PROGRESS IS MADE ON REDWOOD HIGHWAY

Very encouraging progress is reported in the construction work being done on the Crescent City Grants Pass section of the Redwood highway. Sheriff Breen, who made a trip to Monumental Wednesday afternoon, states that a mile of fine road has been completed between the Elk Horn mines and Lawyer's Bar, in the vicinity of Patrick's creek. John Ross, with a crew of five has completed several temporary bridges near Monumental. He informed Sheriff Breen that he expected bids for permanent bridges will

be called for by the forestry department in the early spring—Del Norte Tripletate.

NEW BRIDGE WILL LINK MEXICO WITH GUATEMALA

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 27.—The Mexican Government announces that the Federal authorities of the Republic of Guatemala have agreed to the construction of a mammoth international bridge over the Sushiate River, the southern boundary of Mexico. The structure will be erected jointly by both Governments and will cost in the neighborhood of \$7,000,000. It will be built of reinforced concrete.

20 YEAR SENTENCE IS GIVEN GRUETZINGER

DUSSELDORF, Dec. 27.—Herr Gruetzinger, expelled president of the Rhine province, was sentenced to 20 years imprisonment by a French court martial. Gruetzinger was charged with resisting French and Belgian orders.
