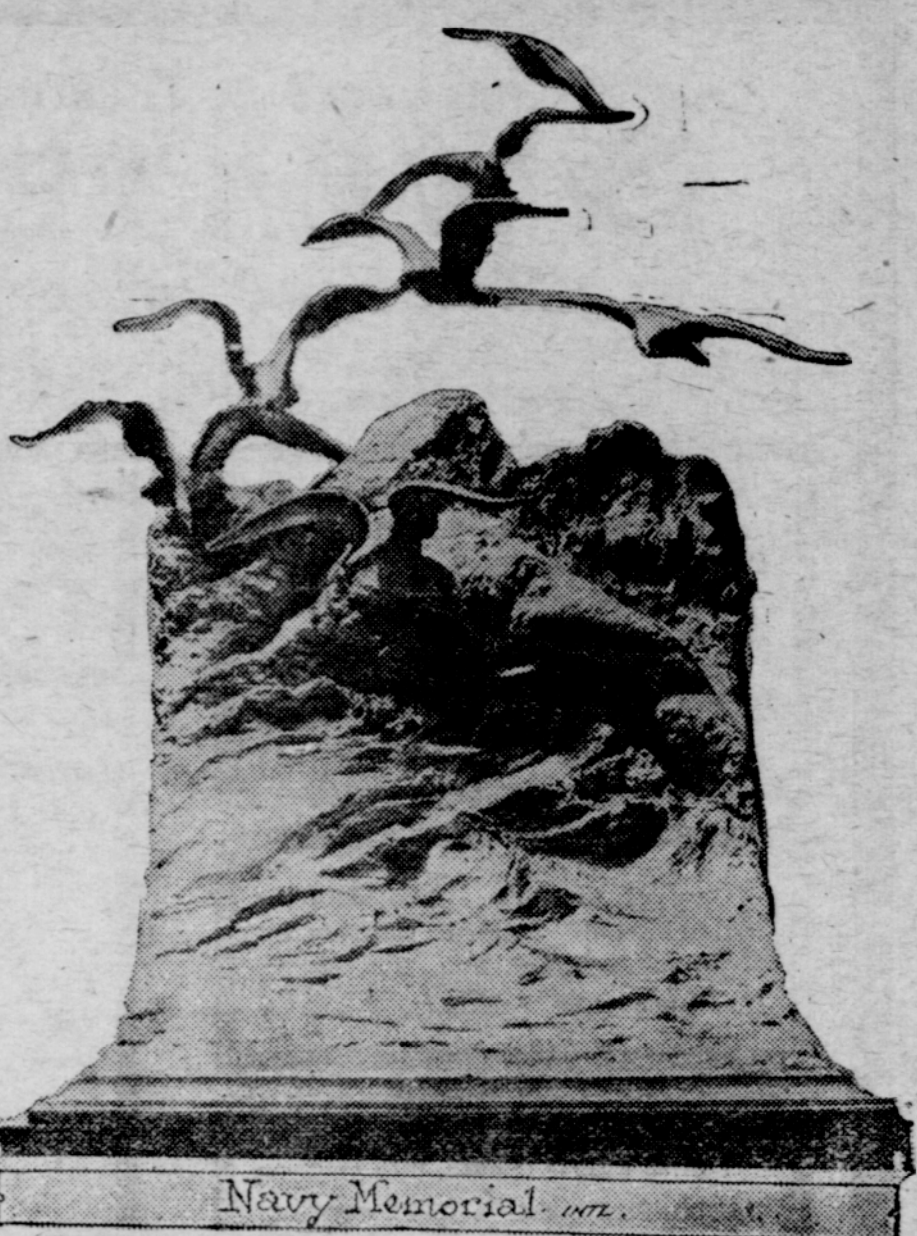

CHEHALIS, Jan. 29.—State Senator B. L. Sinclair, who was sentenced yesterday by Judge Reynolds to from eighteen months to three years in the state penitentiary at Walla Walla on charge of fraud in connection with wrecking his bank at Ilwaco, will not appeal, according to his attorneys. It is understood that another charge against him and his wife for receiving deposits after the bank was insolvent will be dismissed. Sinclair wept when he was sentenced.

Washington To Have Sea Memorial



Accompanying is a photo of the proposed Navy and Marine Memorial to be erected in Washington in commemoration of "the service of the sea" and dedicated to Americans lost at sea. It is not to be a war memorial, Mrs. Anna M. Graham, executive secretary of the executive committee, declared in a recent interview.

Secretary of the Navy, Edwin Denby is chairman of the honorary national committee and Mrs. Edwin Denby is head of the women's national committee. Rear Admiral Bradley A. Fiske is chairman of the executive committee.

The memorial is to be erected on a beautiful and spacious site in the national capital and will be of extraordinary magnificence. The waves and birds, as shown in the photo, will be in bronze, the pedestal and base in marble and stone. The latter will be adorned with bronze reliefs which will bear by symbol or direct expression on the various activities of life on the sea. The Navy, Merchant Marine, the Coast Guard and other sea-faring branches will be represented.

SALEM, Jan. 30.—Deputy state fire marshals held a conference here today with Will Moore, state fire marshal, and Governor Pierce with relation to the prosecution of a number of persons under suspicion in connection with fires that have occurred in different parts of the state during the last few months.

It was intimated that an attempt has been made to "cover up" a number of fires and that the state fire marshal's department has not received the co-operation to which it is entitled. No intimation was given by the state fire marshal, however, as to the identity of the persons.

PRUNE MEN OPPOSE PLAN FOR MARKETING WALLA WALLA, Jan. 29.—Opposition to the prune-marketing plan proposed by the committee of 15, made up of bankers and business men Saturday gave out its reasons for opposing, thus closing the formal public discussion of the plan. Members of the association must decide by February 5 whether they are to go ahead with the co-operative marketing.

