SCHOOL BONDS ARE VOTED AT EUGENE

EUGENE, Feb. 21.—At a special school election here today the proposal to issue \$250,000 bonds for two new junior high school buildings carried by a vote of 575 to 459. The plans are to erect one building of 24 rooms in the western part of the city and one of 12 rooms in the eastern section.

Architects will be employed at once and construction will be started in time to finish the structures by next fall.

Landscape Group

The landscape group represented by Mrs. Satchwell set all present to thinking by the straightforward report that had been worked out by that division.

Just here the order of the hour was set aside and Judge Gardner announced that the county court had been able to provide means whereby an assistant county agent and club leader can be brought in to assist County Agent Cate in carrying out the work outlined by the conference.

Dairy Committee Reports

Dairyming presented by Ralph Billings, brought out the needs of an industry that is just now up-fermost in the minds of our people. It was shown that this line of work offers, probably the best opportunity for development of any phase of agricultural activity. Suggestions were made for improving dairy stock, for producing a better quality of cream, and for marketing the farmer's product.

Land Settlement

H. S. Walther presented the findings of the land settlement group. It proved a big subject and the report should be read in full to be appreciated. The spirit of fairness ran through the whole report and gave all who heard it a feeling that the suggestions offered were of a constructive nature.

Livestock Report

The livestock men sent in a report that showed they had not lost heart and that they were planning to go forward, watching the corners a little more closely and at the same time building more efficiently the future of the business might be on a more substantial basis. They reported as not favoring a bear preserve at Crater Lake, or the increase of the fees for range privileges. F. C. Homes gave the report for the stockmen.

Horticultural Program
