WILL HONOR CIRCUIT RIDERS OF NORTHWEST

R. A. Booth Will Give Prize of \$100,000 For Best Poem "The Circuit Rider"

There were no more self sacrificing nor earnest men than the Circuit Riders of the Pacific Northwest. These rustic pastors served a country that has become an empire, and laid the cultural foundations of three States, but it would seem that their very names have been buried with them. Oregon, Washington and Idaho were settled by sturdy, home loving people, not by adventurers or gold seekers. Such people founded homes for their families, lived righteously and called their minister to their aid.

In all this vast area towns were few and small and not every town had its church. The Circuit Rider would start from his home at stated times, and on horseback, by canoe or even on foot, make his roadless way to the settlements, landings, and scattered houses of the outposts of civilization. He carried primarily religion together with advice, admonition and often the law and physicians services.

Through the west forests of the Coast, to the arid plains of the East, these men were welcomed or dreaded as their hosts were just or unjust. Many a prominent man of to-day, owes his importance to the help of these pioneer clergymen.

The father of Mr. R. A. Booth of Salem, was a Circuit Rider. Mr. Booth has commissioned, A. Phinister Procter to make a bronze statue of an equestrian Circuit Rider, in memory of his parent and the other pioneer missionaries. The Governor has accepted the offer on the part of the State and assigned the statue a place in the Capitol grounds at Salem. The dedication date will be set soon.

Mr. Booth has offered a prize of One Hundred Dollars for the best poem on the subject of the Circuit Rider. The competition rules have been drawn and limit their contest to the residents of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The rules are as follows:

Rules Governing the Contest

This contest is instituted by Mr. R. A. Booth of Eugene, Oregon, in honor of those valiant Godfearing, self-sacrificing men, the Circuit Riders, who in Mr. Booth's own language "became the friends, counselors and evangelists of the pioneers on every American frontier and who so largely directed the thought of our citizenry and shaped the course of our civilization, and who in their last and possibly their best work, helped to determine the boundaries of the Oregon Country."

(1) The Contest shall be limited to contestants residing in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

(2) The poems submitted must be 32 lines or less. The prize winning poem is to be the property of Mr. Booth.

(3) Contestants may use any form of verse, (subject only to established criteria.)

(4) Manuscripts must be typewritten and signed by Nom de plume, and accompanied by sealed envelope bearing Nom de plume on outside, and enclosing real name and address of contestant. Manuscripts must be submitted in triplicate, one copy for each of the judges. As no poems will be returned, contestants should keep a copy for their own files.

(5) Contest closes on February 1st, 1924.

(6) Judges will be selected by the Presidents of University of Oregon, University of Washington, and the University of Idaho.

(7) Manuscripts must be sent in sealed and plainly marked envelope to the Circuit Rider Poetry Contest, care of The Poets' Corner, The J. K. Gill Company, Portland, Oregon.

INTERNAL REVENUE NEWS BULLETIN

Tips Given From The Office of The Collector of Internal Revenue.

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—Forms for filing individual, corporation, partnership, personal-service corporation, information fiduciary and other returns required by the federal income tax law are available at the office of Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, in the custom house, and the branch offices at Eugene and Pendleton. These returns must be prepared and filed in Collector Huntley's office not later than midnight, March 15.

Form 1040-A, heretofore used for filing returns of individual net income of \$5000 and less, from whatever source derived, has been revised and simplified in the interest of the largest class of taxpayers—salaried persons and wage earners. The new form will be used for reporting net income for the year 1923 of \$5000 and less, derived chiefly from salaries and wages. Reducing to a minimum the problem of making out an income tax return, Form 1040-A consists of a single sheet on which space is provided for answers to only three questions in relation to income—salaries, wages, commissions, etc.; interest on bank deposits, notes, mortgages, and corporation bonds; and "other income." On the reverse side are instructions. Formerly Form 1040-A has consisted of six pages, the questions pertaining not only to salaries and wages, but to income from business, professions, sale of real estate, and other sources.

Persons, any part of whose income for the year 1923 was derived from business or profession, farming, sale of property or rents, regardless of the amount, will be required to use the larger form, 1040. The use of this form will be required, also, in cases where the net income was in excess of \$5000, whether from salary, business, profession, or other taxable sources. Formerly Form 1040 was used only for reporting individual net income of more than \$5000.

Forms for filing return of income have been mailed to every individual who filed similar returns for the year 1923. It being impossible to determine this year the form desired by the taxpayer—whether he be a man whose income was derived chiefly from salary or wages or from business, profession, or other taxable sources—the taxpayer will receive both forms, and is advised to note carefully the instructions regarding their use.

Hints From a Housewife's Kitchen Diary



SOME TIMELY SUGGESTIONS FOR JANUARY

White Kitchens
White is everywhere a symbol of cleanliness. Of course, it is really no "cleaner" than any other color; a gray enameled ware pot, for instance, has all the advantages of cleanliness that a white one has, for all enameled ware is easy to keep clean and will not discolor. But the least speck of dirt shows on white, where it might remain unnoticed on some darker shade. For this reason the fashion of white in the kitchen, where cleanliness is of paramount importance, is growing all the time. The "white kitchen" has white enameled table, white chairs, white kitchen cabinet—even a white gas range—and, of course, it has white enameled ware utensils.

It is becoming increasingly popular, particularly among the younger housewives, to have a definite color scheme for the kitchen. Some prefer all white while others find that white blends very well with the gray, blue and other shades in which enameledware comes.

To Make the Youngsters Like Rice
Rice is so very nourishing and healthful that most mothers try to include a certain amount of it in the child's diet. But children don't always—perhaps it should be don't often—like rice. It is possible that the fact that they are told rice is good for them pre-

judices them against it; at any rate, as soon as they outgrow babyhood they seem to demand dishes with sharper, more pronounced taste.

For this reason thoughtful mothers seek to prepare the rice in new ways so as to make it more tempting for the little ones. A favorite method is to make it into a pudding that can be served as desert and that will satisfy the child's desire for something sweet and afford nourishment at the same time. Here is a new recipe for a rice pudding that will tempt the youngsters—and the oldsters as well.

Put three tablespoons of rice in a cup of scalded milk and cook in an enameled ware double boiler until tender. Then add on-fourth teaspoon of salt, one-half cup of sugar and a well beaten egg. Soak two tablespoons of gelatin in half a cup of cold water for five minutes and then stir this into the hot rice mixture. When this is almost cold put in a cup of crushed or grated pineapple and pour into a cold, wet mold. Chill, turn out and serve either plain or with milk or cream or a fruit sauce.

people, too, will like it, as it is a pleasing variation upon the ices to which they are accustomed.

Cook four cups of cranberries in an almost equal quantity of boiling water. This should be done in an enameled vessel, because its surface is not affected by acid. Put the cooked berries through a sieve and stir in two and a half cups of granulated sugar. Soak a heaping teaspoonful of gelatin in a cup of cold water for five minutes and, after the sugar has dissolved, add this gelatin and the juice of a lemon to the hot cranberry mixture. Cool and freeze—and you'll have a delicious dessert. This ice can also be used as a punch to serve with poultry—it would be a real addition to the Christmas dinner—or in the course immediately following.

"Standby" Cakes

For use with this and other desserts and to serve with tea at luncheon one may bake these attractive "standby" cakes instead of the usual cookies. These get their name because they are the housewife's "standby"—they can be kept on hand always and, instead of getting stale, they improve with age.