The opponents, headed by Frank Shields of the Valley Fruit company, object to building up outside sales agencies and urge curtailing overhead by having local agencies handle the crop.

Golters Have New Ball of Great Distance

At last the average Golfer has come into his own! He can now drive a golf ball as great a distance as a professional. A. S. Chatfield of 103 Park Ave., N. Y. has invented the pneumatic golf ball. Through the very process of its construction its balance is scientifically perfect, which for the ordinary dub golfer makes it all that is to be desired. The lead ball is encased in a covering of rubber having 14 projections. This spider in turn is placed in a rubber core which is sealed under a pressure of air 40 lbs to the square inch. This operation makes a pneumatic weighted inner core of the golf ball. If it were desired to drive a golf ball 500 yards the pressure of air in this core would have to be increased to about 80 lbs. to the square inch. However as the United States Golf Association would eliminate golf balls of such distance the Chatfield ball carries 40 lbs air pressure which makes it a shade better than the best golf ball on the market today—distance and balance considered. After being sealed in the rubber core, it is then placed in the winding machines and wound with pure gum rubber until it reaches the proper size for the cover. After this process the outside core is vulcanized and the ball is then ready for play. Mr. Chatfield's new scientifically perfect ball is finding great favor with the professionals and within a short time will be available for the everyday use.

UNIVERSITY STUDENTS CONFESS P. P. ROBBERY

BUTTE, Jan. 29.—Three Montana University students are declared by postal authorities to have confessed the robbery of registered packages containing \$30,000 in currency addressed to a Missoula bank and which were taken in a holdup at the Missoula postoffice, when two masked robbers entered and held up two mail clerks. The students are Robert A. Heller, Robert Ackler, and Bernard A. Quesnel. A package was found in Heller's possession. Heller had been working in the office as night clerk.

CONTRACT FOR WATER SIGNED BY OFFICIALS

(Continued From Page 1)

tem contemplated in connection therewith,—in other words, the City agrees to pay its proportionate cost, based on the number of acre feet of water which it herein purchases, upon the complete construction of the new third unit. By way of explanation, the estimated cost per acre is \$105.00 but it is understood that the estimated cost may vary approximately 10 per cent either under or over the estimate from the actual cost and the City agrees to pay whatever the actual cost per acre foot is as may be determined immediately upon the completion of the project.

That in further explanation of the term "actual cost," it is understood that the same is the cost as ascertained immediately after the completion of the project and is not to include any later raise in cost, caused by delinquency of property owners within the district.

That the City agrees that it will make payment for the same water right, as follows:

(1)—\$20,000 cash, down to be paid when the District, (a) shall have held its election and returned a favorable vote on the construction of the said project; (b) shall have issued its bonds in connection with the project; (c) and shall have let and entered into a formal contract for the construction of Emigrant Creek Dam and project in connection therewith and received from the contractor, or contractors, a good

and sufficient bond for the faithful performance of the construction contract, or when the district, by reason of unsatisfactory bids shall have undertaken the construction work itself.

(2)—\$12,000 on the 15th day of the month following the making of the first \$20,000 payment aforesaid, and \$12,000 on the 15th day of each month following until the sum of \$56,000.00 in all, shall have been paid.

(3)—The balance of the purchase price to be paid in full immediately after completion of the project and the ascertaining of the "actual cost" of the Emigrant Creek Dam and other works comprising the Third Unit.

That the City agrees that after the project is completed and the delivery of water commences, that it will, upon demand by the District, pay the annual maintenance cost of the Irrigation System proportionate to the amount of acre feet herein purchased. Said maintenance cost shall be inclusive of all replacement expense and betterments to the system, but shall be exclusive of any cost of new construction for additional acreage, and any charge which may be to take care of any other delinquent irrigation assessments aside from operation and maintenance delinquencies, and further, exclusive of any and all charges on account of interest on bonds issued by the District.

That is understood and agreed that the regulation of the use of the water right herein granted shall be in the control of the Board of Directors of the District, the same as all users who are members and stockholders of the District. Provided, however, that the City shall not be required to use its water herein purchased in rotation with any other users and shall have the right to reserve its water during the irrigation season as desired by the said City, subject, however, to the capacity of the ditches of the District delivering same, it being understood that the City shall be reasonable in its demands respecting the delivery of said water:

That is understood and agreed that in case of a shortage of water in the systems of the District, then and in that event, the City shall only be entitled to its pro rata share during the period of such shortage.

That it is understood that the City is not to be restricted in the use to which it puts the water within the City Limits, the City being the sole judge as to how said water shall be disposed of within its limits.

That it is understood that the District shall be obligated to de-

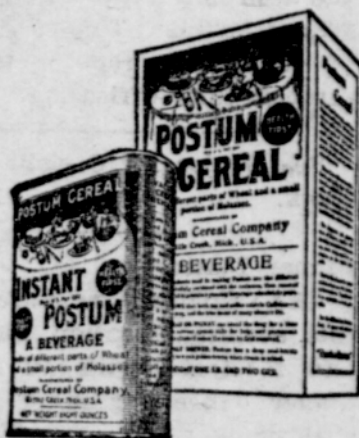

That it is understood that this contract is subject to the favorable vote of the electors of the Talent Irrigation District on the issuance of bonds to finance the proposed Third Unit as aforesaid, and subject to the people of

the City of Ashland returning a favorable vote on the issuance of bonds to provide funds with which the City may make its payments herein. This agreement is executed in behalf of the City of Ashland by its Mayor and City Recorder by virtue of authority given at an adjourned meeting of the Common Council, held on the 16th day of October, 1923, and the Talent Irrigation District has also caused this instrument to be executed by its Board of Directors and attested by its Secretary.
