is no longer the practice for him to deplore the worldliness of his congregation and shout hell-fire and damnation and predict a permanent bed of burning brimstone for those who do not come across liberally when the contribution box is passed around or consign to slow incineration those recalcitrant brothers and sisters who do not pray loud enough in open meeting.

He has a new method. First, he prepares for their hearing something worth while listening to, and then he calls in his advertising manager and gives to him an outline of what the forthcoming pulpit entertainment is to be.

The advertising manager hikes to the belfry and arranges a display advertisement for the newspapers, and in it he features the

salient allurements of the forthcoming sermon, never neglecting to extol the magnetic personality of the parson and the impress he has made upon men and women in all walks of life who have previously listened to his impassioned pleas for righteous living.

The advertisement finds its way to the newspapers where it enters into competition with the advertisements of other ambitious clergymen, and when Sunday dawns we discover that the churches are filled, some of them to overflowing.

"It is proper, necessary and thoroughly religious to advertise," declared Dr. Clinton Wunder, and he added that churches can "make religious advertising pay."

Dr. Wunder insists that the best

advertising is none too good for the service of the Lord. "The appeal must be to the emotions, to the minds and to the souls and then results are sure to follow, not only in converts, but in collections."

That churches should advertise regularly, boldly and consistently to an even greater degree in the future than in the past, was Dr. Wunder's conclusion, and the Conference of Unitarian Churches endorsed his views.

Newspapers throughout the country, without having given the matter unified thought, have been extremely generous in lending encouragement to church advertising and strangely the advertising of different denominations, appearing on the same page, causes not the slightest friction.—Ex.

What the World Is Doing

Nine-Story Building Moved by Twelve Horses

Weighing 11,000 tons, an apartment house, nine stories high, was recently moved by 12 horses. The building was



carried by a framework of girders that rested on rollers placed across iron beams, which formed a track. Six vertical winches, installed at a distance, were each turned by a pair of horses, and all worked together. The runway was built so level and the motion of the load so even, that no part of the walls was disturbed.

Trees Dyed Any Color With Chemicals That Cure Wood

Dyeing the trunk and branches of a living tree any desired color, and at the same time curing, the lumber, thus eliminating the necessity of seas, along when it is cut into boards, can be accomplished in two days with a process recently invented by two eastern chemists, they assert. The cost is less than one dollar a tree. Fluids pass through a rubber hose from a tank to holes that are bored in the trunk close to the ground. These colors are absorbed by the tallest tree, giving it the tint of the mixture.

Plymouth Rock Transported From Canada by Glacier

Examination of Plymouth Rock by a scientist recently has established the fact that it was carried from Canada perhaps 40,000 years ago by one of nature's freight cars, the huge glacier that at one time covered the northern part of the continent with ice. When this huge sheet began to melt and recede, tons of boulders and silt were deposited over New England. Among the huge stones was this historical rock which welcomed the Pilgrims.

An Amusing Trick

An amusing trick that can be performed with a mirror, two pieces of paper, and a pencil is shown in the illustration. One person is seated at a table and is instructed to draw the figure shown in the upper left-hand corner, first drawing the square and then the cross inside of the square. This must be done by looking in a mirror which is held vertically as shown, a piece of paper being used as a shield to prevent the victim from seeing the pencil movements directly.

It will be found rather easy to draw the square, but mysteriously difficult to draw the cross inside. In fact, many people find it absolutely impossible to make the pencil start diagonally in



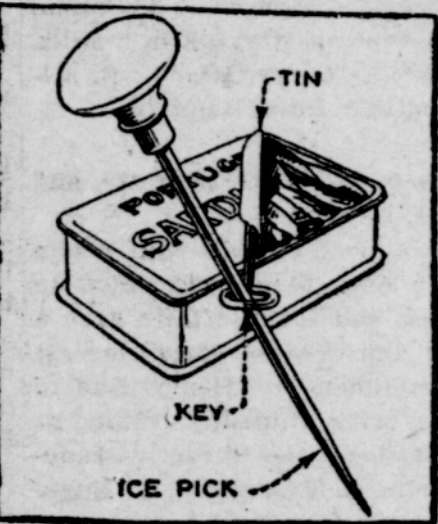
the proper direction, and very few can draw a straight line, even when they do make the pencil move in the right direction.

