## HOW ABOUT OTHER PLANS?

The Klamath Falls Evening Herald prints an editorial entitled "Much Chaff, Little Wheat," and then denounces the Bok peace plan and all connected with it. It belittles the movement because up to the day of designating the author of the winning plan only 401,000 votes had been cast, and says the fact that the vote is seven to one in favor of the plan indicates nothing at all.

In the first place the Herald is following in the path of a few of the big dailies of the country that instituted a campaign of criticism against the plan before it was announced. They condemned Bok and all those connected with the American Peace Award, despite the fact many of them are among the best known citizens of the country. They attempted to belittle Bok and his efforts for no other reason than it was evident that some plan similar to the League of Nations or World Court would be forthcoming. That was evident from the beginning for the mind of man can conceive of no plan that will not be akin to one or the other. They condemn men because they devote money and time to spreading the cry of universal peace, hence there is no other assumption than that they crown laurels of praise and honor those who are advocates of war and those who loll in wealth made from the manufacture of munitions of war. They prefer to stand on the side of those who have no care for how many sons of American mothers are fed to the death dealing devices of modern science.

For the sake of argument admit that Bok is wrong, even in his efforts to bring about world peace. Admit that the winning plan is wrong. Admit that the referendum is not representative. With this done let us take up the vote that is being conducted on the Mellon plan for tax reduction, and which it is argued will not permit of adjusted compensation for the men who served America in the world war. Many of the newspapers laud the Mellon plan to the skies and call attention to the fact that a very large majority of American citizens are in favor of it, claiming it is attested by the straw vote conducted by the Literary Digest. We have been witnessing the results of another straw vote on preferences for president. Despite the results of the vote on the Mellon plan and on the next president they must be branded as false. They are not representative.

There is as much reason to believe that the vote on the peace plan is as representative as it is with respect to the Mellon tax reduction plan. To argue to the contrary is silly.

To one who loves peace and abhors war, who prefers seeing his country pursuing peaceful pursuits and who believes in the conservation of young manhood and national wealth the efforts of those to ridicule and defeat those who have sufficient wealth and influence to spread the desire for universal peace are deplored.

## SELLING OURSELVES

Recently the Oregon Daily Journal carried an excellent, though short, editorial on selling Oregon to ourselves, saying that this is a necessary requisite if we expect Oregon contagion to inoculate others.

It is a well known principal that no man can be successful without possessing enthusiasm with respect to that which he is doing or in which he is engaged. The successful life insurance manager lays down to his field representatives as a fundamental principal the fact that they must first sell themselves before they can hope to sell to others, at least to a successful degree. The sales managers of our wholesale houses hammer the same argument home to their salesmen, telling them they must know their line not only, but must possess enthusiasm for it; believe in it and sell themselves. Any man who has ever been engaged in the selling game knows this to be a well founded principal.

As with the individual in his private line, so it is with Oregonians and Oregon. Before we can hope to instill enthusiasm and interest in the people of other states with respect to Oregon we must first be imbued with an enthusiasm and interest in Oregon. When those who reside in Oregon come to a true realization of the unsurpassed beauty and almost unlimited resources of this wonderful state their enthusiasm will be quickly transmitted to others. Once those living in less favored sections come to know that we are proud of Oregon because of the beauty and grandeur of its snow-covered and rock-bound mountains, its rivers and streams, its mirrored lakes, its fertile hills and valleys, its unsurpassed wealth in minerals, timber, fish, water power, wild life and game and its wonderful climate, distance will be no barrier nor will the attractions of other states offer impediment to their coming to Oregon. Enthusiasm on the part of those already

enjoying these wonderful opportunities and advantages will become a powerful aid to the millions that are being spent in advertising Oregon and bringing it to the attention of the people residing in other districts.

Read of your state. Study it. Compare it with others. Do this and you will soon be brought to a realization that you are within the borders of one of the greatest states in the nation, and with it will come that enthusiasm with which many are already imbued.

## "BUSINESS AS USUAL"

Pluck, necessity and business acumen have all prompted as speedy a reconstruction as possible of the shattered structure of Japanese commercial life. As an instance, the Foreign Commerce Department of the National Chamber has recently received an attractively printed announcement, in English, gotten out by the Osaka Commercial Museum within a month of the upheaval that had literally and figuratively disrupted the commercial foundations of Japan.

