## Hints From a House-Wife's Kitchen Diary



### Some Tasty Dishes You Can Make

**A DELICIOUS MINT JELLY FOR MEATS**

Many housewives have learned, from government bulletins or otherwise, about pectin, which is the active constituent which makes jellies set. They also know how pectin can be added to the juices of fruits which are deficient in this respect, thus insuring perfect jellies.

But home-made pectin has other uses as well. For instance, with the addition of a little favoring matter, it makes an ideal mint jelly to serve with lamb and other meats, whether hot or cold. There are two kinds of pectin, that made with apples and that made with the white skin of oranges and lemons.

Use six large, thick-skinned oranges. Peel off, as thinly as you can, the yellow part of the rind and then take off all the white skin and grind it in a food chopper. Add to this the juice of two lemons and two cups of water. Heat this slowly and boil for five minutes. In the wrap each piece separately in wax paper. Incidentally, you will find that the labor of "cleaning up" is a great deal less if you have used an enameled ware saucepan for the cooking, since even the stickiest mixtures do not adhere long to its porcelain-like surface.

**HOW THE ENGLISH MAKE TOFFEE**

Speaking of children, was there ever a child who didn't like toffee? If more of these old-fashioned candies were made at home there would be fewer cases of spoiled stomachs in our households and fewer young men and women who take tablets for "indigestion."

The best toffee is made in this manner: Mix four cups of brown sugar and half a cup of corn syrup with half a cup of water, and put on the fire, stirring carefully until the sugar is dissolved. Let this come to a boil and then take off the fire and add four tablespoons of butter. Put the mixture back on the stove once more and boil until the butter has penetrated throughout the candy. Pour onto a greased enameled ware tray of any kind and, as the candy cools, mark it into squares. When it has hardened break these apart and wrap each piece separately in wax paper. Incidentally, you will find that the labor of "cleaning up" is a great deal less if you have used an enameled ware saucepan for the cooking, since even the stickiest mixtures do not adhere long to its porcelain-like surface.

**CANDIED "SWEETS" IN THE REAL OLD SOUTHERN STYLE**

The Southern housewife is the one who knows how to prepare sweet potatoes so beautifully golden brown and so deliciously candied that they fairly melt in your mouth. Here is the way to cook them: Boil three or four medium-sized potatoes; peel and slice them and place the slices in an enameled ware baking dish. In a saucepan put half a cup of water, a cup of brown sugar and two tablespoons of butter and cook this mixture until it forms a thick syrup. Add barely a pinch of salt and pour this over the sliced potatoes in the baking dish. Cover and put in a moderate oven for fifteen minutes; then take off the cover and bake a few minutes longer to brown the potatoes on top. Serve from the enameled ware baking dish, which is sturdy enough for the kitchen and attractive enough for the dining room.

**PRUNE-LEMON JELLY. YOU'LL WANT AGAIN**

Here is a delightful children's dessert, either for an ordinary meal or as a treat at a party for little folks. Incidentally, it will be enjoyed by older persons as well, for it is a welcome variation upon the usual gelatin desserts to which all of us are accustomed.

### Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

Muscular exercise is absolutely essential not only for the development and strength of the muscular system itself, but for the sake of maintaining that tone and activity of the functional system which makes for perfect health. There are many of those who have such good health that they lose interest in the thought of health for its own sake, forgetting that there is such a thing as ill health and whose chief active interest in exercise has to do with the desire for robust physical strength. But yet others there are, who lacking in physical energy and health, are merely anxious to gain the latter, and simply wish to "feel well," so that they may accomplish their work and enjoy their pleasures, without any special interest in the attainment of bodily strength. To such it is necessary to make clear and to emphasize the fact that health and strength really go together, that they cannot be so readily divorced, and that in order to enjoy anything like a normal condition of health or of nervous energy, working energy, it is essential to take such daily muscular exercise as will build up and strengthen the body until it is physically perfect, and a robust and splendid example of animal life.

There are many forms and systems of exercise which answer the purpose with absolute satisfaction, and though there are some which have faults and are inferior to others, it is because they depart from the natural order of normal physical effort. In the endeavor to overcome something unique and distinctive, various small order specialists have devised what are supposed to be remarkable methods of muscular development, their advantage and value being greatly exaggerated by the necessities of advertising and selling, but in no case will one secure any instruction along this line more helpful and beneficial than the exercises and suggestions we have given from time to time.

