MAN WRECKED ON WAY TO SEE BROTHER

STOCKTON, Cal., Feb. 7.—Hurrying out to the farm of his brother, who was reported seriously injured, Joe Delucchi, Stockton man, ran into John Garibaldi at a street intersection here last night.

Delucchi sent Garibaldi to the emergency hospital, where he was found to have a fractured skull. Delucchi continued his trip to the farm where he found his brother had committed suicide by shooting himself through the heart with a revolver. No cause for the suicide is known.

Deputy Sheriff Eaton investigated and said the accident in which Garibaldi was hurt was unavoidable.

ELKS CHECKING UP POPULATION OF DUNSMUIR

DUNSMUIR, Cal., Feb. 8.—Members of the Grand Lodge of Elks were in Dunsmuir this week investigating the validity of the claim that Dunsmuir has the necessary population of 5,000 to have a lodge of her own.

Redding Lodge is said to be opposing the institution of a lodge here. It is claimed that Dunsmuir's count was found to be correct, and the number of people to be 5,200. Dunsmuir's dimensions give rise to the idea that the place is much smaller than it is, extending as it does north and south from Little Castle Creek to the City Park, but being only about four streets in width.

Ashland's ability to play basketball has been tested lately with teams that are not in the ring for southern Oregon championship, but who have given a valuable field for the locals to test their mettle. Tonight's game starts promptly with a good preliminary and will give the most exciting critic a lot of cause for comment.

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"KING JAMES BIBLE IS NOT SECTARIAN"

Supreme Court of California Says King James Version Not Sectarian Nor Denominational

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The Supreme Court of California has decided the Kings James version of the Holy Bible is neither sectarian nor denominational. The decision affirms the judgment of the Superior Court in Fresno County and reverses the judgement of the California District Court of Appeals.

Those who desired the Bible disbarred from school libraries contended that the state constitutional provision which states that "no publication of a sectarian partisan or denominational character must be used or distributed in any school, or school library, nor must any sectarian or denominational doctrine be taught therein," was authority for such disbarment.

LAWYERS BEGIN FIGHT AGAINST INCOME TAX

PORTLAND, Feb. 8.—Petitions for an order to restrain state officials from enforcing the state income tax are being prepared and are expected to be filed within two weeks.

Individuals and corporations are parties to the litigation and their respective attorneys have been in consultation as to ways, means and methods of testing the constitutionality of the law in several phases.

LEAPS TO ESCAPE SPEEDER; IS KILLED

ROSEBURG, Feb. 7.—Dan Murphy, aged 47 years, a transient, whose home is believed to be in San Luis Obispo, died here today shortly after being brought to the city from Cabin creek, near Leona where he received a fractured skull in a jump from the railroad trestle.

Murphy was crossing the long trestle over Cabin creek, when a gasoline speeder bore down upon him. He jumped off the structure and in the fall his skull was fractured. He was picked up and brought to Roseburg on a freight train, but died before reaching the hospital.

ated lands under irrigation and a listing of large tracts, whether cultivated or not, suitable for sub-division and sale in units of the "one man farm." These lands must be appraised at a fair value such as will permit the purchaser a degree of prosperity.
