Logsdon has been bound over to the grand jury on a charge of threatening to commit a felony.

SALEM, Mar. 7.—Mrs. George Russell, who, according to a note found in her apartment by the police, recently entered into a suicide pact with her husband, has filed suit for divorce in the circuit court here against Dr. George Russell.

Mrs. Russell alleged in her complaint that her husband had been a drug addict for years prior to her marriage, but represented to her that he had been completely cured.

Shortly after their marriage, Mrs. Russell said, her husband resumed the drug habit and subsequently was committed to the state hospital for medical treatment.

CENTER AT WALLA WALLA

The principal causes of this loss were, in order of prominence, defective chimneys and flues, sparks on roofs, matches and smoking, stoves, furnaces, boilers and their pipes, and petroleum and its products. RAINFALL WAS BELOW NORMAL IN FEBRUARY

September 1 to January 1 Precipitation Was Above Normal; Cloudy Days Last Month

During the month of February Ashland had 1.36 precipitation, which is 2.64 less precipitation than the normal for the season. From September to January the rainfall was .84 above normal and since January first to date there is a shortage of 3.48, making the precipitation 2.64 below normal. There were 11 clear days, 15 cloudy, and 3 partly cloudy days. On the 13th of February the maximum temperature of 62 was reached while the maximum fell to 23 on the 24th.

AUTHORS FOR TO-DAY

Marche Militaire—Schubert

The great Austrian song writer, Franz Peter Schubert, wrote this march for a piano duet. Later, however, it was transcribed for the orchestra. It suggests a festive occasion or concert rather than the military march.

It opens with an introductory phrase which really is a part of the theme or first melody. The rhythm and swing of this introduction suggests the booming of the bass drum thundering out the march time. Then comes a new melody played by the woodwind instruments. Can you recognize the trumpets when this new melody is repeated

Bell Song from Lakme—Delibes

According to the story of the opera, "Lakme," an English officer goes to India. There he met a native Indian girl, Lakme, in the forbidden garden of her father's home. Lakme's father is a high caste Brahmin priest. The father becomes angry with the Englishman and tries to find him. He disguises Lakme as a beggar and compels her to sing in the village square so the Englishman will come when he hears her voice. She sings the "Bell Song".

Listen for the lively trills, and echo passage, and notice the ease with which she sings the high flute-like tones. The imitation of bells by the voice is remarkable—this bell imitation gives the song its name.
