NORWAY DRY LAW LOSING GRACE

CHRISTIANIA, Jan. 29.—Norway is becoming tired of prohibition.

Anti-prohibitionists claim their campaign has been so successful during recent months they are practically certain their bill to abolish prohibition will be passed at the coming session of the Stortinget.

The Conservatives, a large proportion of the Agricultural Party and several Communist members have swung around against a continuance of the "dry" laws and are certain to support the "antis" bill.

The bill is further regarded as a necessity of the Government wants to balance its budget, it being argued that in the present economic circumstances it will be impossible to increase direct and indirect taxation, while the additional revenue required could be raised by restoring the liquor traffic, which would yield forty million kroner annually in taxation.

DENVER, Jan. 29.—That the "Old West"—popularly termed the "Wild West"—is as rich in the princely pomp of tradition and the glamour of chivalry as the Old World across the Atlantic, is the contention of Warren E. Boyer, former Denver newspaperman and now associated with the Denver Tourist Bureau, in a recent book "Vanishing Trails of Romance."

TRADE RECORD

FUEL FOR THE WORLD'S AUTOMOBILE

The United States the chief gasoline supply for world automobiles and flying machines.

The American horseless vehicle which is so rapidly invading the markets of the world is at the same time drawing its "food supply" from its native country, the United States. Figures compiled for the Trade Record of The National City Bank of New York show that the exportation of that absolute requirement of the horseless vehicle and flying machine—gasoline—is now nearly 5 times as much as a decade ago. The total quantity of gasoline exported in 1913 was a little over 100,000,000 gallons and in 1923 is estimated at about 500,000,000 gallons; the value in 1913 was \$17,000,000 and in 1923 approximately \$75,000,000.

That this demand for our gasoline by the automobiles and flying machines of the foreign world is a

permanent one is evidenced by the fact that our exports of gasoline are now much greater than in the biggest year of the war period when the requirements of the military operations in Europe greatly intensified the demand upon us as the world's chief producer of gasoline. While the official export records of the United States now combine the gasoline figures with those of naphtha under the title of "gasoline, naphtha and other light products of distillation," a study of the official figures during the years in which gasoline was separately stated seems to justify an estimate that the 1923 exports of gasoline alone are about 500,000,000 gallons with a value of about \$75,000,000.

Even this big export of approximately 500,000,000 gallons in 1923 adds the Trade Record, is a small quantity when compared with the figures of total production since the recent census of manufactures shows the quantity produced in the

United States in the calendar year 1921 as over 5,000,000,000 gallons, and this suggestion that we consume about nine-tenths of our product is in line with the recent statement that about nine-tenths of the world's automobiles are owned in the United States.

These 500,000,000 gallons of gasoline which we are exporting go to every part of the world. Official figures for 1921, the latest year in which gasoline was separately shown in the export record, shows shipments of gasoline to ninety different countries, colonies, and protectorates, including not only the chief countries of every grand division but also many of the smaller and younger political divisions such as Palestine, Kwangtung, Chosen, French Indo-China, Siam, Madagascar, Belgian Congo, Jugo-Slavia, Finland and Iceland. And in all of these countries to which the gasoline is sent it finds American automobiles awaiting its arrival.

Calls Nation To Demand Action By Congress on McNary's Forest Policy Bill.

If there were eighty-one million idle freight cars or eighty-one million idle people in this country a terrible roar would go up, says Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Tree Association of Washington, D. C., which is campaigning for a national forest policy. But the fact there are eighty-one million acres of idle land in this country most of it east of the Mississippi River and fit for little else, but growing trees does not interest the public as it should, according to Pack.

The McNary Forestry Bill has just been introduced in the U. S. Senate. The Chamber of Commerce of the United States has just announced a referendum vote in favor of forestry policy legislation by a tremendous majority. The National Forestry Program Committee, made up of newspaper publishers, lumber men and paper manufacturers, has been before the Senate Forestry Committee and stated the situation. Pack, who has just given annual forestry prizes to various forest reboys, and a thousand acre demonstration forest to the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse, says the people must wake up to an economic situation that is of the most vital importance to the welfare of the country. He has sent thousands of pounds of American tree seeds to help reforest France and Great Britain, in the hope that the lessons of war in these countries may be brought home to the people of this country, where the prices of lumber are constantly on the rise because the center of the lumber industry is fast approaching the Pacific Coast.

"If the people will get behind the McNary Bill," says Pack, "there is a great chance to make some progress. Congress must hear from the people. We must put idle land to work. Every man, woman and child is vitally interested in this bill. A big part of the high cost of

everything is directly traceable to the cost of forest products. New England, Pennsylvania, the Lake States are now importing lumber for their manufacturing needs when they produced all they needed and exported some too. We must have a steady flow of forest products as close to the factory door as possible. It means steady prosperity. Let every business man urge his congressman to get behind forestry legislation at this congress.
