40,460 CARS VISIT STATE IN 7 MONTHS

Complete Registration Announced by Koser, Secretary of State.

INCREASE PREDICTED

California, Washington and Idaho Tourists Predominate; Stations at Various Points.

PORTLAND, Jan. 23.—Between May 24 and December 31, 1923, 40,460 cars from other states were registered under the law providing for the issuing of visitors' permits, as shown by the compilation of these registrations just made by Secretary of State Koser. The Oregon law did not go into effect until May 24, 1923, which accounts for no registrations prior to that date.

Most of the visitors to Oregon were from the neighboring states of California, Washington and Idaho, but there were many visitors from the other states of the union. The largest number of registrations was made at the station located at Medford; the Portland station was second and the Ashland station third in the total number of registrations made.

Stations at Various Points
Stations are established at various points throughout the state for the convenience of motorists from other states, some on the more remote highways where travel is not so heavy. The following statement shows the number of cars from other states and countries registered in Oregon since May 24, 1923:

Number Declared Greater

In view of the fact that the total number of visitors' permits issued does not nearly represent the total number of cars from other states visiting Oregon during the year 1923, it is reasonably safe to assume that fully double this number of cars entered the state and that each car carried an average of three passengers, which would make a visitors' list of approximately 240,000 persons by motor car alone. Adding to this number those who came to the state by rail and water or other means of transportation, it is reasonable to assume that there were in the neighborhood of 500,000 visitors during the year 1923.

With improved highways and the advertising which those who have so far visited the state have given and will give to the excellent highways and the beauties and wonders of nature which may be found within Oregon's borders, as well as the abundant resources, and coupled with it the advertising which the transportation lines are now giving to Oregon, we may expect to have from 750,000 to 1,000,000 visitors in Oregon during the year 1924. The fact that many cars of other states take out Oregon licenses shortly after entering the state is evidence that many motorists are coming here to take up their residence. The fees received for Oregon licenses for cars previously registered under the laws of other states amounted during the year 1923 to \$3667. All persons when coming into Oregon and taking up residence therein are required to take out Oregon licenses.
