There is, however, one phase of existence from which wisdom is noticeably absent and at which folly so predominates that it may be said to be almost in complete control.

Investigations made by life insurance companies show that the people of the United States spend annually \$1,000,000,000 on hospitals, nurses, patent medicines and doctors' bills and lose another \$1,000,000,000 in production through illnesses which are either preventable or are easily eradicated if tackled at the outset.

Hersey, director of the United States Weather Bureau here, has warned farmers not to plant crops that will depend greatly on heavy rainfalls in the next two or three months. He added: "Every bit of water we now have should be conserved for the permanent crops, such as orchards."

So serious is the situation that authorities are checking up the leaks at Pasadena and a warning issued that all found wasting water will be prosecuted and sentenced to jail.

Conditions in Oregon and in southern California afford a marked contrast. It is decidedly in favor of Oregon. A short time ago every available minister of the gospel was marshalled into a mighty force to exhort God to send rain to districts farther north in California.

"SAY IT WITH MUSIC" The treasons, stragems and spoils of war are giving place to the concord of sweet sounds on the shores of the

Adriatic, whose waters seem to possess the happy faculty of reconciling the artistic and the active elements in human life. 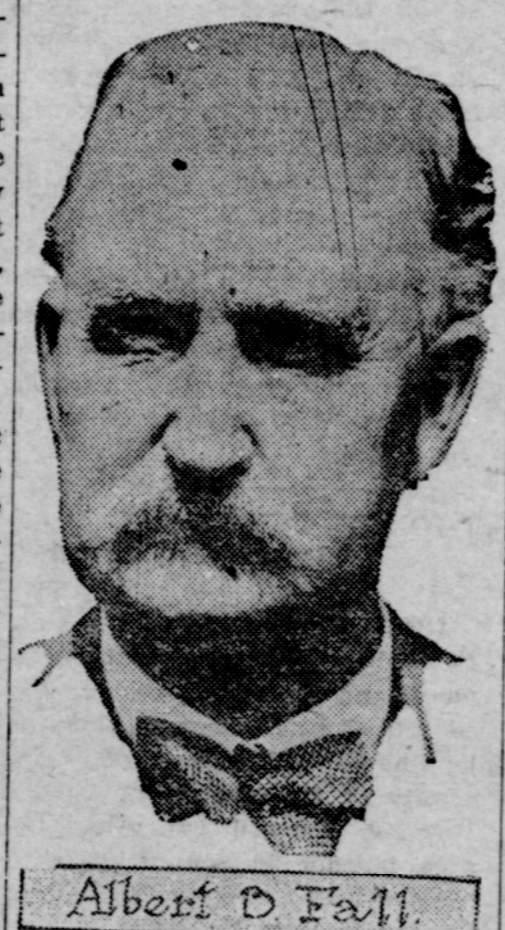

Fall Won Fame by Attack on Wilson Mexican Policy

Albert Bacon Fall, former Secretary of the Interior in the Harding Cabinet, who leased the rich Elk Hills, California, and Teapot Dome, Wyoming, naval oil reserve lands to E. F. Doheny and Harry F. Sinclair, respectively, first gained national prominence when, as a Senator from New Mexico, he led the bitter assault in the Senate upon the late Woodrow Wilson's Mexican policy.

In one of the most dramatic speeches ever delivered in the Senate, Fall, who had valuable mine and oil holdings in the south-republic, demanded on March 9, 1914, armed invasion by the United States into Mexico to protect American interests.

Asked Armed Invasion The Senate sat enthralled through his passionate plea, portraying a reign of terror in Mexico that had resulted in the destruction of millions of dollars of American property, he said.

Harding Appointee. Doheny drifted to California, Fall returned to a ranch in New Mexico, where he held numerous public offices before coming to Washington, being elected to the Senate by the Legislature on March 27, 1912. He remained continuously in the Senate until called to the Cabinet by the late President Harding.

During the Spanish-American War Fall rose to the captaincy of Company H, First Territorial Volunteer Infantry. Fall was a close friend of Theodore Roosevelt, who after the war, appointed him Attorney-General of New Mexico.

Fall's political career was varied. He began as a Democrat, changed to a Progressive to support Roosevelt, but came to the Senate as a Republican. In the Senate Fall, an able orator, was recognized as one of the leading authorities on international law. He learned law by self-instruction and gained considerable prominence when practising between 1889 and 1904.

TO DEDICATE MEMORIAL AT DUNSMUIR FRIDAY

DUNSMUIR, Calif., Feb. 21.—Epps Post, American Legion, will formally dedicate the drinking fountain presented by the local Knights of Pythias lodge, in honor of the Siskiyou boys who served in the world war. The ceremonies will be held on Washington's Birthday.
