Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

The simplest and plainest of foods taken in small quantities is the correct remedy for a weakened digestion. Many of the so-called aids to digestion do not aid but injure the digestive powers. Appetizers in the form of highly seasoned foods must also be classed as injurious "digestive aids". There is no real appetizer except physical activity and general good health.

As the body's need for food decreases there is a corresponding decrease in the secretion of gastric juice. This fact leads to weakened digestion in the stomach, and an attempt to counteract this has been often made by the use of pepsin. The use of such an aid may temporarily increase digestive powers, but just as surely as it does there will result further decrease in the natural secretion. Such an effort is very like an effort to increase muscular power by riding instead of walking, the surest way to destroy what power remains.

Predigested foods are a double delusion. In the first place, little actual predigestion is possible by artificial means. In the next, predigested foods, in so far as they live up to their claims, must be classed as digestive crutches and defeat the end sought, because they weaken the natural digestive powers. There are, however, a few good wholesome and easily digested foods that are sometimes called predigested. Chief of these are malted products, such as malted milks, which should not, because of the similarity of names, be confused with alcoholic drinks made from malt.

Except in abnormal cases due to accidents or acute illness, the body rarely needs nourishment that cannot be supplied by its own digestive powers, and where these are weakened the remedy is to be found in the actual adjustment of the diet to the actual needs of the body and the careful selection of foods that are naturally easy of digestion. All artificial aids to digestion should be carefully avoided by those who would reach a ripe normal old age. The greatest natural aid to digestion is physical action. This not only helps to create a healthy appetite by increasing the demand for food, but it facilitates the process of digestion which is partly muscular and partly chemical.

CALIFORNIA ASSURES ROAD COMPLETION

(Continued from Page 1)

miles will be widened and straightened and new surfacing applied.

Road Being Widened

"From Halfway Creek to Bayha, Shasta County, ten and one-half miles. A contract was awarded to the Nevada Construction Company of Fallon, on January 10th for widening, straightening, and resurfacing this unit with gravel. The work will be underway in the near future. The allotment for this contract is \$492,000. "From Bayha to Redding, ten miles. A contract for widening, straightening and paving this unit was awarded the Kaiser Paving Company of Oakland on December 17th. Preliminary work already

is underway. The allotment for this work is \$438,000.

\$100,000 For Surfacing

"Five rock chushers have been installed north of Redding to supply rock surfacing for the roadway until paving can be completed. The preliminary allotment for this work is \$100,000, which amount has been appropriated from motor vehicle funds.

"It is the plan of the California commission and its engineers to have the entire highway from the Oregon line to Redding, 113 miles outside of municipalities now unpaved, widened to give a clear roadway, inside of ditches for drainage of twenty-four to thirty feet; in fact, the greater portion will be widened to thirty feet as nothing less will adequately care for the growing traffic.

To Eliminate Sharp Curves

"The road also will be straightened to provide a minimum radius on curves of not less than 300 feet.

"It will take somewhere in the neighborhood of \$5,000,000 to complete the job, but when the real facts of the situation become known the entire state will be demanding that California make good promises to her northern neighbors."

EARLY SETTLER OF SHASTA DIES AT 95 CASTELLA, Cal., Jan. 18.—News has just been received here of the death in San Francisco of Washington Bailey, one of the very earliest settlers in the Sacramento Canyon, at the age of 95 years. Bailey settled in the canyon in 1859. He first bought Lower Springs, a place that was named Castle Crags when the Southern Pacific Company bought him out. Bailey went to Slason, where he built a hotel, but he finally came back to Castle Rock and bought the place of John A. Hibbs. During the old stage coach days, Bailey's place was a favorite stopping place.
