DEATH LIST FROM BEANS GROWS TO NINE

deaths, thrives and propagates at a temperature of 120 degrees above zero, at which temperature other germs die. The bacteria comes from a spore that originates in the ground and is destroyed only when the temperatures reaches 240 degrees or more, it is said. Commercial vegetables are cooked at a degree or so more than 240 degrees above zero and are said to be free from the bacteria, although all home-canned goods are subject to it.

Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer, was called and with the physicians who attended the poisoned persons, began an investigation. A post mortem upon one or more of the bodies will be performed to determine the precise cause of the deaths.

Dr. Frederic D. Stricker, state health officer, and Dr. William Levin of Portland were here yesterday investigating the deaths. They removed the stomach, heart, intestines and other organs from the body of Mrs. Gottfried Ruehling and took them to Portland for analysis.

NEWS LETTER

LONDON, Feb. 6 — Robert Blatchford, one of the best known of English publicists and formerly a great advocate of Socialism, has resigned his position with the Sunday Herald and the Sunday Chronicle as a protest against the combination of these papers, with others, into the Rothermere group of newspapers.

"I have left the syndicated papers because I could not remain and keep my self respect," Blatchford declared. "The syndication of the press is a sinister development."

"I have not been heroic, only honest. I did not feel clean; but I am quite all right and can take care of myself. I shall not come on the dole. I am not going into any wilderness."

Blatchford took a parting shot at the so-called "Trust Press" in rhyme, which is published in the Daily Herald. It follows:

"He roars with force terrific as the Standard of the Mail, As the Illustrated Whatsiname he brandishes his tail, As daily this or morning That he grinds his awful teeth, As Evening Slush or Sunday Slop his dreadful claws unseath. He's a ramping, raging chorus, he's the terror of the land, He means to be dictator soon and then it will be grand."

At the thought of his ferocity we'd strangle in our fears, But our terror melts in laughter when the creature shakes his ears.

Since the Rothermere and Beaverbrook interests took over the Hulton publications the charges of a "press trust" have been many, and opposition papers have been playing on the charges. Low, the cartoonist of the Evening Star, has caricatured Lords Rothermere and Beaverbrook as Italian bandits and refers to them as "The Plot Press." Repeating these caricatures of "The Plot Press" every day, Low has made the characters almost as familiar in England as "Jiggs."

From housework to House of Commons is the daily routine of Miss Dorothy Jewson, Labor Member of Parliament. Miss Jewson lives with a companion in a small flat near St. Pancras and each day arises early to do her share of the housework before leaving to take up her parliamentary tasks.

Although Miss Jewson has a small private income, she is said to be constantly poor, because she is so liberal with her money. Friends state that she frequently has to walk home from the House of Commons because she has given all of her money to needy persons. On the day the House of Commons opened Miss Jewson had to retrim her one hat in order to make her of her better hats away. Having trimmed the old hat she decided not to wear it and help inaugurate a new custom by appearing in the House of Commons without headgear.
