DISTRICT HAS RIGHT TO SELL WATER TO CITY

Officials of the Talent Irrigation District also welcome the decision of the supreme court, for if the city enters into contract to purchase 600 acre feet it will insure sufficient acreage to develop the Emmigrant project at an early date.

The sale of \$180,000 of bonds has been advertised by the district, which together with an issue previously voted, will finance the project. The route to be followed by the canal was surveyed some months ago and engineers are now making permanent location.

Some Oppose Action

There are a number in Ashland who are opposed to the city entering into contract with the Talent Irrigation District for the purchase of 600 acre feet of water per year, and instead favor the construction of a dam up Ashland creek and augmenting the present city water supply from that.

This argument is met by members of the city administration and others by the contention that the natural growth of the city will later require the development of the Ashland creek supply to a maximum and that if contract is not made with the Talent Irrigation district for the proposed 600 acre feet that the time will come when it will be impossible to secure water from that source and that the maximum supply of Ashland creek will not meet the demands.

digest of its particular commodity as it is affected the state not only, but throughout the nation. As an example he cited the fact that apple growers were given the information that there is a commercial apple tree for every resident of the United States.

Representatives of other lines, who went into the conference feeling that conditions were against them, came out encouraged, having gained the knowledge that their industry was in much better condition as a whole than they had anticipated.

Mr. McCoy said the conference was not only the first of its kind ever held in the nation, but he characterized it as beneficial and constructive to an extreme degree. Of all the reports and actions he disagreed with only one, that of subsidizing wheat growing, giving good reasons therefor. He characterized Oregon Agricultural College as the greatest institution of its kind in the world, and said Oregon was getting more per dollar out of that college than the people of any other district through any like institution in the nation. The work is going on, he said, and will be carried into every county and district in the state, with excellent results. He closed by urging the chamber to stand back of the program and aid in carrying it thru to a successful conclusion.

Joy Urges Cooperation.

A. C. Joy, president of the Jackson County Farm Bureau, was the last speaker to report, and said that he was assigned to cover so many departments that he had difficulty in following the extensive and constructive proceedings of the conference, but that he absorbed much valuable information and carried all of his home was indicated by the force-

ful and interesting report. He said that the conference was composed of from two-thirds to three-fourths farmers and that each attended with the firm determination of accomplishing something. He characterized them as a class of men who did not indulge in walling over their present condition, and said that the sentiment presented that if given cooperation by business interests that they would work out their difficulties to the benefit of all. He urged close co-operation between farmers and business men, and gave it as his opinion that business interests are growing more and more into the belief that agriculture demands their interest and assistance. He complimented the business men and farmers of southern Oregon, particularly Jackson county, for the splendid feeling that exists between them.

Mr. Joy also urged the necessity of co-operation and the importance of that to agricultural interests. As an illustration of that which it is possible to accomplish he referred to the Ashland Fruit & Produce association and of the volume of eggs handled during the past year, citing the fact that the volume of eggs handled amounted to more than \$30,000, or a third of the total volume of produce handled by the association.
