GIRL VICTIMS ARE PICKED FOR ROBBERY

"Lounge Lizard," Dance Partner and Woman 'Vulture' Spy on Them.

WAIT RIGHT MOMENT

When "Moth" Has Taken Too Much Drink "Rough Guys" Enter Rooms.

EDITOR'S NOTE—This is the second of a series of three articles dealing with the underworld of New York as it affects recent murder mysteries.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 29.

The still hunt of the police for the master minds behind the New York underworld's "war on women," in their efforts to clear up the mystery of the brutal robbery and murder of pretty Louise Lawson, the Texas music student, has brought out some amazing facts for those who believed that the Tenderloin was a thing of the past.

The fashionably dressed "spotters" are the first link in the new crime chain against women from out of town who display jewelry on Broadway. They are of three classes—the "lounge lizard," suave, polite, irresistible; the hired dancing partner, whom fashionable visitors with husbands too busy to entertain them, pay by the week to follow them about from cafe to cafe and dance with them; and the woman vulture, who makes their acquaintance at cafes, dances, theatres.

Retinue of Thugs.

Then there are the cafe owners, the waiters, many of whom are well versed in the crimes of the old days; rat-faced taxi-drivers, who cruise around in the early morning hours watching for intoxicated fashionable persons coming from cabarets; the beauty parlors and fake doctors, who prey on the girls because of their wealthy admirers and their easy money.

Perhaps the woman "spotter" is the most interesting. She makes the acquaintance of the girls, learns the amount of their jewelry, gets their addresses, and then some early morning, after a particularly gay party, where the victims have mixed the vile hoot of the bootlegger with the virile vine of success, the quiet tip goes out.

Enter "Rough Guy."

The rest is up to the "rough guys"—to gain entrance into the fashionable apartments of the girls by disguising themselves, as they did in the Lawson case, as bootleggers with presents of liquor from wealthy admirers, or by other ruses. Then comes the robbery, which in the cases of Louise Lawson and Dot King resulted in murder—carelessness, perhaps in binding the gag too tight—but what is a life in the underworld? A woman's life, eh? Well, what of it?

But the old Tenderloin wouldn't have stooped to murder a girl for a few jewels.

"Moths" Watched.

"There is no doubt but that these stylishly dressed Apaches of the new underworld are spotting foolish girls who love to dance, drink and wear too much jewelry," says Lieutenant John Griffin, head of detectives in the West Forty-seventh street police station, in which district the Great White Way is located. "But they are being spotted in the theatres and hotel lobbies as well as in the cafes. When we can definitely connect the various arms of this machine there will be arrests, but right now we haven't got a thing on a single one of them. They are high grade crooks and mighty clever."

NEWS LETTER

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 28.—San Quentin's death house is overcrowded and there are prospects that the state prison's hanging facilities soon will be overtaken.

Nine men now occupy cells in the condemned men's row. Its capacity has been stretched from five, which used to be the maximum number waiting death.

Several of the nine may have long residence in their death cells. They have appeals pending, favorable action on which would remove them to pleasanter quarters, while denial of their pleas will mean emptying of their cells by the hangman's route.

San Quentin has two gallows, but double hangings have been rare. As a result one of the gallows is in a state of disrepair. Three men are scheduled to die the same day in March, but Ward James Johnson will endeavor to have the courts revise the dates as he declared it will be difficult to provide facilities for a triple hanging.

Not alone is the death row becoming overpopulated. The prison population is increasing at such a rate that it has been necessary to place orders for 800 double deck beds with which to fill cells in the new house. More than 200 inmates are now quartered in the corridors of the cell houses because of lack of cell space. The double-deck beds, each the width of a cot, will provide space for 800 additional prisoners, but at the rate the population—now 2,990—is growing they will all be occupied by the end of the year. The rapidly increasing population brings a problem of having enough work to go around. The prison industries provide employment for 2,600. The other 300 are kept busy at odd tasks.

California not long ago reduced automobile licenses to a flat \$3 on all makes of pleasure cars and enacted a tax of two cents a gallon on gasoline. The flat tax provided popular with motorists and the gasoline tax was received with favorable comment, as it distributed the road tax on the road users quite equitably. Now that the system is working well, motorists are faced with the possibility that their tax burden may be vastly increased. According to the State Highway statisticians the state should raise some \$20,000,000 a year for the proposed road program, which would give California the finest highway system in the world. It is figured that this can be done by increasing the flat registration tax from \$3 to \$10 or \$15 a year and the gasoline tax to three cents a gallon. A special commission is studying the state highway system with a view to determining what main roads and laterals should properly constitute the State Highway system. They will recommend to the next legislature a road program and a taxation program to carry it out.

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CREATE FISH RESERVE AT DIAMOND LAKE

ROSEBURG, Feb. 28.—Approximately one-third of Diamond lake has been closed to fishing by order of the Oregon state game commission, effective March 8. The entire northern end of the lake is in the reserve set aside to provide a refuge for the fish and to maintain the hatchery there as the largest egg-making station in the world.

