WHY BANKS?

LESSON III

Banks are defined as "institutions chartered to receive deposits and make loans." What is a bank deposit? What is a bank loan?

BANK DEPOSIT = money or checks left with a bank to be kept safe from thieves, fire or other loss; to earn interest, if in a savings account; to be convenient for the future use of the depositor; to be loaned out to earn the expenses of the bank's services, and interest for the depositor when in an interest bearing account.

BANK LOAN = advance of money to help business enterprise so that business may again help the earner and saver by giving employment.

In the Middle Ages safes were very few. Goldsmiths kept their jewelry in strong boxes, and also accepted for safekeeping, for a fee, money packed and marked with the owner's name. In those days money saved lay idle; today it is put to work by banks for the benefit of the depositor and the community.

GRACEFUL FROCKS OF GEORGETTE

Chinese yellow crepe Georgette serves a most delightful purpose in the development of the first dress pictured above. The oval neck is slashed at the right side, and the edge finished in picot effect with yellow silk. The edges of the gathered panels are treated in the same way, and this simple decoration adds to the distinguished simplicity of the model. Medium size requires 6 yards 36-inch Georgette.

Simplicity is the emphasized theme of the next model also. It is carried out in rose-color Georgette. It is of the straightline slip-over type, the fullness at the waist being held in with a belt of self-material. Draped over the belt are long sash-ends, forming a single loop at the top, but falling below the hem of the skirt to give the uneven effect at the lower edge. The sleeves may be worn long or short. NEWS LETTER

CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—A remarkable record was made by the Federal Courts of Chicago in disposition of cases and in administration of justice during 1923, according to a report prepared by Edwin A. Olson, United States District Attorney, and forwarded to Attorney-General Daugherty.

Credit for the accomplishments is given the two new Federal judges, James H. Wilkerson and Adam C. Cliffe, whose efforts, together with the perseverance of District Attorney Olson and the latter's organization, had much to do with clearing the congested dockets.

All previous records of Federal prosecutions here were shattered, and this judiciary body's achievements are made more noteworthy by reason that it was the first year of Olson's term and the first full year on the bench of either of the judges.

The dockets were in a chaotic condition and were considered hopeless when Judges Wilkerson and Cliffe began to wield their judicial sabres and Olson took up his prosecution engines. At that time local officials and those at Washington predicted that it would take 15 judges three years to relieve the dockets. The new judges and the prosecuting forces cleared up the situation in approximately 12 months.

The report further disclosed the following:

Fines and penalties assessed and exacted, \$616,494; cash collected, \$681,886; cases disposed of, 3,401.

Of the cases adjusted, 2,655 were criminal cases, and of these 647 were liquor injunction suits. The remainder were civil cases. This is 100 more cases than were disposed of in the preceding five years here.

The amount of fines and cash collected was greater, it was said, than the combined collections during the previous 15 years.

Sentences imposed aggregated more than 324 years.

The value of property closed by prohibition injunctions totaled in the neighborhood of \$20,000,000.

Other achievements of this trio during 1923, which already have occasioned much favorable comment among their legal contemporaries are the disposition of more than 1,500 prohibition cases. Of this number only 15 acquittals were forthcoming.

Five hundred and seventy-five permanent liquor injunctions were issued against the same number of illicit booze establishments; the issuance of temporary injunctions against 363 other places; permanent "padlock" proceedings in each of the latter cases are pending.

Permanent injunctions also were issued against 11 breweries. The wheels of justice will be functioning in such good order by early Spring that it will be possible to try offenders within two or three days after indictment. District Attorney Olson said.

WARNING PAMPHLET WORTH READING

New York Chamber Commerce Issues Warning For Protection of Investors.

To help everyone to avoid being duped by promoters and salesmen of worthless securities and by other swindlers, the local Chamber will have sent to those who make application a thirty-eight page pamphlet which reveals the methods of swindlers.

The pamphlet was prepared by the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York. It tells what investors should do to protect themselves against stock and bond frauds, and gives material upon many kinds of frauds. It has interesting comments upon moving picture frauds, frauds upon inventors and patentees, "buy-back" frauds, song writing swindles, frauds on authors and swindling operations of publishing concerns, real estate frauds, merchandise swindles, and bucket shops in stocks and cotton.

