PAVLOWA AS SEEN BY ONE OF HER AUDIENCE

Anna Pavlova, the incomparable and divine, has come and gone, but her spirit will linger forever in the minds and imaginations of those who were fortunate enough to see the world famous dancer and her corps of Russian ballet dancers.

From the first notes of the heavenly strains of Pavlova's symphony orchestra to a glimpse of the oriental stage setting, art in its most elaborate technique was revealed.

Opening with a blast of gusto and weird Egyptian ballet en masse, the wonderful Pavlova and her partner slipped to the stage as easily as the smoke wreaths and coils to the heavens in azure atmosphere. Thence the artists danced and billowed to the rhythm of perfectly toned orchestration.

The audience was caught and carried to the etherial midsts and held by the dancers as they gamboled regardless of surroundings and the people who were watching with strained eyes and rusty forgetfulness.

It is hard for the amateur audience to appreciate the powerfulness of the art that is represented by the dancers, who have created their niche with years of constant and aored hard work and practice.

All costumes in separate acts were identical, save for harmonious color schemes impressed with powerful spot lights and softly modulated, yet gorgeous, background. Every detail, every figure, every movement was made with one accord and the ever engrossing sweep of temperament was divine.

Pavlova was always dashing, always spirited and seething with grace and agility that always marked her entrance. Her place was paramount and with her audience, she grasped and heaved their headlong to regions where harmony, melody, color and vivaciousness were grand in their greatness.

She was essentially a part of the last few measures that invariably marked the close and pause of a final act.

"The Swan", by Pavlova was perhaps her biggest and most gorgeous number. Swishing swerving, gently carressing and swooping, gliding and frolics with gracefulness as the bird she characterized, she danced before the bluish-green atmosphere in her snow-white folds of feathers and loveliness. Her appeasible personality was catching. So much was it in contrast with the last number of the program in which she appeared.

Dashing and vivid, garbed as a gypsy with riots of color always in evidence and dancing and frolics with lightning speed, ending in a staccato and as free with liberal bows as the audience demanded more, Pavlova will live long in the minds of those who saw her and were left spellbound and mistified with the rapidness of her movements.

REMARKABLY SMART TAILORED MODES

The indispensable tailored suit is indispensable because it can always find a new and interesting way of expressing its type.