The line marking the waters to be eliminated from the fishing district runs from a point about 300 feet north of the mouth of Two Bear creek, where the new hotel and campgrounds are located in a southwesterly direction to a point about a mile and a half north of the mouth of Siletz creek.

Jewett Here Again

Stanley G. Jewett, connected with the United States biological survey, is in town for several days to visit government trappers that are operating in Klamath county in an effort to destroy predatory animals. Jewett's activities are confined almost entirely to extinction of the predatory animals of Oregon such as the coyote, the bobcat, cougar and predatory bear. —Klamath Falls Herald.

The lure of gold is as strong as in the days of the Mother Lode and the Alaska gold rushes. —But today it is through science that men seek wealth from the waste of the miners of '49. The latest development is a process through which its sponsors claim untold new wealth may be taken from the shifting sands of the sea and from the workings of abandoned mines.

Gold in extremely fine particles exists in the sands tributary to the California rivers which flow to the sea from the Mother Lode country, and also in the great worked over heaps which now mark the scenes of the activities of the forty-niners and their successors.

But no economical process of extracting this gold had been developed. Many years of securing it have from time to time been advanced by inventors, but always the cost exceeded the value of the gold.

Now Charles McBride, chemist, and H. O. Jacobson and W. W. Brown, mining engineers, are claimed to have invented a process whereby the gold may be extracted at a cost low enough to provide a handsome profit thru the use of mercury. This is an elaboration of the present use of mercury in the mining industry and, according to E. N. McNown, who is interested in practical tests of the invention, it is past the experimental stage.

Favorite Recipes

PIE

The Great American Dessert. Americans have a reputation for pie eating. Foreigners come to this country expecting to see it served at least once in each meal including breakfast. They find that the "pie for breakfast" vogue is going out, but otherwise they are not disappointed.

Good pie is something that almost everyone likes. When it is made right with a light, flaky tender crust and just the right kind of filling it is perfectly delicious and wholesome.

Many persons think they cannot make good pies because they haven't the "knack". They don't realize how easy it is to learn the secret. As a result they either make pies that are just fair, or they make their families go without. Some one ought to borrow the idea from the old cream advertisement and advise them "Don't envy a good pie. Use the following rules and have one."

Pie is a splendid winter dessert because of its high fuel value. It is easy to make and it gives variety. There is almost no limit to the number of different fillings that can be used. The following directions for making pie crust can be used for any kind of pie.

To Make Pie Crust.

Have all materials cold and keep them cold until the pie is in the oven.

Cut the shortening into the flour with knives or a biscuit cutter. Use a dough that can be rolled. A rather dry crumbly dough makes a tenderer crust that one that is too wet. Do not handle it any more than is necessary.

Roll the dough out lightly on a floured board. Avoid pressing down on the rolling pin. Be careful not to let the dough stick to the board.

The oven should be very hot. After the first ten minutes or so, if the filling needs to be cooked, the temperature of the oven should be lowered.

A fruit pie that is made with raw fruit, such as apples, needs fairly long slow cooking after the first 10 minutes. For the pie with a filling that is already cooked, the oven should be kept hot. A pie

Quantity For a Two Crust Pie

1 1/2 cup bread flour or 1 1/2 cup pastry flour; 1/2 cup shortening, cold; 1/2 tsp. salt, about 1-3 cup cold water.

Sift the flour once before measuring. Mix in the salt. Cut the fat into the flour. Add the cold water slowly, using as little as possible. Divide the dough in half. Roll out on floured board.

If the dough starts to stick, lift it up with a knife and spread a little more flour over the board. Use the rolling pin very lightly. When the crust is the proper size and thickness fold it in half and slip it on the tin. Trim the edges and pierce the crust with a knife or fork. Put in the filling, roll out the top crust and put it in place. Pierce the upper crust so that steam can escape.

Bake in a pretty hot oven (450° F) for 10-15 minutes and then lower the temperature to about (350°) and bake until the crust is a golden brown and the inside is cooked. This will require different amounts of time, according to the kind of filling.

Fruit Pies.

Sweeten the fruit to taste. If the fruit is very sweet or if it lacks tartness add lemon juice. Cranberries, currants, gooseberries, sour cherries and the like, require plenty of sugar. Prune and raisin pies are greatly improved by the addition of lemon juice, because they are rather rich and sweet without it.

Lemon Filling

1-1 1/2 cups sugar; 6 tbs. flour (level); 1/4 tsp. salt; 1 cup hot water; 4 egg yolks; 1 tbs. butter; 1 large lemon (juice & rind). Mix the sugar, flour and salt together; add half the water. Make a smooth paste and add the rest of the water. Cook 15 minutes in a double boiler; add the beaten yolks. Cook five minutes, remove, add the lemon juice and cool.