The title page reads "A Warning to Investigate Before you Invest in Securities or Buy Merchandise From Unknown Concerns or Engage in Business Transactions With Strangers With Comments Upon Fraudulent Methods, Sources of Information and the Work of Chambers of Commerce." Copies can be secured without charge by addressing the Chamber of Commerce of this city.

Don't Be Afraid of the Water

THE big bugaboo that the prospective swimmer must overcome is—fear of the water. This accomplished, the rest is purely a matter of mastering certain mechanical motions," says Mr. Harry Izardson, Swimming Coach, Athletic Club Association, Chicago.

Confidence is 75 per cent of the art of swimming. Relaxation and proper breathing must be learned before taking a stroke. Breathing while swimming is the opposite of breathing while walking or running. A swimmer always breathes through the mouth, and exhales through the nose or nose, whichever is easier. Every school should give a swimming breathing exercise in its classes. Gulp the air in rapidly through the mouth, exhale it gently through nose and mouth at the rate of about ten to twelve times per minute. The next step would be to take the same exercise exhaling in

a tub of water until there is no danger of strangling by getting water into the sensitive nose and windpipe.

"Your first swimming lesson, therefore, should be to stand in the water up to your armpits, take

a big breath through the mouth, squat down, head under water, breathe out gradually through mouth and nose open your eyes and watch the bubbles. Do this slowly at first and increase until you can breathe ten or twelve times per minute, and when you have learned this you will lose all fear of the water.

"I have written a pamphlet on swimming, which I will send to anyone who asks for it. It is illustrated with the various dives and how to learn the various strokes. If you will agree to give these to your classes I will obtain them for you in any reasonable quantity."

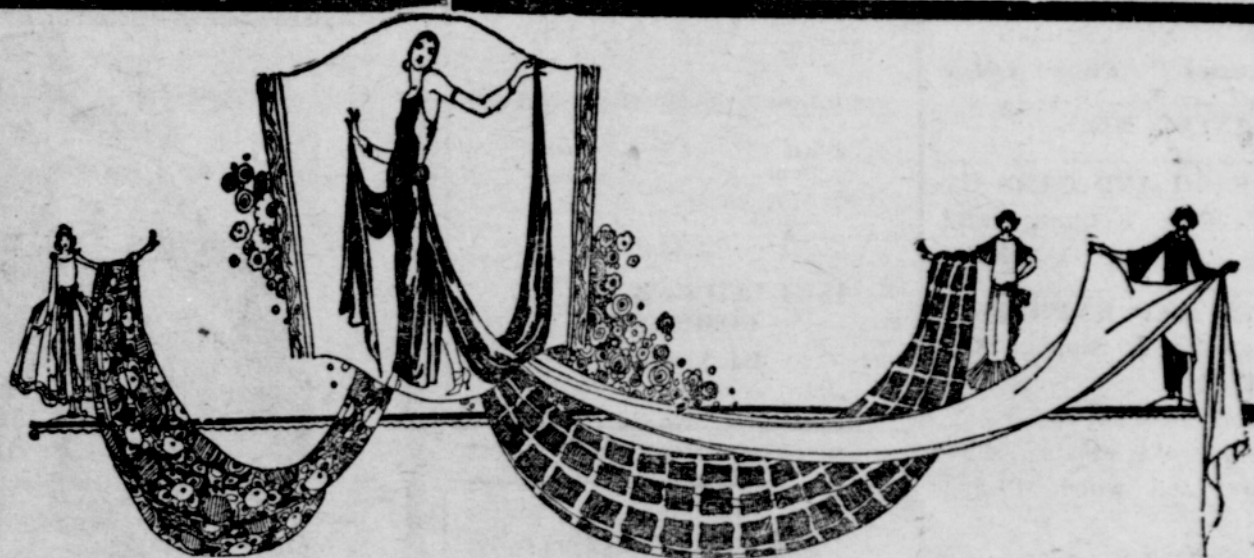
