THE EMIGRANT CREEK UNIT

Only one barrier remains in the way of the development and construction of the proposed Emigrant creek unit by the Talent Irrigation District, that of a satisfactory sale of \$440,000 of bonds, which have been advertised for sale February 26. To state it another way: there is only one obstacle in the way of needed development for certain districts of Jackson county.

The completion of the Emigrant creek unit means that water will be carried to 4500 more acres in Jackson county, that will produce four times the value in crops that it is producing today. It means that this area of land will provide homes for four times the number of people occupying it at the present time.

Although the area of land to come under the improvement is comparatively small it is so situated and of such character that the benefits are not to be estimated from that basis. The largest district to come under the new unit is that of Bell View, which consists of 1600 acres of excellent free soil, which needs only water to transform it into one of the most fertile and productive spots in the West. The district is ideally located, possess a perfect slope for irrigation, and with the unsurpassed climate that prevails here, will develop a degree of wealth that defies estimation. It is no wild exaggeration to say that with intensive cultivation and a fair market for small fruits and garden products that the 1600 acres in Bell View would be capable of supporting 800 families. It is not at all probable that the district will ever be subdivided into two-acre tracts, but the statement is made to convey to the reader the real possibilities of that district.

The Tidings firmly believes that the day the waters of Emigrant creek are carried to the lands of Bell View it will mean a marked step of advancement for Ashland. There is no district tributary to Ashland possessing the vast potentialities that are hidden in this district.

SUPPORT THE BASKET BALL TEAM

The Ashland High School basketball team is one that gives promise of becoming a strong contender for the championship of Southern Oregon, the reward of which is representing the district in the contests for state championship. The moral and financial support accorded the boys by the public means much in their march for the coveted goal. As a matter of community pride we owe them allegiance in all that the word implies. We owe our presence at their games on the local floor and we owe them words of encouragement and loyal rooting.

The thought comes, however, that in our over-zealousness to see the home team win that we are often robbed of our better judgment by rabid enthusiasm and desires for victory. This often attains a point where we fail to accord the visiting team due courtesy, resulting in exhibiting poor sportsmanship to our opponents. Observation points to the fact that Ashland sports and lovers of athletic contests are, as a rule, inclined to accord courtesy and fairness to opponents. There is, however, a rare occasion when some of the more enthusiastic temporarily forget themselves and step beyond the bounds within which good sportsmanship is confined. When this occurs it is well to remember that you owe to your visitors the same courtesy that you would ask for the home boys, were they visitors in another town. Keep the foregoing thought in mind and you will root at the right time, and will accord your guests the courtesy they rightfully deserve.

By all means let us support the high school basketball team loyally. This can be done and still accord opposing teams rightful courtesy.

MR. BOK REFUSES TO ANSWER

The dignified refusal of Mr. Edward W. Bok to disclose to an inquisitive Senate committee the probable total of his expenditure in founding and promoting his peace plan, unquestionably is based upon the right and privilege of an American citizen to conduct his own affairs as he sees fit so long as what he seeks to do is for the public good. Not to satisfy the prying curiosity of politicians is he or anyone compelled to reveal the methods adopted or the processes pursued, even if his aim is to bring a nation to an understanding of the ways and blessings of peace by some other way than that prescribed by custom and tradition.

The investigators, clothed with the authority, and presumptively with the dignity of United States senators, proceeding upon the theory that some vast sum has been expended in propagandizing the Bok peace plan, apparently deemed it within their rights to hale the founder of the fund before them to tell them what they desired to learn. Mr. Bok quite courteously admitted that he had provided, by the establishment of a trust fund, an amount

necessary to cover any expenses incurred. But beyond this, except to state his reasons for refusing to specify the approximate size of this fund, he refused to go. He made it plain to the committee that, in his view, the matter is a privileged one, and that the amount of money any person sees fit to devote to the welfare of the public is not a subject that can properly be inquired into even by a Senate subcommittee. Furthermore, he said that as a matter of fact he did not know just how much money had been spent or how much would be spent. He was certain however, that he had provided enough, in the form of a trust fund, to meet all expenses.

