### PRISON IMPROVES UNDER DALRYMPLE

Trusty System Is Not Abolished, but Privileges Are Extended Only to Those Worthy.

SALEM, Jan. 28.—Despite the many handicaps under which he assumed control of the Oregon state penitentiary three months ago, A. M. Dalrymple, present warden, has succeeded in eliminating practically all the criticism leveled at the institution under the previous administration, and has placed the prison on a basis of efficiency.

In bringing about the marked improvement of the institution, Warden Dalrymple has adopted three general principles. These include strict discipline among the prisoners, employment of physically and mentally qualified guards and attendants, and constant personal supervision over all departments of the institution.

By following these principles, Warden Dalrymple has eliminated escapes, which were numerous under the previous administration, has established harmony among the guards and attendants, and has succeeded in building up a detachment of guards and attendants who have no personal institution in the Pacific northwest.

During the nine months that Johnson Smith had control of the prison more than two score convicts made their escape. Several of these convicts escaped while under the observation of armed guards, while others departed while enjoying unusual privileges extended to them by the penitentiary management. During the time that Warden Dalrymple has been in charge of the prison only two convicts have escaped. Both of these men are now behind the bars, and have paid for their infractions of prison discipline.

**We are all Funki-Dori When the Goose Hangs High**

(National Crop Improvement Service.)

EXPERIENCED geese raisers realize from \$2 to \$7 per year from each breeding goose, which is generally more profitable than an equal number of sheep.

Geese intended for fattening should be confined on dry soil and they should be held in wire netting built strong enough to keep out dogs and other animals; although if the gander is kept with the geese he will defend his own castle and woe to the dog who tackles him.

Geese make rapid gains when fed on a fattening ration. Where available space for free pasturage is not sufficient the birds must be fed on cut green vegetable foods.

But while many farmers may not be attracted to the "green goose" market, there should be a flock of as many geese as the range will permit on every farm. They thrive on green vegetation and water even without the addition of other food. Young goslings require succulent food such as clover, roots, cabbage, etc., and while it is profitable to feed them they will generally forage for themselves.

As a rule a gander mates only with two or three geese, so the size of the flock depends upon the peaceable disposition of the ganders. Geese frequently live to fifty and seventy-five years of age, and may be kept for breeding purposes until twenty-five years old, but the gander must be changed every seven or eight years.

There is a large market for feathers. Geese should never be plucked during the summer as it interferes with their growth. About one pound of feathers may be obtained from a goose in one year. They should never be plucked at a time when blood flows from the end of the quill.

**PROSECUTORS DEFY POWER OF GOVERNOR**

At this session yesterday afternoon they adopted a resolution which invited honest investigation and criticism of the methods of prosecution pursued in the respective counties of violation of the prohibition amendment, but at the same time this resolution urged that an immediate test case of the constitutionality of the measure passed by the last legislature authorizing special prosecutors to act at the instigation of the governor be inaugurated with the first act of this nature which the governor attempted.

**Test Case Wanted**

The resolution follows: "Inasmuch as it has been suggested that those provisions of the law are unconstitutional which attempt to supplant constitutional officers or interfere with them in the performance of their constitutional duties, we resolve that these provisions of this law be tested by this association as to their constitutionality at the first opportunity presented," read this

resolution, in part, and it continued further:

"We resolve, that we are anxious and willing to co-operate with all law-enforcement agencies at all times and render them the best service possible. We invite honest investigation and criticism and desire that the public and the citizens at large give us their confidence, to the end that we may better serve the people whom we represent."

**Judge Defends Home Sanctity**

The resolution followed an address by John S. McCourt, justice of the supreme court, in which he severely criticized the attitude of the chief executive or any public official who declared that the inherent law that "a man's home is his castle could be relaxed by any law, statute, ordinance or practice."

"No newly-appointed officers or newly-elected statute can render this inviolable constitutional right to suit themselves," said Judge McCourt. "Undoubtedly the governor and others who have advanced such a theory do so in good faith, they are surely attempting to enforce the law and not to break it, but in time they will see this as the district attorneys and lawyers do, as a matter to be seen and interpreted entirely from the law books."
