\$1,219,353 IS GIVEN BY METHODIST CHURCH

Amount Given to General Benevolence During Past Few Years.

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—Members of the Methodist Episcopal church residing in the Portland area, comprising Washington and western Oregon with a slice of western Montana, gave more than \$1,219,353 to the general benevolences of the church in the last four years of the five year centenary expansion period, according to the Methodist year book, just out. The Puget Sound conference, embracing western Washington, gave \$503,431 to May 31. The Oregon conference, embracing western Oregon, was next with \$348,080 and the Columbia river conference, embracing Eastern Washington and western Montana, gave \$281,373.

This money given by the \$9,467 members in the area presided over by Bishop William O. Shephard, is separate from the expenses of the churches involved and is for the general benevolent enterprise. Thirty six per cent of foreign missions, an equal portion for home missions, 11 per cent for education and the remainder for 17 other benevolent agencies.

In the foreign mission field the results made possible by the centenary fund added 125,000 members, 632 new missionaries, 6500 new native workers, \$10,000,000 to the valuation of mission property, \$2,000,000 to the giving of converts abroad for support of their own churches. The home mission program included 2749 new churches or parsonages in this country and extensive promotion and broadening of christian service in thousands of communities.

American Food Package Gives Kin of Sufferers in Germany Opportunity To End Distress

TO many of those persons of German extraction who now make their homes in America, Germany is still visualized as a land of plenty, with bountiful food supplies and healthy inhabitants. They are unable to convince themselves of the changes wrought by years of stress. Germany has undergone a metamorphosis terrible to contemplate. Undernourished men and women totter to their daily toil—when there is work to be had—and the children are as those of another and less sturdy race. Bloom has gone from young cheeks and the rolicking laughter of childhood has given away to piteous appeals for food.

America has interested herself in the suffering population of Germany. A committee headed by Major General Henry T. Allen is co-operating with the American Friends Service Committee (Quakers) to see that the mouths of Germany's children receive nourishment. And now, the urge of humanity has moved the American people to take further steps to alleviate her distress. General Allen's committee has provided an agency whereby any resident of America may send food to distressed relatives or friends in Germany. It is a food package department. This bureau, upon receipt of \$10, will send to an individual in Germany a package consisting of 119 pounds of nourishing food—more than could be purchased for an equal sum in Germany and some of it unobtainable at any price over there.

This package consists of 49 pounds of flour, 25 pounds of rice, 10 pounds of sugar, eight pounds of cooking fats, three pounds of cocoa and 24 tins of evaporated milk.

Imagine what it will mean to a starving person in Germany to receive this assistance!

The packages will be sent upon application, in person or by mail, to the American Committee for Relief of German Children, Room 338, 42 Broadway, New York City.

This is an opportunity not only for Americans of German extraction to succor distress but for everyone to respond to a plea to alleviate a stricken people.

Industrial Art Medal Goes To Silk Leader

The medal, which was designed by Robert Altken, N. A., well known sculptor, is a gold medallion. The front shows Art nascent from Industry; and the back, Industry learning from Art. It was offered by Mr. Friedsam to further encourage the trend of American industry towards art and its appreciation. It will be presented each year.

Mr. Creange is an American of French origin, whose influence in the silk industry has been felt by the entire United States and whose work at the Silk Show brought him into particular prominence. He has brought appreciation to the American public of the art development in silk and has by his work brought the silk industry to the highest point of French technique particularly in tinsel brocades, in color harmonies, in group exhibitions.

It seems that the couple for months past have not got on very agreeably, and the young wife testified that some time ago he told her that he did not want her around any more. He said she did not take good care of the camp. She then went to live with her parents and has been with them since some time in October and he has been living with his parents.

In all this time both admit that Court had given her only \$10 for her support. She consulted Gus Newbury as her attorney about this time, and he and T. W. Miles, who is Court's attorney in the matter, got together with the dissatisfied couple, as a result of which Court promised to pay her \$25 a month out of his \$157 monthly received from the government pension and insurance, beginning with next February. The young wife, however insisted that she should have at least \$35 a month to get along with, but finally agreed to take the lesser sum.

