WOULD FINANCE CAMP THROUGH DIRECT PLAN

Ashland, Oregon,

Editor Tidings:

Noticing your announcement in the Tidings of February 6th that auto camp plans are completed, I desire to make some suggestions in regard to financing the proposition differently, in following the recommendations of the Park Board plan by calling a special election. The plan would more than likely be defeated or turned down. Even if it does carry and bonds are sold, the money would not be available until early summer, consequently being too late for this year's business.

I would therefore suggest that we find forty individual responsible parties in this vicinity who are interested enough in the park and Ashland to subscribe \$250.00 each to raise the total of \$10,000 by cash or notes.

Those parties that do not have the money on hand might be loaned money by the banks in the city at light rates of interest, not to be repaid until the park and should be paid off by degrees, according to the profit the park and campground will make it and I feel that the interest and \$50 could be paid on each note every year, thereby have it all wiped off in five years time.

In regard to the elk, I would propose to get them away from the present ground. Butcher them, kill them, turn them loose, or fence off some brushland across the creek, anything to get them off where they are now, so that the ground could be utilized for the community house and campers.

OPPOSES ACTION OF ASHLAND'S CITY COUNCIL

Ashland, Oregon, Feb. 7, 1924
Editor Tidings:

The City Council, and more especially the City Attorney, seem to be afraid of the consequences should they submit the question of the contract with the Talent Irrigation Company to the people for ratification or rejection.

It is a grave and serious matter for officials of the city to enter into a contract, running over the period of a generation, and involving a consideration of over one hundred thousand dollars, without submitting to the taxpayers of the municipality.

It is a mere pretext to talk of saving the expense of an election. They did not quibble about the expense of bringing a test suit and carrying it to the Supreme Court to satisfy them of the validity of the contract. They could afford to pay Counsel for both sides of the litigation in this matter, but the expense of a city election is an awful thing.

They are simply afraid of the issue. The writer heard Mr. Ninger, a member of the council, say before that body, in discussing the matter, that if it was submitted to a vote of the people, they (the City Council) would never enter into the contract, that the people did not understand it, and that he for one was in favor of going ahead and signing up for the water. This was when they were talking of signing a contract for 100 acre-feet, and the writer was there with a protest against signing this contract, without first submitting it to a vote of the people. This protest was signed by about one hundred and fifty of the principal business men of the city.

The City Council is aware that the City Charter is plainly against entering into a contract of this nature or of this amount (which is indefinite) without the specific consent of the taxpayers, and to take advantage of technicalities in law in order to do so, is only

TAKING EGGS AT BEAR CREEK TROUT STATION

12,000 Eggs Were Secured Yesterday From Steelhead Trout; Run Is Excellent.

Over 12,000 eggs were taken from steel head trout yesterday at the egg taking station at the mouth of Bear Creek, near Tolo as the amount for the first days' run of the season this year. It is expected that at the end of the present season between one and two million eggs will have been taken as the largest record drive in recent years. Egg taking stations are located at Antelope and Eagle Point as well as at Tolo, and it is expected that probably 10,000,000 eggs will have been secured at the three plants this year.

Steelhead of all sizes, in untold quantities and larger than ever before, are running now. Several fish were marked at the Eagle Point station last year and so far this season of the same fish have made their appearance. A tiny niche was cut in one fin as a marking and it is probable that several others will have returned before the season is over.

Traps have been located at the foot of the various streams so that fish are caught and the eggs removed before they have a chance to go farther up the outlet to lay their eggs. Several years ago irrigation ditches leading off the various creeks were almost unheard of and fish were able to go up to their native spawning places and return with the spring to the ocean and deep water. With the coming of so many unscrupulous ditchers, the young fry after they leave their hatching place, in the spring are apt to be caught in the course of the water and carried out to the ends of ditches to die on alfalfa fields. By taking the spawn at the foot of the creeks the fry is saved and planted in more propitious places.

After the older fish have spawned and returned to the ocean the young fry stay at their spawning place until warm weather comes to warm the water and they migrate to deep places. It is then, according to those who have studied conditions, that the streams dry up and leave the fish to die.

In 1919 5,725,000 were planted and the increase in 1923 had grown to 33,849,000. Over 10,000,000 fry were liberated in 1921 from egg taking stations all over the state, this number included only game fish, as salmon are classed under another group.

STATE HEALTH BOARD DISCUSSES BOTULISM

Marked Increase in Outbreaks Is Noted; Necessary Precautions Are Given.

The following issued by the Oregon State Board of Health is timely, in view of 11 people having recently been killed in the state as the result of Botulism.

Botulism is a deadly food poison. The name botulism has lost its original significance which was sausage poisoning. It was thought that the germ that produces the poison causing botulism would grow only in sausage, but it is now known that it will grow in ham, cottage cheese, string beans, corn, asparagus, and ripe olives.

Botulism is a rare disease but is more common in Europe than in America. In a period of twenty-two years there were 150 people ill and 111 died of the disease, among approximately 100 million people. Therefore it cannot be compared in magnitude to tuberculosis or syphilis. Botulism is the cause of lunge poisoning in horses and of limberneck in chickens and turkeys.

There has been a marked increase in the number of recorded outbreaks of botulism in the United States within the past few years. The present outbreak in Albany is the only one in the history of Oregon and in the number of cases and rate of fatality is one of the greatest in this country.

The bacillus botulinus grows only when deprived of air and at room temperature. It produces the botulinus toxin. The botulinus toxin is the only one of the true toxins that is poisonous when taken by the mouth. It is exceedingly poisonous. A 250 gram guinea pig was killed by 0.000001 c. c. or 1-200,000 of a drop of toxin. Persons have been known to die from "nibbling" a small portion of a pod of string beans.

Symptoms of poisoning may appear in as short a period as four hours and as long as six days after eating food containing the poison. The general appearance of the patient is one of muscular weakness, anxiety, utter helplessness, difficulty in swallowing, struggle for breath, and unsuccessful attempts to articulate, making a picture which once seen will never be forgotten.

The poisoning is caused by a toxin and not the germ. It may develop in many of the foods we eat when the conditions are right. All that is necessary for the formation of the poison in many kinds of canned food, is that spores of the organism remain alive within the container after it has been processed. The spores of the bacillus will resist the temperature of boiling water several hours.

2—Use no canned food unless it has been processed at high temperature; this is especially applicable to vegetables of the type that are used in salads. To insure high temperature a pressure cooker is a necessity.
