ASHLAND OF THE FUTURE

Man is not endowed with the powers of peering far into the future. Only supernatural power can do that, but it requires no great prophet or seer to visualize Ashland of the future if yesterday's meeting of the Chamber of Commerce is to be used as a criterion.

The feeling pervading the meeting yesterday was such that there can be no mistake as to the attitude of at least seventy of the leading men and women of Ashland relative to the future program for the city park and auto camp.

The results of that splendid meeting mean much to the future of Ashland. It means that the town will continue its present enviable reputation among tourists and visitors who will come to the Pacific Coast in increasing numbers.

The spirit and unanimity of purpose displayed yesterday will carry many other present and future projects to a successful culmination.

NO QUARANTINE HERE

There are times in the history of nearly all growing communities when psychological conditions are such that people take a new lease on business and commercial life and really sense the opportunities of the future.

Recent developments show unmistakable evidence of a new spirit prevailing here. There has been an awakening to the possibilities of the future, not only, but to responsibility for the future.

"MORE REGULATION" NOT THE ANSWER

The enormous death toll, and the greater accident list which mars the path of the progress of the automobile is giving city fathers and county police authorities a great deal of concern.

But in many cases it is found that all such additional "safeguards" do not accomplish the result; carelessness wrecks a car just as much when regulated by the police as when no police are about, and lack of skill causes as many accidents when licensed as when outlawed.

Authorities are beginning to believe that as far as the crowded streets of the cities are concerned, two drastic steps must be taken; the flow of traffic must be controlled either by a very elaborate system of one-way streets, distance control (as on Fifth Avenue, New York), or a boulevard system which eliminates the deadly crossing; the other step, a real examination and a real standard of proficiency to which a driver must attain before being permitted to drive.

The "driver's examination," in the few places where it exists, is well known to be more or less of a joke. A mere ability to get through a half mile of city traffic without a crash will give, in many places, any child of sixteen a motor driver's license.

THE NEW IMMIGRATION PLAN

Views on immigration range all the way from those who would admit everybody to those who would admit nobody, writes Congressman Albert Johnson, Chairman of the Committee on Immigration and Naturalization, in "The Nation's Business."

The new immigration bill introduced in the present Congress provides that all socially inadequate aliens shall be weeded out at the source, and that the burden of proof as to inadequacy shall be placed on the alien rather than on the United States.

For the purpose of selection, all newcomers to the United States are divided into three general classes, "non quota," "quota," and "quota relatives." The first includes husbands, wives, fathers, mothers or unmarried minor children of American citizens, students, clergymen, and some others.

A "quota relative" immigrant is the husband, wife or unmarried minor child of an alien who has been legally admitted to the United States, lived here two years and taken out first papers.

The third class includes all others, that is, the rank and file of those coming to make a new home here.

MANY PREDATORY ARE KILLED IN OREGON

PORTLAND, Jan. 16.—More than 4000 predatory animals were killed in Oregon during 1923, of which the United States biological survey has definite record, according to a report made yesterday by Stanley G. Jewett, predatory animal inspector.

Of these, 3498 were coyotes, 330 bobcats, three cougars and three timber wolves, the skins of which were sent to the Portland office. In addition to those checked by the inspector 1068 porcupines and 464 badgers were killed.

This number is larger than for any previous year, according to Mr. Jewett, but is lower than the actual number on account of the wide use of poison.

THE PLAN IN BRIEF Proposes 1. That the United States shall immediately enter the Permanent Court of International Justice, under the conditions stated by Secretary Hughes and President Harding in February, 1923. 2. That without becoming a member of the League of Nations as at present constituted, the United States shall offer to extend its present cooperation with the League and participate in the work of the League as a body of mutual counsel under conditions which 1. Substitute moral force and public opinion for the military and economic force originally implied in Articles X and XVII. 2. Safeguard the Monroe Doctrine. 3. Accept the fact that the United States will assume no obligations under the Treaty of Versailles except by Act of Congress. 4. Propose that membership in the League should be opened to all nations. 5. Provide for the continuing development of international law.
