cents left out of the dollar after paying their taxes and before they paid interest on money borrowed generally known as fixed charges. Improvement Seen "But we look for improvement. That improvement is coming thru the public gaining better knowledge of what the railroad business is and its intimate relation to the public welfare.

Mr. Sproule divides railroad experience into four classes. First, the period of construction and encouragement to construct. Second, the period of regulation and restricting. Third, the world war period, and fourth, the period of construction policies embodied in the transportation act of 1920. This, he said, is the period in which we now live and move and have our being."

piece of constructive legislation in which the public interest is the paramount principal. He pointed out that the railroads under this law are controlled as to rates they may charge, the rates of wages they may pay, as the amounts of money they may borrow, including the rates of interest they may pay and in many other ways. He said that even one section of the law, which has been supposed by some to be a guarantee, in fact restricts the earnings and does not guarantee any thing.

Let Roads Alone.

"But the point is," he said, "the transportation act of 1920 is a step forward. The railroads had been subjected to so much agitation and misrepresentation that now they simply ask that they be let alone and allow the statutes on the books to remain there.

The railroads ask that the rules of the game shall not be changed on them from year to year. They ask to be allowed to give a good account of themselves under the existing statutes. They ask the good will and support of the American people in continuing to build what is the greatest transportation system in the world into one that will still be greater and more useful.