Exercises of this sort will turn frequently from one method of exercise to another for the sake of variety, in order to be certain of using all muscles in every possible way and thereby acquiring the most symmetrical development of all parts.

Producer Desired Realism, So Church Was Recruited; Entire Congregation Takes Part

"Realism, even though it entails trouble and expense," is one of the mottoes of J. K. One of the early scenes of the picture takes place in a typical small town church. The easiest means of getting an interior of such a type of church would have been to have built a section of it on the studio stage.

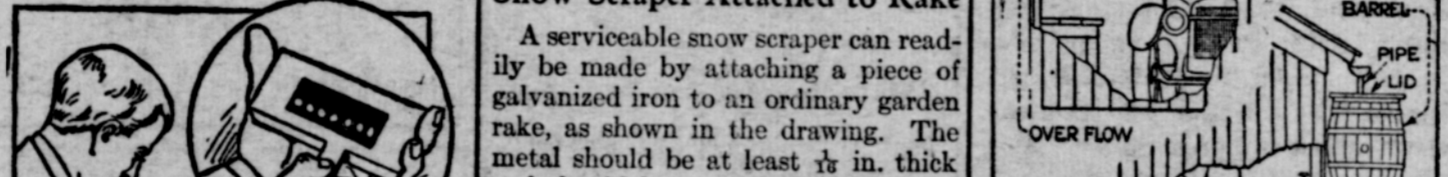

## What the World Is Doing

**Pocket Chart Tests Blood by Color Match**  
Tests of the blood can be made by matching its color with those shown on a vest-pocket chart that has lately



the wire taut and at the same time prevent its being broken so easily. In some cases it may be desirable to have springs at both ends of the aerial.

**Snow Scraper Attached to Rake**  
A serviceable snow scraper can readily be made by attaching a piece of galvanized iron to an ordinary garden rake, as shown in the drawing. The metal should be at least 1/2 in. thick and should be cut to the dimensions given in the upper detail. Short cuts are made at the points indicated and the strips between these cuts bent out as shown in the lower drawing. The loops thus formed should be made so that the tines of the rake must be forced into them, thus preventing the scraper from falling off the rake.



**East-Bound Ships Lighter than Those Going West**  
Scientific experiments to ascertain the possible effect of the direction in which a ship is going upon its weight-carrying capacity, recently made by a prominent scientist, resulted in his conclusion that a 2,000-ton vessel traveling east off's 400 pounds less resistance to the water current than it does when west-bound. This calculation, it is said, is based upon the influence of centrifugal force, which is greater when a body is riding with the tide in the direction in which the earth revolves, than when heeded the other way.

**Safeguarding the Aerial**  
Frequently a single-wire aerial is strung between the house and a nearby tree, and the winging of the tree in storm, often breaks the wire or pulls it out of the support at the other end. A good method of overcoming this trouble is to place an ordinary screen door spring between the end of the aerial and the house. This will keep

A scraper of this kind costs much less than a manufactured one, and, if properly made, serves the purpose just as well.

**Water Supply for Private Garage**  
Rain water is ideal for use in automobile radiators, as it is free from most of the scale-forming chemicals and salts present in well and hydrant water. Two convenient methods of storing rain water in readiness for use are shown in the drawing. The upper figure shows how a half barrel may be arranged on a shelf inside the garage, at a height that will permit the water to flow into the radiator. A gutter is run along the edge of the roof and a

small tap pipe from the gutter is brought through the wall as shown, so that the water will drain into the barrel. A short length of pipe, fitted with a valve, is fitted through the side near the bottom and a length of rubber hose is attached as shown. An overflow pipe is also provided. In garages where there is not enough space to permit the installation described above, a barrel may be mounted on a stand outside of the garage as shown in the lower figure. In both cases a fine sieve must be provided in the pipe leading from the gutter, to catch a y foreign matter. The inside of the container should be washed out occasionally.

**Drying Clothes in Cold Weather**  
During cold weather clothes hung out on the line to dry become stiff, due to the frozen moisture in them, and in attempting to remove the clothes are frequently torn at the corners. This danger can be eliminated by hanging the clothes on wire clothes-hangers of the kind used extensively by cleaners. The clothes are hung on the line. To keep them separated evenly, a number of old yardsticks or laths are used, holes being drilled in them about 3 in. apart, and the hooks of the hangers passed through the holes before they are hung on the line. The clothes are brought in on the hangers and allowed to thaw out before taken off. This method also obviates the usual discomfort of cold hands.
