BIG PLANE TO SPAN SEA, CARRYING 200

Mammoth of the Air to Fly from Rio to Rome; Would Be 426 Feet Long

ROME, Feb. 27.—A monster aeroplane carrying 200 passengers from Rio de Janeiro to Rome in 60 hours is the ambitious proposal of Nicola Santo, the eminent Italian engineer, who founded the aerodome at Santa Cruz, which he has submitted to a firm with which he is connected at Rio.

Signor Santo has designed a new type of aeroplane, which, he claims, will be the largest in the world, and it is by this machine that he proposes to attempt the Rio to Rome flight.

The aeroplane will be 426 feet long 153 feet wide and about 49 feet high and will be furnished with 16 "Flat" 700-horsepower engines, with a similar number of propellers.

The machine will have accommodation for 200 passengers and a large quantity of goods, and Signor Santo is confident that the aeroplane, given fair weather, could accomplish the flight in two and a half days.

Air Is Stuffy

"Hereafter we were escorted up two or three staircases and locked up in another large room. The air in there was impenetrably sultry and stuffy. There are windows on both sides, but strong iron bars prevented us from opening them. I hardly dared to move. I was afraid of getting soiled by the dirt covering floor, walls and benches of this room.

"After several hours' waiting, which seemed to us an eternity, we were released from this torture, but only to be subjected to a new one—the cross-examination began. We were asked every imaginable question as to where we came from, where we wanted to live, what the object of our visit was, etc. Very often people lied, supposing that this would help them to get their passports more easily. But after a prolonged cross examination they got perturbed and contradicted their former statements. Whatever you say is being put down in shorthand and carefully investigated afterward.

"At 4 p. m. we were directed to the dining hall. The tables there were covered with paper dishcloths. First thing we did was to tear off a bit of paper and have our cups, plates, knives and forks cleaned with it. There was plenty of food, but just that kind to 'feed the masses.'

Very Little Comfort

"Passengers of the second class enjoy the privilege of spending their daytime in separate rooms of smaller size. Natives of the same country usually keep together. There is a German quarter, a French quarter, etc.

"On the whole there is very little comfort; a table, two or three benches and a luggage stand, also a very primitive toilet. No beds—at least in the second and third class—just bunks arranged in two or three rows above each other.

WEED NEGRESS SHOT IN RIGHT KNEE

WEED, Calif., Feb. 27.—Mrs. Richard Robinson, colored, was taken to the Weed Hospital shot through the right knee. Both she and her husband, who was in the house at the time she was shot, claimed the shooting was accidental and that the revolver was in her own hands. While her condition is serious, it is thought she will recover. Mrs. Robinson recently returned to Weed to live with her husband, after spending some months in Oroville and Medford.

TO RE-SENTENCE EVANS TO DEATH ON GALLOWS

SALEM, Feb. 27.—Abraham Evans, who is in the state penitentiary here under death sentence for the murder of James Doran of McMinnville, will be taken to The Dalles today where he will be re-sentenced to hang.

Evans originally was arrested and tried more than two years ago, but later appealed his case to the supreme court for final determination. The supreme court affirmed the verdict of the lower court, and the mandate in the case was issued last Saturday.

Evans killed Doran while the two men were traveling near The Dalles in an automobile.