Opening Sardine Tins

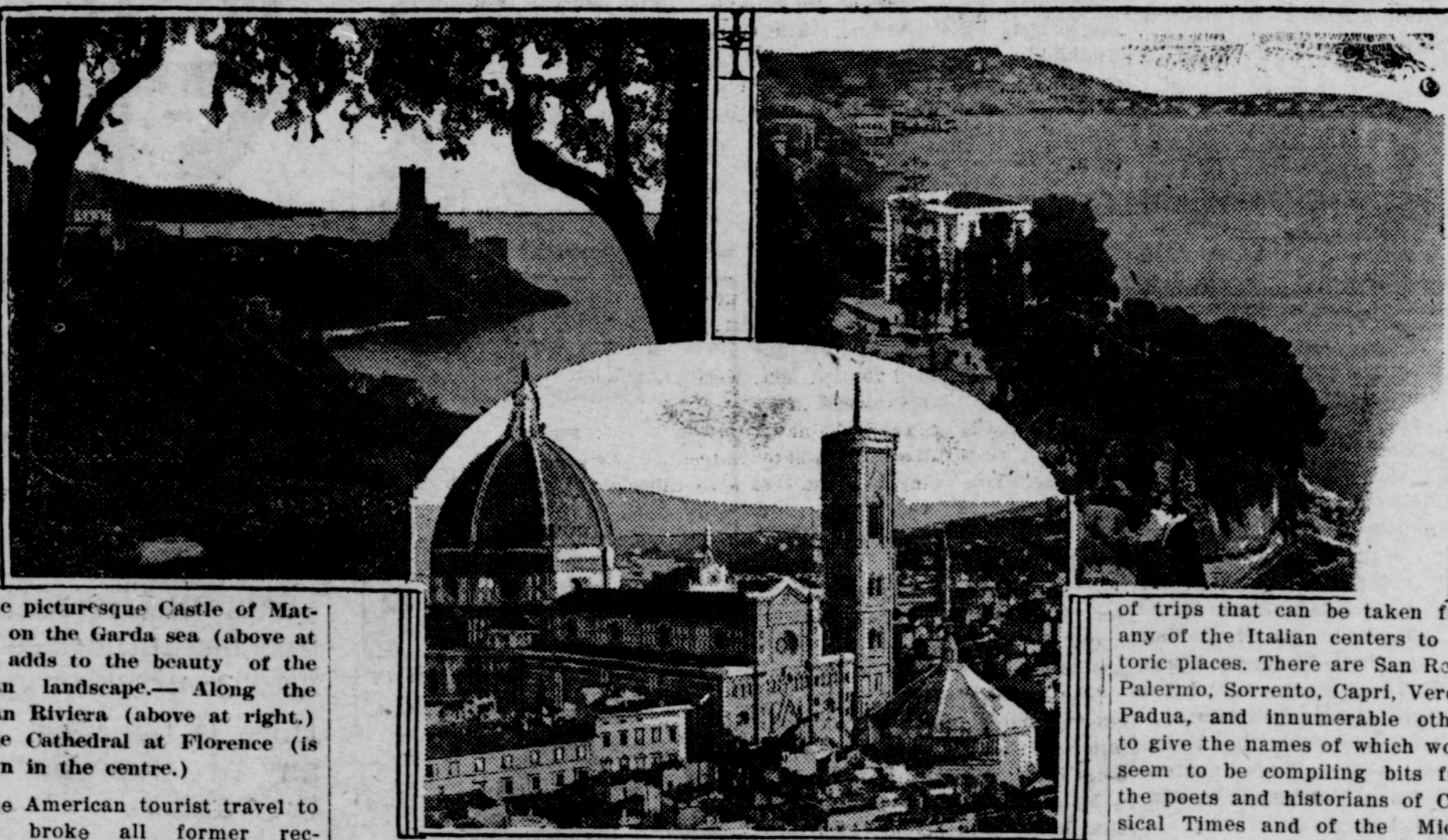
Anyone who has opened a sardine tin knows that while it is very easy



