SAVING A VALUABLE ASSET

A week from Wednesday marks the date of the special city election called for the purpose of approving or rejecting a bond issue of \$10,000, proposed for the enlargement and improvement of the tourist auto camp at Lithia park. The verdict will exert a tremendous influence upon the future of Ashland. During recent months, and many months past for that matter, the ears of Ashland people have been tickled with the numerous reports that float in from over the state and the nation commending the Ashland spirit in planning and providing parks and auto camps. These compliments come from near and far, and are such to indicate beyond a shadow of doubt that the funds invested in these assets have given excellent returns. But, as was stated a few days ago by Mayor Loomis, Ashland can not survive, grow and prosper on her past record, and it is imperative that we be alert and continue the same progressive policy with respect to the park and auto camp that has characterized Ashland in the past.

From every point occupying the least vantage along the main highways comes the news that extensive improvements will be made to camp grounds with a view to attracting and holding tourists. Other towns are alive to the situation, and the progressive policy that has been in vogue in Ashland has been, to a large degree, responsible for the awakening along this line. The activities in other towns are such that there is no mistaking the fact that they are out to command tourist trade.

The Tidings previously called attention to the fact that within a comparatively short time the Redwood and Roosevelt highways will be completed, and the increasing stream of tourists will not have to travel the Pacific highway south of Grants Pass because of necessity. Within two years there will be two highways in competition with the Pacific, and the only way by which we can hold the traffic we already enjoy and through which we can hope to increase travel is to adopt a liberal program of park and tourist camp development. The tourist will follow the route affording the best and most comfortable accommodations. He will not be interested so much in what accommodations have been as in what they are.

Lithia park and the tourist camp in Ashland are known far and wide. It would be difficult to estimate in dollars and cents the value Ashland has received in advertising because of these, and to neglect to properly maintain, enlarge and improve these, will be to neglect one of the town's most valuable assets. There is no time to lose. The period of competition is here and the communities that act promptly will reap their reward this year not only, but for the next decade to come.

A MUSICAL EVENT

The Music Memory Contest that is beginning in the public schools of the city this week has an important community value, for it means that the children are becoming familiar with the compositions of the best musical minds of Modern times. For a child to be able to recognize, on hearing them, representative works of Chopin, Beethoven, Grieg, MacDowell, Nevin, Rubenstein, Dvorak—to take names at random from the school contest list—represents a permanent musical gain that will affect the members of that child's family circle and its friends, and will create interest in good music among many people who would otherwise never know that the melodies of the masters are infinitely more satisfying than the melodies of the sentimental song writers or dance composers of the day. We believe that the Memory Contest is the best approach to the subject of musical culture.

It is hoped that the parents will give this contest their attention. If it is successful it should be repeated next year. The prizes are worth striving for. These contests have been held elsewhere as a part of a national movement for advancement in music; so in moving forward by means of it the city is simply keeping pace with other upward-looking communities in the Nation.

Tells How \$18,000,000 in Money From U. S. Was Spent in Russia

THAT the sum of \$18,000,000, a substantial part for non-sectarian purposes, has gone into Russia for relief work through the activities of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee has just been made public in a report by James N. Rosenberg, Vice-Chairman.

These figures will give some idea of the size of all the American relief undertakings in Russia, to which the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee so largely



contributed:
912,000 tons of food and seed shipped in 237 vessels.
10,500,000 persons fed at one time at peak of famine.
13,592 institutions furnished with medical supplies.
6,400,000 inoculations made under direction of A. R. A.
1,300,000 vaccinations to prevent typhoid, paratyphoid and smallpox.

Dr. Joseph Rosen, who has been Reconstruction Director for the Joint Distribution Committee in Russia, has made a remarkable report of his reconstruction work done under the supervision of the Reconstruction Committee of which Col. Herbert H. Lehman is chairman. About 150,000 acres were plowed by 86 tractors sent from the U. S., and farmers were taught to till the soil, their seed stations produced enough pure

bred seed to plant 2,000,000 acres, and many seed loans were made. There were distributed 3,000 horses, 50 stallions, 400 oxen, 1,000 cows and 50 bulls. Cheese making co-operatives were organized in 32 places. 1,000 plows, 2,000 harrows and other farm tools were distributed. Many new houses were built, and wells drilled, and sanitary work done to benefit 40,000 families. Much assistance was also given along the lines of co-operative buying leather, wood, and metal working, and trade school work. In co-operation with other branches of the relief, approximately a dozen trades were taught to about 4,000 boys and girls. The Jews in Russia are rapidly availing themselves of the opportunity, now once again given them, to return to the tillage of the soil, their ancient and historic labor.
