The responsibility of the home unit was followed through to the logical conclusion. The interdependence of all classes was shown and real democracy defined. The present period of reconstruction, and woman's part that is being, and is to be played in the movement for peace and stabilization, was called to the attention of the Club, and the speaker suggested that the vote was the best weapon forced to obtain results.

The elimination of non-essentials and concentration of effort on things for better state and country, and the study of the background of politics was another suggestion.

The attention of the Club was called to two bills: "McCormick's Child Labor Law" and Capper's bill on "Marriage and Divorce Laws" and the support of both suggested.

Jury service, law enforcement, rather than new laws, was touched upon; that respect for law must be solidly back of its enforcement and that this respect for law must originate in the home was emphasized.

The causes of delinquency were sketched and the speaker stated in no uncertain may that the solution lay in the "Back to the Home Movement" in discipline, amusement, and that the precepts as taught in the Bible must have place again in the home to meet the needs existent today.

After the splendid address, Misses Lolita Pierson and Miss Laura Prescott gave added pleasure, by the rendition of a beautiful duet, kindly responding to encore.

Most delicious refreshments were served at the close of the pleasant evening by the gracious hostesses.

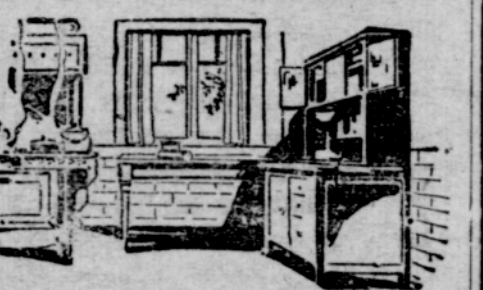

OREGON TRUNK RAIL ROAD IS ABANDONED

PORTLAND, March 5.—Abandonment of the Oregon Trunk line between South Junction and Metolus, a distance of 30 miles, has been completed by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, according to announcement made yesterday by A. J. Davidson, general manager of the system.

Saturday afternoon tearing up of the tracks, and removal of all buildings and bridges were completed. Authority for the removal of the line was granted nearly a year ago by the public service commission, because of the duplication by the line of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company. Since last August the Oregon Trunk, which is a subsidiary of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, has been using the tracks of the O. W. R. & N. company.

State highway commission awards contracts as follows: Coos county, \$72,197; Jackson county, \$61,657; Umatilla county, \$35,382.80. Commission planning to build Roosevelt highway from Newport to Agate Beach.

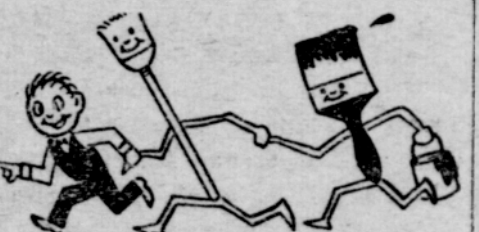