to roll back the cover by means of the key until it is in the position shown in the illustration, it requires a very powerful pressure on the key to force the rolled cover past the corner of the tin. If, however, when this point is reached, the point of an ice pick, or similar tool, is inserted through the handle of the key in the manner indicated, a leverage is provided that makes it very easy to strip off the remainder of the cover. This kink will be appreciated by the feminine members of the family, whose fingers are not strong enough to apply the necessary force to the key.

Tourist Travel to Italy Breaks All Records

The American tourist travel to Italy broke all former records last year is the statement of steamship officials, interested in Mediterranean passenger service, and the indications are that this increase in travel will continue throughout the winter and well into the spring and summer.

Italy, in the past few years, has taken on another and newer aspect for Americans. For centuries it has been recognized as the playground of Europe but in the past decade it has become the fashionable resting place for the whole world. While titles mean nothing to the world at large and to citizens of the United States in particular, they do mean something when they attract the most fashionable people of European countries to winter at the same resorts. Since American society has taken on a decidedly international cast it is the regular thing for the social leaders here to pass part of the winter in Italy.

The "Stop-over" Land

And another thing that makes Italy so popular at the present time is the fact that it has become the stopping-over land for those

who have planned sojourn in Egypt and the Holy Land. Even those whose business of social engagements call them to the European capitals like first to pay a visit to the famed places of the Rome world. These visits are made more pleasurable when tourists know a day's journey or less takes them to other capitals from Rome.

The very names of the different places easily accessible from that land of wonders—Italy—are enough to conjure up visions in the mind of the most practical. Monte Carlo, that common meeting ground of prince and pauper, where fortunes are won and lost by the turn of a card, has been the scene of hundreds of interesting romances. And Lake Como, the mirror of all the beauties of nature, has been the mecca of honeymooners from ancient times while Lake Maggiore, of which poets sing, has become something more than poetry to thousands of

Americans on the past score of years.

Distances, which mean little to Americans in the United States, mean still less to them in Italy. The trip from Chicago to New York, which takes twenty to twenty-eight hours, is a long one in comparison with those that can be taken from Genoa, Turin and Milan are each approximately three and a half hours' distance from Genoa; while Pisa is 4 hours and 20 minutes, and Florence 6 hours and 10 minutes.

Although "all roads lead to Rome" the time occupied in traveling from "the Eternal City" to other interesting cities of Italy is small. Consider these time distances from Rome, Naples, 4 hours 30 minutes; Florence, 5 hours 30 minutes; Venice, 12 hours; Milan, 13 hours; Genoa, 10 hours 15 minutes; Milan, 13 hours; Turin, 15 hours and 50 minutes.

And these famous names by no means exhaust the possibilities

of trips that can be taken from any of the Italian centers to historic places. There are San Rmo, Palermo, Sorrento, Capri, Verona, Padua, and innumerable others, to give the names of which would seem to be compiling bits from the poets and historians of Classical Times and of the Middle Ages.

Luxurious Steamships

In these days Italy itself is brought within luxurious traveling distances of America. The Nazagiazioni Generale Italiana, the oldest and largest Italian line, has placed at the service of tourists two steamships that outrival any boats on the North Atlantic route in fittings and service. They are the "dillio" and the "gullio Cesare," which are admitted to be the last word in steamship building for comfort, safety and luxury. That 70 per cent of the cabins aboard have private baths is evidence of their comfort. The "Dillio," which holds the world's record of 3 days and 16 hours for the run between Naples and New York, sailed from New York for Genoa for the first time November 20th and later scheduled to make two special winter cruises to the Mediterranean—the first leaving New York January 8th and the other February 16th, 1924. Both will be well patronized by those Americans who want to see the sunny skies of Italy at a time when their own land knows the icy grip of winter.
