MEXICAN TROOPS TO PASS THROUGH TEXAS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Mexican federal troops will be permitted to pass through Texas at El Paso, it is announced by the State Department, following receipt of Acting Governor Davidson's decision to acquiesce to the request of President Obregon for permission for 2000 Mexican soldiers to cross into Mexico at El Paso.

DAIRY BUSINESS GROWS IN CLATSOP COUNTY

ASTORIA, Jan. 19.—The stockholders of the Lower Columbia Co-operative Dairy association at the annual meeting today re-elected its board of directors and voted to increase the capital stock of the association from \$35,000 to \$75,000 in order to expand its rapidly increasing business. The officers' reports showed they manufactured 1,222,247 pounds of butter during 1923, compared with 119,303 pounds during 1922.

Gross sales grew from \$288,577.04 in 1922 to \$500,060.21 in 1923.

DAMAGES AWARDED IN ALIENATION SUIT

PENDLETON, Jan. 19.—A judgment for damages of \$6000 recently awarded Florence LeRoy against Mary Harmon in superior court at Walla Walla was concurred in by a jury that heard a record of the case here yesterday. The judgment was given when Mrs. LeRoy sued for the alleged alienation of the affections of her husband.

The plaintiff is said to have sought to apply the judgment as a lien on land held by the defendant in Umatilla county, and a judgment in an Oregon court was necessary, according to court attaches.

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—A two days sale of Idaho wolf clip of the 1923 clip was held at Portland's Municipal Terminal No. 4 this week, approximately one million pounds were sold at this sale, some of it being held over from last spring's clip. An average price of 42 cents was obtained. This is one of the many sales held here, as Portland is the second primary wool market in the United States.