And then Mr. Bok attempted to make it quite plain to his inquisitors why he felt as he did. He stated that all that he had had come from the American people, and that he desires, after making necessary provision for his family, to use his wealth for what he believes to be the best interest of the public. And right there is the important explanatory phrase. He desires to use his money for what he, and not someone else, believes will be to the best interest of those whom he wishes to help.

Thousands of American readers have been thrilled and enlightened by reading "The Americanization of Edward Bok," an autobiography describing the struggles of a little Holland immigrant boy for an education and for a livelihood in Brooklyn and New York. The writer of that book made it plain that he believed himself indebted to the people and the institutions of his adopted country. He convinced many who read his story that the obligation is on the other side. But upon the theory that the debt is his, he is proceeding to pay it. He reasonably and courageously insists that the public has no desire to limit or question the amount of money he devotes to the business in hand.—Christian Science Monitor.

INVESTORS' GULLIBILITY

Government statisticians estimate that more than \$500,000,000 was taken from small investors in America last year by swindlers and promoters of highly speculative ventures. The money so taken was from a class that can ill afford to lose it. In many instances life savings were consumed by these frauds.

The above-mentioned sum was a big price to pay for indulgence in gullibility. If there had been investigation before such investments, they would not have been made. There are abundant opportunities for such investigation. Banks throughout the country stand ready to advise applicants as to ventures concerning which they man inquire. Government agencies are ready to aid in detecting fraud. Failure to make proper investigation before investing money is the fault of the investor.

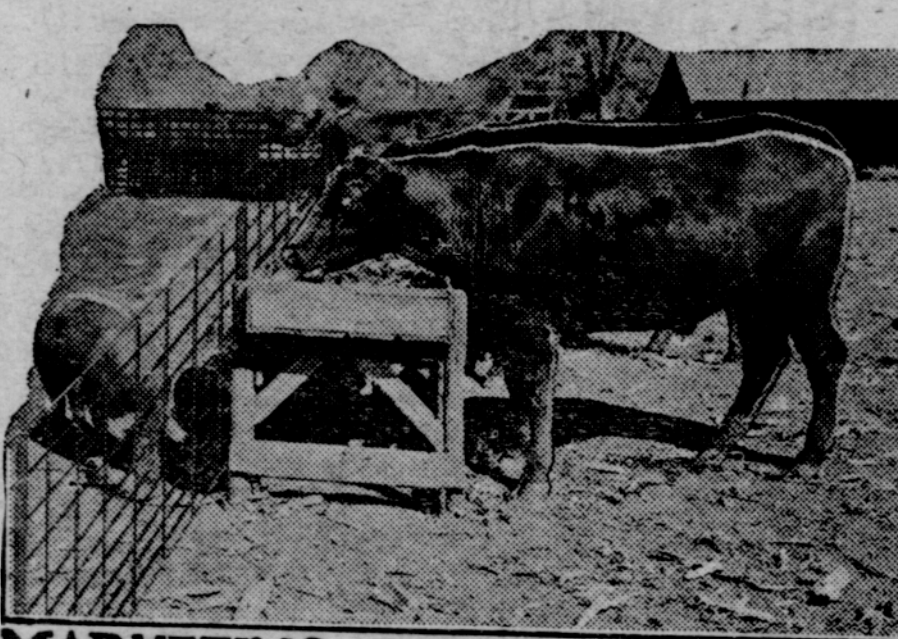
Newsprint from Straw

MARKETING GRAIN ON THE HOOF

THERE is many a good farmer who has good grain crops, and where many fields are growing up to weeds. In any such community the farm bureau and commercial club ought to have a joint meeting and figure out a plan where feeders may be had, and to get enough farmers interested in the feeding game to ensure proper marketing facilities. Such stock may usually be had from the stock yards in the beginning and steers should be bred for this purpose by farmers' groups sufficiently large to make a market.

FIRE GOT JAPAN'S MONEY MACHINERY

Country Virtually Without New Currency Pending Arrival of Presses.

CARSON CITY, Feb. 2.—Plans to locate Japanese colonists from California upon Nevada agricultural lands are being directed by Japanese leaders. This is the report received by state officials. The Nevada state engineer was recently asked for an opinion on the practicability of reclaiming arid lands in Ash Meadows, south of Tonopah, and it has since been learned the inquiries were on behalf of Japanese agents.

