank as fruits, such as melons, tomatoes, cucumbers and the eggplant. Melons have no particular food value; they consist chiefly of sugar and water. The cucumber is about as devoid of food value as any substance eaten by man. The pulp of pumpkins and squashes ranks somewhat lower than the poorest root vegetables. The value of the pumpkin pie is in the milk and eggs.

The tomato, on the other hand, is a distinctive and valuable food, being rich in minerals and in organic acids. The vitamin contents of fruit has not been fully investigated, but we know that the juice of limes or oranges is a remedy for scurvy, and we may safely assume that fruits contain water-soluble vitamins. Fruits are probably deficient in the fat-soluble vitamin, which seems to be supplied in abundance from milk or egg fat, or from green vegetables.

No scientific consideration of the subject can fully portray the dietetic value of fruits. Fruits are the natural desert and should be used as such.

With the possible exception of dates, figs and raisins, fruits are not to be considered as suitable for forming any great bulk of the diet, or replacing other food groups. But these sweet fruits may be very profitably used in the place of artificial sugars, and also to cut down the quantity of cereal starch. Nuts should be used in the diet as a food, not as a relish; they should be a part of the meal and not taken in addition to the meal. Nut meats should be thoroughly masticated, as they are not digestible when swallowed in large particles.

What the World Is Doing

SUN'S RAYS MAKE ALARM CLOCK OF CANNON

Sunlight is called upon to inform the residents of a community in southern Europe when high noon has arrived, by setting off the charge in a cannon.

Fixed to the piece is a small lens that focuses the rays on the touchhole of the gun in such a way that they do not reach the powder until the sun's position is directly in line with a tiny opening. The supports of the "alarm" are arranged to adjust it to the light beams at the same time every day of the year. Often the device fails to work because of cloudy skies that prevent sufficient heat from reaching it to ignite the explosive. The hours are indicated on a clocklike dial.

Greyhound Is Speed Demon of Animal Kingdom

Through a series of recently completed tests, the speediest animals are reported to have been determined as follows: the greyhound, race horse, prong-horned antelope, hare, Texas jackrabbit, common fox, coyote, foxhound and gray wolf. The records were made by noting the number of bounds made by each animal in a given space of time, by means of a stop watch, and then measuring the length of the leap. The greyhound, it was ascertained, can travel a short distance at 25 miles an hour, about four miles an hour faster than the hare. None of those studied, however, can keep up their speed for any considerable distance, although the fox and wolf can beat either the greyhound or race horse in this respect.

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Auto Stored on Sliding Shelf to Save Space in Garage

Rolled from a driveway onto platforms that slide to their storage spaces on steel rails imbedded in the floor, automobiles can be parked in garages with great saving of room and little danger of damage from contact with posts, walls, or other cars, by the invention of a mid-westerner, engineer. The system, it is said, permits a third more machines to be accommodated than by other methods. Any

of the moving "shelves" can be pushed to the passageways for loading and returned to position in a few moments. Owing to the ease with which they can be moved, hand power alone is required. Attendants are also relieved of the trouble of manipulating cars to guide them into stalls of crowded garages.

A Novel Dairy Farm
