PEACE PLAN VOTE
 BEGINS IN U. S. TODAY

"The Honorable Elihu Root, chairman of the Jury of Award, then prepared the following forward-looking statement indicating that the mutual counsel and cooperation among the nations provided in the selected plan may lead to the realization of another

and not the least important—of the dominant desires of the American public as expressed in the plans:

"It is the unanimous hope of the Jury that the first fruit of the mutual counsel and cooperation among the nations which will result from the adoption of the plan selected will be a general prohibition of the manufacture and sale of all materials of war."

"The purpose of the American Peace Award is thus fulfilled: To reflect in a practicable plan the dominating national sentiment as expressed by the large cross-section of the American public taking part in the Award.

"I therefore commend the winning plan as unanimously selected by the Jury of Award, and Mr. Root's statement of the first ob-

ject to be attained by the counsel and cooperation provided in the plan, to the interest and the widest possible vote of the American people.
