UNDERTHINGS OF ENTICING CHARM

One does not need much light on the subject to see that the underthings pictured here are both pretty and practical. First come the pajamas for girls and juniors, with slip-on coat with kimono sleeves. It is trimmed with bands of self-material and a monogram. Linette, cotton and the crepes, silk and cotton, are suited to the development of this model which requires, for medium size, 4 3/4 yards 36 inches wide.

Dolly is a rather sullen witness to the service of the second design, due largely to cramped position. Sprightly indeed, however, is the wearer of the underwaist and drawers. A choice is provided for round or square neck for the waist, while the side-closing drawers are gathered at the upper and lower edges to straight bands. Medium size requires 1 1/2 yards 36-inch material.

The combination to the extreme right is for girls and juniors. It closes at the back, and about the round neck, armholes and lower edges of the panties are frills of lingerie net, a very dainty and durable trimming for underwear. The upper back edge of the drawers is gathered to a waistband and buttoned to the back of the waist. Medium size requires 2 1/4 yards 36-inch material.

NEWS LETTER

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—"Well do I remember. We had 200 guests."

It was the shade of Charley Adams, clerk at the Astor House, talking. The Astor House stood on the corner of Broadway and Vesey street then fifty-six years ago, when New York held its first and only national political convention.

"We're expecting 200,000 out-of-town visitors in for the big gathering this year," Mark A. Caldwell, head of the New York Hotel Men's Association, replied.

"Must have been at least 5,000 strangers in town for the meeting in 1868," the shade of Adams recalled.

With the folk from Jersey and the New England States, New York expects to entertain an extra million during the 1924 convention," Caldwell informed.

Different Now

It is a different New York than the city of 1868—when Horatio Seymour was nominated—which will greet the 1924 Democratic delegates.

Then the Brooklyn Bridge was only a dream.

Horse cars were in vogue. Trinity's spire loomed high over Manhattan. Wall street was a straggling lane of low, squat buildings, telegraph poles lining its sides. There was one apartment building in the city.

Tammany Hall, where the first convention was held, seated 1,000 delegates and spectators.

Today tunnels, accommodating subway trains which hold 1,500 to 2,000 closely packed humans, run under both the East and Hudson rivers. Only by search can Trinity still be found, hidden away in the maze of the gigantic Woolworth tower, the massive Equitable and the countless 30 and 35-story buildings—Wall today.

Sixteen hundred taxicabs dash through the same narrow streets of '68. Madison Square Garden will seat 15,000.
