427 ACCIDENTS AMONG INDUSTRIAL WORKERS

SALEM, Jan. 21.—A total of 427 accidents in Oregon industries were reported to the state industrial commission during the week ending January 17. This was set out in a report prepared by the accident commission today.

Of the total accidents reported 325 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act, 88 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the law, and four were from public utility corporations not entitled to state protection.

DEFECTIVE WALK IS SOURCE OF ACTION

ST. HELENS, Or., Jan. 21.—Through her attorney, Glen R. Metsker, Mrs. Hattie Large has filed a \$10,000 damage claim against the city of St. Helens. The complaint alleges that on April 12, 1923, she sustained injuries when she fell on a sidewalk on Hemlock street and that the fall was occasioned by a rotten and decayed plank in the sidewalk.

SEARCH FOR STUDENT IN BAY DISTRICT

DIXON, Calif., Jan. 19.—The search of Tilford Dozier, son of Dr. Earnest Dozier of Redding, assemblyman of Shasta County, is now being directed in the bay region following a report that the youth was seen here several days ago. Dr. Dozier came here Wednesday and with Town Marshal H. C. Grove went as far as Benicia in an effort to trace the missing youth's movements.

TUBERCULAR PATIENTS ARE ROUTED BY FIRE

DENVER, Jan. 19.—A spectacular fire forced 40 tubercular patients to flee for their lives at a fire in their night clothes when the ex-soldiers' tubercular home was practically destroyed by fire last night. Owing to zero weather, many suffered from exposure. The damage is estimated at \$13,000.

LOVE NEGRO BANDIT MAKES GOOD HAUL

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 19.—A lone negro bandit held up E. N. Daniels, cashier of the Irving Pitt Manufacturing company and obtained \$13,500 in cash. The robbery occurred at the entrance of the company's plant. The money was to have been used in paying off the 450 employees.

KLAMATH LIQUOR IS LOSING KICK

KLAMATH FALLS, Jan. 19.—Moonshine liquor claimed no victims in Klamath County during 1923, as compared to one death from alcoholic poisoning the previous year. This was disclosed by the county coroner's records. Murders were two in 1923 and four in 1922. Deaths from industrial accidents, however, increased from two in 1922 to ten in 1923.

Ample Revenue Provided The maintenance cost of the state highway system for the year 1923 was \$1,046,253.03, leaving \$4,337,070.36, which figure may safely be taken as an average and provides ample revenue for interest payments and the redemption of bonds and leaves some surplus for new construction.

000 world war veterans' state aid bonds were authorized for the purpose of paying a bonus and providing loans on real property to veterans of the world war. Of this amount, \$20,000,000 has been sold, and as the time has expired to file further applications, no more bonds will be sold. These bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent and are 5 to 30-year serials.

Of the proceeds of these bonds \$4,651,776.97 has been paid in cash bonuses and \$12,385,800 has been lent to veterans on the security of a first mortgage on real property at 4 per cent interest, the payments of 6 per cent annually on principal and interest to amortize the loan in 28 years. The balance of the fund, \$3,073,464.70, is cash in the treasury to

provide future loans, which must be obtained in the next two years. Sinking Fund Provided A sinking fund to retire these bonds is provided, which consists of all repayments of principal and interest on loans and a one mill tax levy. This tax yields about \$1,000,000 a year. Under a constitutional amendment passed in 1919, bonds to the amount of \$1,401,580 have been issued to pay interest on bonds of various irrigation districts, the interest on whose bonds the state has guaranteed. This amendment provides that the state irrigation and drainage securities commission may, after an investigation, enter into an agreement to pay the interest on the bonds of the district for a period not to exceed five years.

THE PLAN IN BRIEF

Proposes

1. That the United States shall immediately enter the Permanent Court of International Justice, under the conditions stated by Secretary Hughes and President Harding in February, 1923.

II. That without becoming a member of the League of Nations as at present constituted, the United States shall extend its present cooperation offer to the League as a body of mutual counsel under conditions which

- 1. Substitute moral force and public opinion for the military and economic force originally implied in Articles X and XVI.
2. Safeguard the Monroe Doctrine.
3. Accept the fact that the United States will assume no obligations under the Treat of Versailles except by Act of Congress.
4. Propose that membership in the League should be opened to all nations.
5. Provide for the continuing development of international law.