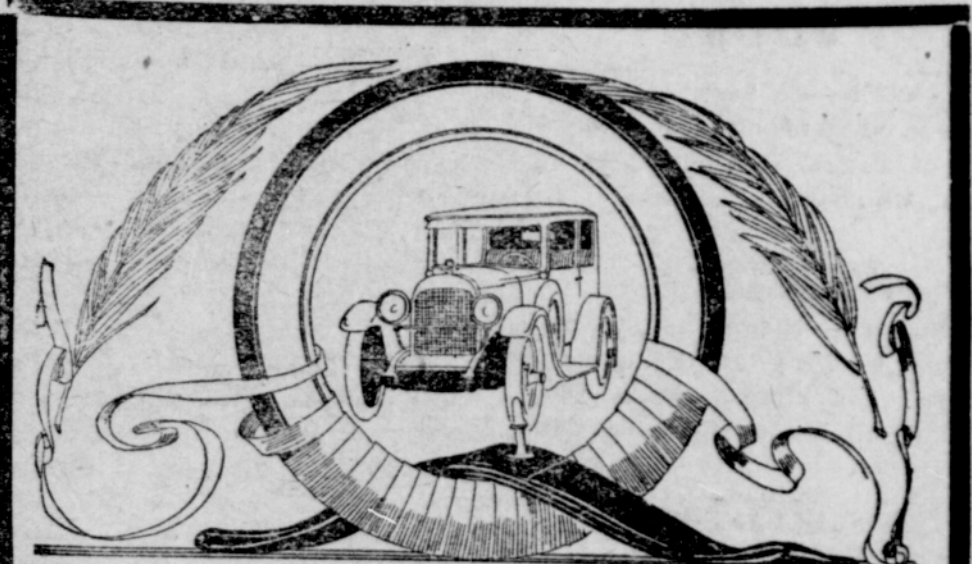
Then recently, hearing that

Court was making arrangements to at once enter a government hospital in California for treatment, she brought the non-support proceedings. Sheriff Terrill went out to Sams Valley the other day and served the warrant on him but did not bring him back as prisoner, as Court promised to deliver himself in court.

Snowfall of Today as Heavy as in Grandpa's Time

Official records, according to the weather bureau, will not support the assertions that "we don't have such heavy snowfalls now as we did when I was a child." According to the figures, the winters now are just as severe as they were in the days of our grandparents. It is a fact, say the experts, that the deep snow remembered by the man who was a boy in the 70's or '80's, which reached his shoulders, would be less than knee deep compared with his present stature. For example, the statistics show that in New York City and Albany, N. Y., the heaviest snowfalls occurred more than 30 years ago, but there have been few winters with more snow than fell at those places in the season of 1915-16. Records at Springfield, Ill., dating since 1884, indicate that the greatest fall, 43 inches, was in 1913-14. In New Haven, Conn., the heaviest occurred in 1915-16, although there seems to be a gradual lessening of the total each season. Boston's best figure,

664 inches, was in 1873-74, but two years later there was only 53 inches, while Portland, Me., experienced 125.5 inches in 1896-97; last winter's total was only 1 1/2 inch less.

Nebraska Once Home of Apes Unearthed Tooth Shows

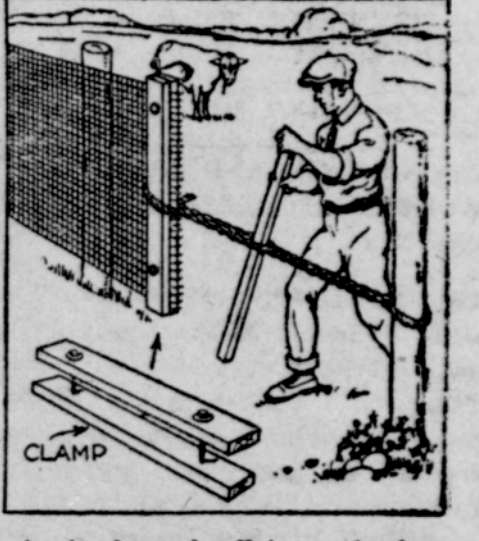
Scientists unearthing fossils in Nebraska have found a tooth, which they say belongs to a prehistoric ape and shows that such an animal once lived in that region. The skull of a giant camel was also dug up, together with bones of piglike beasts as large as a rhinoceros. Remains of a three-toed horse are among the collection, which, according to the discoverers, proves that this animal roamed America more than 2,000,000 years ago.

Gas Mask and Rubber Gloves to Protect Painters

To safeguard painters against lead poisoning, frequently contracted while working with materials containing that mineral, a respirator and rubber gloves have been devised. Without discomfort or inconvenience when worn, these articles prevent the workmen from getting the liquid on their hands, which may result in irritating



Stretching Wire Fencing



A simple and efficient wire-fence stretcher is shown in the drawing. It consists of two lengths of 2 by 6-in. wood with two or three bolts passing through them so that they can be securely clamped to the end of the fencing as shown. A heavy rope is passed around both pieces, around a fence post, and tied. A stout stick is used to twist the rope, thus pulling the fence as tight as desired. The device can be made in a short time from material that can be found on every farm.

Draft Shield for Carburetor

On many automobiles the carburetor is situated rather low on the side of the motor, right in the path of the air draft, which, during cold weather, cools the carburetor and prevents it from working properly. This trouble can be eliminated by providing a sheet-metal shield, large enough to close the space between the engine and the hood, and extending at least to the top of the motor. It is fastened under a manifold clamp, and its edges are rolled or bent over to prevent cutting the bands. Galvanized iron or brass is the best material to use for the shield.