That Museum, "in order to fulfill the ardent demands of the business men from all over the country, as well as those of the foreign countries, has established the Emergency Trade Information Bureau with the view of reducing the after-effect of disturbance to the minimum by the adjustment of general commodities and the operation of harmonious business transaction."

The Bulletin further states that "Osaka, as a center of manufacturing industries and the greatest city of the Empire, carries unlimited potential sources of supplies and it is the Bureau's mission that it will make its best effort to save the paralyzed market from difficult situation which is prevailing at present. The Bureau will give all information, free of charge, on the following items:

1. Information of Exporters, Dealers and Manufacturers in Osaka and all other important cities.
2. Information of Importers, Buyers and Brokers in Osaka, Kobe and other cities and ports.
3. Catalogues, Literatures and Price Lists, etc., are collected and supplied on application.
4. Inquiries or Investigations on general merchandise reported on request. The circular concluding with a "cordial invitation to write or call."

"What is true of a shopkeeper is true of a shop-keeping nation." Editor Tidings:

In talking with others I am that portion of others that never think or whose thinking has been misdirected by ignorant or false teachers, we find that they are confused and utterly at fault, at to differentiating between municipal laws or constitutional or charter provisions. The 1st is a law enacted by legislative bodies that to be enforceable must be constitutional, the second are laws of or laws contained in the constitution. The adoption of or amendment to a charter or constitution does not necessarily make more ordinances or laws but may, and often do, make a less number not by repealing them but by making many of them void because they conflict with or are contrary to provision of the charter or constitution as adopted or amended.

The eighteen amendment to the Federal Constitution is an example to the above assertion. All laws, and they are legion, national, state laws or city ordinances sustaining or licensing saloons or legalizing traffic in intoxicating liquors and their use as beverages were made void, non-enforceable or as if they were not. On thing that makes our present charter so voluminous is that many of its provisions could be and ought to be omitted or the subject matter merely mentioned and if further desirable restrictions or powers would be needed they could be secured by ordinance. Said ordinances would be enforceable because the right to do so being simply mentioned in the charter. W. B. Munro in his book entitled Government of American Cities, pages 78-79 regarding phraseology of charters says

"The every day rules that ought to find observance in the framing of ordinary statutes need to be scrupulously observed in the drafting of corporate charters. The meaning of a provision is too often hidden in a mass of legal verbiage which seems to have for its aim the violation of every rule of English composition. This is because charter-makers usually copy, so far as possible, the phraseology of something already upon the statute book, which has, in turn, borrowed the language of something that went before. An avoidance of all technical terms, the use of short sentences, and the policy of saying no more than is necessary to render a provision intelligible to ordinary citizens."

Quoting from the same book, page 80, we get the following.

"The exact situation has been tersely stated by the leading American authority on the law of municipal corporations. 'It is a general and undisputed proposition of law that a municipal corporation possesses and can exercise the following powers and on others: First, those granted in express words; second, those necessarily or fairly implied in or incident to the powers expressly granted; third, those essential to the declared objects and purposes of the corporation,—not simply convenient, but indispensable.' More later.

Where one is habituated to eating three meals a day, regardless of either hunger or appetite, he becomes enslaved to the habit. No such person can long be healthy. The stomach and alimentary canal are bound to become weakened and diseased. As I have repeatedly stated, no food should be eaten unless there is a distinct enjoyment in the eating; and it is equally important that one should never compel himself to eat against his desire.

However, it does not follow as an invariable rule that appetite is a safe guide, for most of us have had abnormal appetites developed in us. A fast is the grandest thing in the world to free us from this enslavement of appetite-habit. And the best way to begin is to cut off one meal, a day—say breakfast—until the clamor of habit-appetite is silenced. If you cannot miss one of the regular meals to which you have been accustomed without distress and discomfort—headache, nervous irritation, or nausea—rest assured you are not in a healthy condition. You, not your stomach and appetite, should be the master. And this is a mental as well as a physical slavery. Get free as soon as you can.

Experience demonstrates that habit makes abstinence from food easier than it is to eat at meal times when you are not hungry. Learn then, to go without breakfast, and see what its effects will be. And by the way, look for a moment at that word "break-fast." How much of a fast has there been to break when one eats a hearty dinner at six, goes to the theatre or concert, takes a supper afterwards in order "to help me sleep," and then feels he must eat again at 7.30 or 8 in the morning? The undigested mass of his last night's dinner and supper are still in his intestines, generating poisons which the blood carries to all parts of the body as disease and discomfort breeders. Hence to such a man the word breakfast is a misnomer. There has been no fast to break.
