the meadows in the valleys. He counted nearly 100 within a quarter of a mile of his home the other day.

"There are lots of deer in our section of the county," said Parker, "and they seem to be on the increase. There were as many killed during the last season as usual, but I doubt if the slaughter is anywhere near the increase."

"There are few mountain lions in this section to molest the deer, and it seems that the coyotes were not so bad after them this year as last. However, I don't believe that coyotes have diminished in any numbers. It has been an open winter and the wild dogs have

lived on jack rabbits and other small animals. Last year our country was infested with a band of deer eating coyotes, but trappers and hunters got the most of them."

"Coyotes are very much hunted. You will find sheep-killing dogs, and dogs that do not. If a band of coyotes start killing deer, they keep it up. I am under the impression that we have got the jack rabbit eating kind of coyotes now, and the deer will get a rest unless heavy snows should fall."
