IS HERO OF FIRE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 23.—Awakening to find the house on fire, and his mother dying from a bullet wound in her head, 10 year old Billy Haines, of San Fernando, rescued one of his little brothers from death in the fire, and was nearly overcome while attempting the rescue of another brother and a sister. He finally called neighbors who rescued the

other two children and extinguished the blaze. An inquest is to be held to determine whether the mother's death was from suicide or murder.

ON BOK PEACE AWARD

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The Bok peace award was managed by an organization almost unanimously in favor of the League of Nations, Miss Eleanor Lape, executive chairman, admitted in testifying before the senate committee investigating the alleged propaganda. Eight of the twelve members of the policy committee, which was a majority of the jury awarding the \$100,000 prize is favorable to the league, but she denied again and again that the league attitude of the members had anything to do with the selection.

IN FIT OF ANGER

MOTHER ENDS LIFE

FALLON, Nev., Jan. 23.—Said by her husband to have become furiously angry because she was having trouble in making a baby's garment, Mrs. E. E. Rider committed suicide with strychnine on the Fowler ranch yesterday. Rider told the jury he found his wife lying on the bed after she had taken the fatal dose and died before he could secure medical assistance.

Rider stated that his wife became furiously angry while making the infant's garment, and tearing it up threw it into the fire. While he went out for some coal Mrs. Rider swallowed the poison. The tragedy occurred on the ranch where Mrs. C. G. Fowler was burned to death December 7th.

PORTLAND, Jan. 23.—Interest in Oregon has been quickened throughout the country by the extensive advertising of the northern, or H.M. transcontinental railways, together with the insertion of similar advertisements by the Chamber of Commerce. According to the report, postal authorities are in possession of a letter alleged to have been written by one of the brothers to the mother of a girl friend in Roseburg. The letter was written to the mother and then turned over to the girl. The letter was addressed from an unnamed town in Oklahoma.

FATHER LEAVES BABY

AFTER HIS WIFE DIES

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 23.—Charged with abandonment of his 3-months old daughter within a few hours of the death of his wife in an Oakland hospital, James Forhan of Oakland was placed under arrest on a northbound train here at an early hour today by Corporal L. E. Warren and Patrolman E. B. Harris. Forhan's arrest was made at the request of the Oakland police authorities, who are expected to send an officer to Sacramento today to secure custody of the prisoner.

"I was crazy with grief," he said. "My wife's death made me lose my head; I didn't know what I was doing."

ECONOMIC CONFERENCE

OPENS TODAY

by the fact that in 1909 Oregon imported 4 million pounds of butter fat, and 10 years later ship-

ped out 2 1-4 million pounds. Whether more creameries, cheese factories and condenseries should be established is one form in which the question is to be presented. Other factors bearing on efficiency of products—number of cows in the average herd, average production, most economical feed will be discussed.

Special sections will be organized for apples and pears, for prunes, nuts, small fruits, loganberries, vegetables, horticultural products, and fruit for fresh shipment. The growers will seek to determine whether fruit conditions in the United States and abroad justify further plantings in the northwest. They will seek to show whether poor exporting conditions, high freight rates, lack of proper advertising, and lack of market facilities are responsible for low prices, or whether the point of saturation in consumption has been reached, with some fruits.

The problem of market surplus wheat will be considered in the light of the McNary-Haugen bill and other measures advocated by farming interests. Speeding land reclamation, and settlement, handling range and livestock, increase in poultry industry, the present trend in berrying and methods of handling the small fruits and other specialty crops will receive the attention of the growers and specialists.

This wide scope of subjects and committee workers indicate the general interests of the conference which is in no sense a farmers week session. Only such consideration will be given the technical phases of growing farm produce and protecting it from insects and diseases as are incidental subjects of a balanced program for production and marketing farm produce.

THE PLAN IN BRIEF

Proposes

1. That the United States shall immediately enter the Permanent Court of International Justice, under the conditions stated by Secretary Hughes and President Harding in February, 1923.

2. That without becoming a member of the League of Nations as at present constituted, the United States shall offer to extend its present cooperation with the League and participate in the work of the League as a body of mutual counsel under conditions which

1. Substitute moral force and public opinion for the military and economic force originally implied in Articles X and XVI.

2. Safeguard the Monroe Doctrine.

3. Accept the fact that the United States will assume no obligations under the Treaty of Versailles except by Act of Congress.

4. Propose that membership in the League should be opened to all nations.

5. Provide for the continuing development of international law.
