Democrats Lambast Coolidge.
WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—Democrats launched a broadside of sarcasm and criticism at President Coolidge following the disclosures in the telegrams. Senator Harrison, of Mississippi, said that perhaps the President was accepting advice from McLean concerning his policies. He criticized the executive for keeping Attorney General Daugherty, Senator Dill, of Washington, demanded that an explanation be made why Coolidge allowed McLean to be a "go-between" himself and his secretary, Slomp.

WILL MAKE SURVEY OF VALLEY WATER PROJECT

ALBANY, Mar. 6.—Waldo Anderson, president of the Pure Water Development league which is sponsoring the plan to bring pure mountain water from Clear lake for domestic use in valley towns, has announced that active work on the pipe line and other surveys in regard to the project will probably start this week.

State Engineer Luper will have charge of the survey and will gather all data necessary to present a concrete project to the voters of the various municipalities interested in the plan. The costs of the pipe lines, storage systems and other data relative to the project will be gathered and consolidated so that the feasibility of the plan may be judged by the public.

RESIDENT OF SHASTA FOR 64 YEARS DIES

REDDING, March 6.—Thomas B. Eades, for sixty years a resident of the county died here yesterday at the age of 64 years. For seventeen years he was the mail carrier between French Gulch and Trinity Center. He came to Redding twelve years ago. Eades accumulated considerable property and owned a dozen houses in this city. Interment will be made in Lookout, Modoc County, where are buried his parents and other relatives.

PORTLAND BABY FROLICS IN BALMY SPRING AIR

PORTLAND, March 5.—Clad in little more than nature's garments, Clarence Atchison, Jr., 2 years of age, crept out of his crib and frolicked Sunday morning in the balmy spring air on the lawn surrounding his home. He wandered about the neighborhood and was found by a policeman, who returned the infant to his home. The child was none the worse for the adventure.

MANY SALEM RESIDENTS VIOLATING ORDINANCE

SALEM, Mar. 6.—Many Salem citizens, heretofore considered law-abiding, have been violating the city's ordinance, according to so-called "horseback" legal opinions given by local attorneys.

Under the provisions of the ordinance it is unlawful to play cards in a room or house where doors are locked or barricaded. Attorneys said that under this provision of the ordinance persons wishing to play cards and stay within the law should leave the doors to their homes unlocked. Otherwise they may be arrested and prosecuted.

PRIVATE AUTO CAMPS OPPOSED AT BAKER

BAKER, Mar. 6.—Steps to protect the city's investment in its tourist camp grounds were taken by a committee from the Baker county chamber of commerce yesterday, who urged the city commissioners to impose a heavy license fee on private camp grounds. It is said that land already has been leased within the city for a privately-owned tourist camp grounds. Pendleton, the committee told the commissioners, has levied an annual fee of \$1000, and Medford has leased its camp grounds at \$50 a month to combat this encroachment. Definite action is expected soon.

Etude in G Flat Major—Chopin (Butterfly Etude)

This delightful etude (study) was written by the "Poet of the Piano," Chopin. The sadness of his frail health coupled with his country's (Poland) fall probably had much to do with the poetic character of his writing. For beauty of melody and delicacy of treatment he has never been surpassed. Listen for the light, graceful melody.

Cradle Song—Brahms
A beautiful, tho simple song is this lullaby. It is said to have been an old folk tune. The accompaniment is an unusual, rocking, syncopated rhythm against which the melody quietly sings itself. Brahms was a German pianist and composer. He made his first appearance as a pianist at the age of fourteen tho he did not write songs until he was older.

PRISONER GIVEN LEAVE TO ATTEND SHEEP

RENO, Nev., March 6.—Serving a sentence of six months in the Washoe County jail for violation of the Volstead Act, Raymond Borda has been allowed temporary liberty in order to supervise his large sheep ranch near Gardnerville during the lambing season. Borda was required by Federal Judge E. S. Farrington to post a bond of \$2,000, and deposit \$200 for payment of the services of a special deputy who will keep him under supervision at the ranch.

At the end of the lambing season Borda must return to jail and complete his sentence.

Mother, Sisters and Boy Who Killed Them to Atone For His Sins

Believing he had "sinned against the Holy Ghost," nineteen-year-old Frank McDowell admits he burned his two sisters to death a year ago and shot and killed his parents recently. He was locked up in the County jail at Clearwater, Fla.

He told how, when he was nine years old, he "cursed the Holy Ghost" because the buttons were off his shirt.
Continuing, he said:
"Later at church I heard the preacher say that blasphemy against the Holy Ghost was an unforgivable sin. I wondered how I could obtain forgiveness, and the inspiration for penance occurred when I recalled words I had heard perhaps often, perhaps only a few times, which were that the soul

can hardly remember when the idea of first killing my sisters by fire, my parents by blood and then myself by water, took form.
"I think I entered the bedroom, stood in the doorway and poured or threw the gasoline, perhaps in the general direction of the bed. I ignited the gasoline, left my sisters' room and locked the door.
"Then came the anniversary of my sisters' death. I became agitated—not nervous—but disturbed in a brainstorm. I felt sick. Then my dream came Sunday.
"I saw a shape. The shape was a large cloud or sheet. I remembered this dream when I awoke Monday morning.
"Then the boy crept into his parents' room while they were sleeping and shot them to death.
