Where the strength is limited, massage will enable one to get much of the same benefit that is acquired in ordinary muscular effort. Therefore, a little massage on going to bed, on arising, or at any time that one may feel like it, will be beneficial. One may use cocoa butter, or olive oil, in connection with it, but this is chiefly for its effect upon the skin itself, if it is dry. One really does not need anything but the bare hands.

If one can enjoy the services of a professional masseur, that will simplify matters. Sometimes another member of the family, who is "handy" in such things, may be available. If no such assistance is to be had, it is still possible for one to administer self-massage. You need not be an expert in order to get results, although it is always best to understand the fundamental principles. For instance, to improve the circulation it is desirable that the blood in the veins should be helped on its way to the heart. For this reason, where the limbs are concerned, it is advisable always to make all massage movements upward toward the heart.

Where the legs are concerned, it is well that they should be elevated while the subject lies on his back, for this position will naturally help the drainage of the blood in the veins, through the force of gravity. This in itself, is restful.

The chief types of massage movements consist of stroking, kneading, circular movements, tapping, or percussion and vibration. The technical names for these general types of massage are Effleurage, including the stroking movements; Petrissage, including the kneading movements; Friction, as the circular movements are called; Tapotement, applied to the tapping or percussion movements; and Vibration, which is self-explanatory. Vibration is largely applied by mechanical devices that impart a shaking or vibratory impulse, but it may be applied by the hands.

Effleurage, or stroking is applied chiefly to the surface tissues, though a certain quality of kneading may be imparted to it by the application of sufficient pressure. The stroking movements are very nerve soothing.

Petrissage is more effective for the deeper tissues.

BALDWIN'S REGIME IS NEARING AN END

LONDON, Jan. 21.—When the House of Commons convened it was universally conceded that the Tory government of Premier Stanley Baldwin would be voted out of office before the session adjourned. The premier himself is reconciled to defeat. This is a red letter day for the labor party as it is confidently expected Baldwin will resign tomorrow and Ramsey MacDonald, laborite leader, be called to form a new cabinet, giving England the first labor government in her history.

TO PROHIBIT ALIENS FISHING ON COLUMBIA

ASTORIA, Jan. 21.—As the result of the recent agitation in which the American Legion played a prominent part and the fact that a similar law became effective in the state of Washington on the first of this month, a determined effort is to be made to enforce the Oregon statute which forbids aliens to fish for salmon in the Columbia river. THE PLAN IN BRIEF

Proposes

1. That the United States shall immediately enter the Permanent Court of International Justice, under the conditions stated by Secretary Hughes and President Harding in February, 1923.
2. That without becoming a member of the League of Nations as at present constituted, the United States shall offer to extend its present cooperation with the League and participate in the work of the League as a body of mutual counsel under conditions which
3. Substitute moral force and public opinion for the military and economic force originally implied in Articles X and XVI.
4. Safeguard the Monroe Doctrine.
5. Accept the fact that the United States will assume no obligations under the Treaty of Versailles except by Act of Congress.
6. Propose that membership in the League should be opened to all nations.
7. Provide for the continuing development of international law.
