FAKE REMEDIES
DEFEAT END OF
HEALTH SEEKER

Victims Often Flood System with Poisons in Attempt to Be Cured Quickly.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Americans have no occasion to laugh at the African Voodoo doctor or the Indian's Medicine Man.

"Every day, in every American city, men and women are using 'remedies' compared to which the concoctions of the tom-tom beaters are scientific," said Dr. S. R. Hubbard, director of New York City's Bureau of Public Health.

A year's laboratory study shows: "The American people want to take a short cut to health.

"They buy 'patent medicines.' I do not wish to give the impression that all such medicines are dangerous. Some are harmless; others contain properties of value. But every person using patent medicine is tinkering with the most valuable asset in the world—health."

SALEM BUILDING SHOWS

GOOD GAIN IN 1923

SALEM, Jan. 3.—More than \$1,250,000 was expended in Salem in the construction of new buildings and improvements during the year 1923, according to a report prepared here by Mark Poulson, city recorder. This is approximately \$200,000 more than was spent for new buildings and improvements in 1922. There were 402 structures erected in Salem in 1923 as against 328 during 1922.

During the last month in 1923 only \$57,225 was spent for new buildings, while during the month of December, 1923, there was expended a total of \$183,750.

4. Cancer sufferers are among the most pitiful victims of quack cures. One remedy found by Dr. Hubbard consisted of the ashes of snails and clam shells. Another was nothing but yellow clay.

5. Indigestion cures are, in the main, alcohol—a cheap grade of whiskey, more dangerous than the bootleg stuff. A clergyman friend of Dr. Hubbard refused to believe

6. The soothing syrups and teething cordials are in many cases "baby killers"—water, sweetened and flavored, containing an opiate. "Pay more money for good milk, and soothing syrup will not be necessary for the baby," Dr. Hubbard advises.

7. The electric-belt cure—a strip of iron and copper wrapped in red leather. Perspiration from the body causes a prickling sensation. The victim thinks it is magnetic force.

"There is no short cut to health," Dr. Hubbard declares. "The orthodox way to recovery may seem long, but it is better to improve an inch a day than mark time to the tune of false hopes."

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 3.—Recollections of strange hobo hieroglyphics cut in the posts that support the railroad water tower "back in Reno," Nevada, and severe pains resulting from a black bullet wound in a shattered limb to-day were the memories of Kansas City's 13-year-old "Oliver Twist" of the beginning and end of his initial adventure in banditry.

Jimmie Rhodes—small, blue-eyed and freckled—lay in his little white bed at the City Hospital and recounted details of his adventure "on the road." There was a break in his voice and he turned his head to wipe away a tear as he neared the dramatic climax rivaling incidents in the colorful life of "Oliver Twist"—for police had told him a boy capable of staging a robbery was old enough to take the consequences without demonstration.

But Jimmie, orphan for seven years, confided that he wasn't the hardened criminal he was painted by minions of the law.

MORE EARTHQUAKES

OCCUR ON ADRIATIC

ROME, Jan. 3.—Fresh earthquakes are reported along the Adriatic coast. Many persons are said to have been injured and extensive damage done. Since yesterday, when tremors commenced, fifteen shocks have been recorded.

FAMILY TRAGEDY LEADS

MAN TO KILL HIMSELF

SEATTLE, Jan. 3.—After grieving for a year over a family tragedy in which his wife, Maude, shot to death their 15-year-old daughter, Leita, then ended her own life, John Barwill, 40, killed himself. His throat was cut with a razor. The suicide occurred a week after Barwill's release from a sanatorium.

SEIZURE OF TOMKO IS

PROTESTED BY BRITAIN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Great Britain's formal protest against the seizure of the steamship Tomoko was laid before the State Department by Henry G. Chilton, British representative. The case presented in note is understood to offer the contention that the Tomoko was registered from Nassau, a British possession, and was owned by a Nova Scotia firm.

The vessel was recently seized by American authorities on suspicion that she was a whiskey smuggler. Seizure was made outside of the three mile limit, off the coast of New Jersey.
