Editor Tidings:

Pursuance of the articles I have given you in the last several weeks we contribute the following quotation from "The Ninth Year Book of the City Association," under the head of "New Government in an Old City by Louis Brownlow," Petersburg, Va.

"The accomplishments of the new order in municipal affairs may be measured against the background of two and a half centuries of community life. Petersburg began its corporate career in 1784, but it then was more than fifty years old under its present name and had had a community existence since 1640. Even before there was a Petersburg, first so named in 1733, there was a Blandford and Blandford was incorporated into Petersburg under the first charter in 1784. Last summer when a playground pavilion was being dedicated in a new park in Blandford one of the citizens made a speech. He was not accustomed to making speeches, for most of the men who live in Blandford have much more of hard work in their lives than they have talk, but he was called upon. His speech was this: "The new government has done more for Blandford in two years than the old did for it in a hundred years."

For exactly one hundred and forty-six years Blandford had separate representation in the city council as a ward For two and a half years there has been no ward representation in the council, and Blandford doesn't happen to have a member in the new government.

In the space of two years Blandford has gained a mile of hard surface roadway paving where it had none before except a quarter of a mile built during the World War to connect with the road to Camp Lee. It has severe and water laid through every street save one, and that has meant the elimination of 325 surface toilets. It has a mile of surface treated oil roads where before it had none. It has a new park—the land was given to the city a half century ago but it was used as only a garbage and rubbish dump—and a playground. It has a play pavilion and by summer time in 1923 it will have a concrete swimming pool. Its principal street, which was paved with cobbles that came in ballast from England before the days of steam, is replaced by a concrete roadway bordered by trees dedicated to the memory of the Petersburg boys who died in France and Flanders, and a handsome bronze marker makes of each tree an individual memorial. Much the same could be written of other sections of the city that were neglected. Even more might be written of the exclusively negro sections. There isn't time to tell the story in detail."

"Citizens think in city wide terms."

"But here is the place to set down the fact that the great accomplishment of the new government is that it has wiped out ward lines and the people now think in city-wide terms and have substituted city loyalty for ward loyalty."

"Politics eliminated from administrative Agencies"

"The second most important accomplishment of the new government in Petersburg is that it has eliminated politics from the administrative agencies of the municipality."

In Petersburg, as elsewhere, there has been much talk of applying business methods in government. In the old days the average citizen never looked at his city government, with both eyes open; he closed one and paid his taxes and complained bitterly that the government wasted the money it wrung from the purses of its citizens, and then he closed that eye, opened the other, and sold something to a city employee to be charged to the city, gently marking up the price about twenty-five per cent. Under the old order any city employee could go into any store and buy anything at any price and have the city pay for it—there was waste. Now, of course, there is a central purchasing system and a modern accounting system, and things are weighed and counted and tested before they are accepted and paid for.

The things done, numerous as they are and proud of them as we are, are not so important as the accomplishments that made it possible for us to do things."

The accomplishment referred to was the adoption of a new charter

Said adoption created a new government in an old city and it was through her, Miss Petersburg, that the elimination of politics from administrative agencies was accomplished.

As on the 18th of this month a proposed city charter was filed with the City Recorder of Ashland containing 414 names of legal voters of the City of Ashland calling for a special election on April 18th for the adoption of said charter, the adoption of which would give to us a new city government, not administration, would it not be well for the electorate of Ashland to pay serious attention to the proposal, so they may vote intelligently? In light of the above quotations and the foregoing proposition and comparing the things that are, with that which might be, we are writing this for their benefit.
