Photos Transmitted By Radio Waves



EDITORS—This is the third and last of a series of articles on radio transmission of photos and motion pictures. The accompanying article gives details of the mechanical operation of the equipment employed.—International News Service.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—"Will it work?"

That's the ultimate test of any kind of scientific apparatus, and by that token there seems to be no further doubt that the transmission of pictures by radio is practicable. It has been done, declares the inventor of the "prismatic ring."

While awaiting further development of "movies by radio" the art of transmitting "still" pictures by the same medium will be put into useful practice immediately, declares C. Francis Jenkins, the inventor.

"To receive pictures by radio," asserts this veteran experimenter, "it is only necessary (1) to cover a photographic plate in parallel adjacent lines and (2) to vary the density of the lines, to build up the shadows, the half-tones and the high lights of the picture."

The essential device which in this fashion makes pictures by radio is the prismatic ring, a new optical shape in glass which has been obtained only since the perfection of automatic machinery for its making.

"This prismatic ring is equivalent to a glass prism which changes the angle between its faces and in rotation gives to a beam of light having a fixed axis on one side of the prism a hinged or oscillating axis on the other side of the prism."

"That is, a small pencil of light coming from a fixed source and passing through the overlapping surfaces of two rotating prismatic rings, having their diameters at right angles where the diameters cross and one of the plates rotating many times faster than the other, will cause this pencil of light to sweep across the picture in adjacent parallel lines until the whole surface of the picture negative is covered.

At the same time, if the intensity of the light impinging on the negative is varied, that is, strong at the same place in adjacent lines, dense spots are built up; if the light is less intense elsewhere half-tones will be obtained, while if the light is less is very faint little or no exposure will result.

"It is thus the lights and shadows which make the picture are built up, line by line, for when this negative is developed and prints made therefrom the dense areas produce high lights in the picture, the less dense areas the half-tones and the extremely thin areas the shadows."

"And these high lights, half-tones and shadows correspond in exact position and density to the high lights, the half-tones and the shadows of the picture broadcasted at the sending station."

Jenkins then describes how the radio carrier waves at the broadcasting station are impressed with a varying electrical current corresponding to the modulations of the light waves.

It is immaterial, he declares, whether the modulations in light intensity come from a film, a photo, or an exterior scene. The scene at which the lens of the transmitter is pointed is impressed on the light sensitive cell; the cell modulates the current, and the current modulates the radio carrier waves. That's all there is to it!

"The whole apparatus," asserts Jenkins, "is comparable to a camera with a lens in Washington and its photographic plate in Boston."

BODY OF WILSON IS REQUESTED BY LEGION

That Remains of Former Commander Rest in Arlington National Cemetery

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 18.—A request that the body of Woodrow Wilson, former president of the United States, commander-in-chief of our military forces during the world war and a Legionnaire, be buried in the Arlington National Cemetery has been made in the name of the American Legion by National Commander John R. Quinn.

Commander Quinn immediately on being informed of Mr. Wilson's death ordered all national, department and post colors to be draped with mourning for a period of thirty days, in honor of the passing of one of its most distinguished members. The former president was a charter member of George Washington post No. 1, the first post organized in the Legion.

In a telegram of condolence to Mrs. Wilson, the Legion leader declared that "the hearts of the men and women of the American Legion beat in profound sympathy with you in your hour of sorrow. He added that the peoples of the world would ever remember Woodrow Wilson as "the apostle of peace."

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, Forest Grove, Feb. 18.—Professor H. S. Tuttle head of the department of education of Pacific University, has been elected to the faculty of the Oregon Agricultural college summer school. NEWS LETTER

FOOCHOW, Feb. 17.—America may think she invented the outja board, but she is all wrong, for in China the "chi tan" has been known for several hundred years. I first heard of the mystic board in Foochow from some young Chinese friends who had learned of the American outja board. They wanted to know all about it and then they began to talk of the Chinese "chi tan," which they believed to be very similar.

We set off for the Black Rock Temple in the hills of Foochow one afternoon—for the Chinese outja board is connected with the religion of the people. There was a big festival on, and many Chinese men and women were arriving at the picturesque temple built half way up the mountain. They had come to consult the priests as to the past, present and future. Inside the temple incense and red candles burned before a great golden buddha, and the deep notes of the hanging drum and the bronze bell echoed through the dimly lighted hall.

We watched the worshippers, dainty little ladies, in broadened satin costumes; field women, in the blue coolie cloth coat and trousers of the worker; the pompous merchant, the slim scholar—men and women of all classes drawn to this mountain temple. Our Chinese friends went to a stall in one corner of the room and bought long red tickets, which entitled us to seek the Chinese mystic board.

The priest led us to a rear temple. Here a large group crowded around two priests who were in charge of a long, sand-covered table. One held a bamboo stick similar to a Chinese inkbrush. Apparently with no volition of the Chinese, the brush was writing Chinese characters in the sand. The crowd was spellbound. Silently we watched the mystic brush form the characters until the question asked was answered.

AMITY FARMER KILLED BY AN ENRAGED BULL

AMITY, Feb. 18.—While helping his son with work on the farm three miles south of the place, F. T. Romig, a resident of Amity, was attacked and killed by a bull which had escaped from the barn and which Romig had tried to drive back.

Mr. Romig is survived by three daughters and three sons. His wife died less than a year ago. His youngest son, Maurice, is a student in the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis.

In a few minutes the pen in my hand began to write. It did not seem possible that I could be writing Chinese characters with the ease of a scribe. The characters formed a poem. My friends translated for me: "Review the old and you will know the new."

This was a quotation from the famous Chinese philosopher, Confucius. It was a charge given by him to his pupils to read again and again until they mastered their old books before they opened the new.

The practice of prophecy is very common in Northern and Southern China, although little known in the central part of the Republic
