NEWS LETTER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20—If you would ask around Washington what is the most valuable political asset Calvin Coolidge possesses you'd probably get a bushel of answers.

Some would promptly say William M. Butler, his campaign manager; others would allow it is Henry Ford's endorsement; still others the Mellon tax program. And not a few would reply that it is a trim white boat named the Mayflower, which swings idly at a dock in the Washington Navy Yard six and one-half days out of every seven.

It is the half-day that the Mayflower does not swing idly in her berth, but toots her way out into the channel of the placid Potomac, that she becomes a political asset of Calvin Coolidge.

No President has ever used the Mayflower in exactly the same way that Coolidge does.

Week after week, on Saturday afternoons, whether the weather be good, bad or indifferent, the Mayflower may be seen picking her way gingerly down the Potomac. Aboard her are the President's friends—and what is far more important—his political enemies! Mr. Coolidge does not subscribe to the belief that a President should be entirely surrounded by his friends. He believes that sometimes it is more profitable and one can learn more by having around those who are opposed to him.

The parties that the Coolidges make up for the regular weekly jaunt down the river usually include twenty guests. The President has no particular cronies, save perhaps Frank W. Stearns, a Boston merchant. Consequently he invites whomever he pleases. One member of the Cabinet circle usually is included, several Senators, several members of the House, with their wives, and not infrequently some "captain" of finance or industry, or big figure in the business world.

The capital was shocked, stunned and incredulous when on one of the early Mayflower parties

Senator William E. Borah, of Idaho has long been regarded as a lonely and lofty mountain by Washington hostesses. He refuses to go to receptions, his name seldom appears in those "conferring with the President," and he has yet to hear the delivery of a Presidential message to Congress. In short, he doesn't like society and stays out of it. As for Presidential messages and speeches, he always contends he can get more out of them by reading them in print than he can from listening to them.

Since Borah has been a Mayflower guest, however, there has been a steady stream of people generally considered "agin the Administration" on the weekly cruises—Senator Frazier, the Non Partisan League leader in North Dakota; his colleague, Senator Howell, of Nebraska, a Progressive, who does likewise; and there have been any number of Democratic Senators and members of the House.

The use of the Mayflower for these social-political talks has many advantages. For one thing, there are no batteries of reporters standing around on the decks of the yacht, as there are around the Executive offices of the White House and the galleries of Congress.

The cruises of the Mayflower go virtually unnoticed except for a paragraph in the society columns. But if President Coolidge and Senator Borah have an hour's talk at the White House it is good for a column in the newspapers and no end of speculation.

It may be coincidence, of course but it was only a matter of two weeks after Senator Ladd had had the benefit of an hour's talk with President Coolidge aboard the Mayflower on Saturday afternoon until he publicly expressed the opinion that the President would be nominated and elected. He further said that North Dakota, home of the Non-Partisan League and the depressed wheat grower, would be for Coolidge.

Butler, national campaign manager for the President.