Keep Close Watch
Governor Scruggs and State Engineer Allen state the movement of Japanese to Nevada so far is insignificant, but a close watch is being kept on the situation.

Several Japanese families have recently arrived in Lyon County, one of the most fertile in Nevada and more are said to be planning settlement in Smith and Mason Valleys.

The constitution of Nevada allows resident aliens the same property rights as Nevada citizens, but at the next election the people will be called on to vote upon repeal of this section of the state laws. The two last legislatures approved changes calculated to prevent control of agricultural lands by certain aliens.

If the electors approve repeal of the existing law, the next legislature is expected to enact statutes prohibiting ownership or leasing of lands by persons ineligible to citizenship.

BODY OF DROWNED MAN IS RECOVERED

CLATSkanie, Or., Feb. 1.—The body of Axel Erickson, who was drowned in the Nehalem river last December, was recovered today near the Nels Peterson place 2 1/2 miles from the scene of the drowning. Mr. Erickson is survived by his parents, who live in Clatskanie, and his widow, in Portland. Funeral services will be held here.

NEWS LETTER

LONDON, Feb. 1.—British women are demanding royal recognition. Now that women have established themselves in the House of Commons, with eight members representing their sex, and dozens in the eminent professions, they insist the King should recognize the public services of women in his semi-annual honor lists.

The Women's Freedom League took up the campaign and addressed a letter to Stanley Baldwin criticizing him for his failure to include women in the list which he sent to the King for the New Year's list. The League maintains that the time has come when women are almost equal to men in their value to the nation and in giving service, and they insist that no longer shall the privilege of wearing orders and decorations be confined entirely to the male sex.

Perhaps if the demands of the women are met there will be added impetus given to styles in evening gowns, for there must be revision in styles if women are to wear the heavy orders and decorations which men now wear.

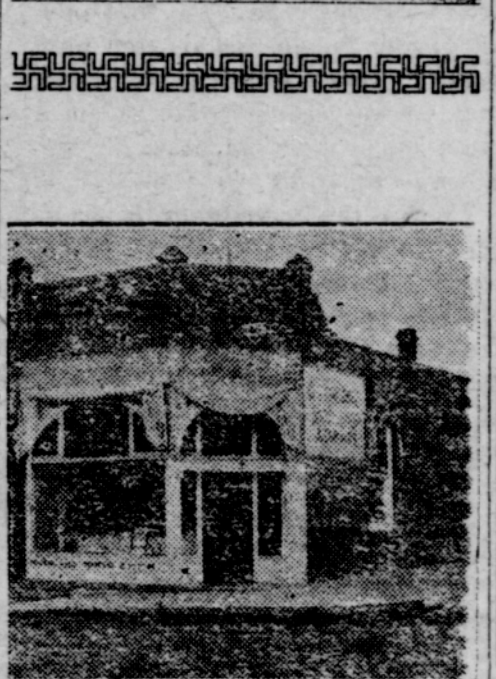

tique furniture to America. In Italy the American is more apt to find real bargains and for several months past the exchange has also worked in favor of the American buyer.

While the Italian Government prevents the exportation of rare museum pieces, it does not object to the exportation of ordinary antiques, and many an old piece to be found in a hidden corner of Rome or Milan would cheer the heart of an American collector.

One-seventh of the guests of the Metropole Hotel, one of the best hotels of London, during the year 1923 were Americans, according to the annual report.

The manager of the Metropole declares that Americans were the most exacting of all his 28,000 guests during the year. "Nine out of every ten Americans," he states, "on arrival ask for an outside room, next to the elevator, facing south."

"Among the visitors from the States we had one or two who

were traveling abroad for the first time and they displayed surprising ingenuousness. One, evidently a prosperous farmer from the remote Middle West, asked the reception clerk: 'How late can I stay out?' What time do I have to come home and shall I knock on the door?'"

It would be interesting if the manager had only given some of the amusing incidents which certainly occurred in dealing with the guests who were not from America, but from the great English hinterland which is more "hinter" than any part of the United States.
