RECEIPTS AT CAMP ARE DOUBLING

From January 1 to February 29 the receipts at Ashland auto camp increased 100 per cent over those of the same period in 1923. The number of automobiles registered doubled that of the same period a year ago, 200 cars having registered at the camp during the two months. This is a criterion of what Ashland can expect during the remainder of the year. More, it brings us to a realization of what we must prepare for if we are to reap the maximum of results from the growing tourist trade. It brings us to a realization that we have a duty to perform in affording proper camping facilities and comforts to the thousands who will be our guests during the year.

Heretofore our accommodations have been such that those who visited our camp became boosters for Ashland. The fame of the park and camp has been spread all over the nation, and if we can succeed in converting into boosters the tourists who are coming during the next few months the reputation of the camp will have become established on a permanent basis, and we will have taken a decided step in overcoming competition that will grow during the coming years.

This year affords Ashland the greatest opportunity in history to make friends with thousands. That the number of tourists and visitors who will spend from a day to a week within our borders this year will double that of any preceding year is evident. No reasonable individual will dispute the statement. The record of the past two months proves the truth of this portention. The volume of tourist travel is naturally increasing by leaps and bounds. Added to this increase is the announcement that the advertising campaign covering the Northwest will attract additional thousands, and we have the assurance of those who know that a million visitors will enter the borders of Oregon during 1924. What better opportunity can be desired to cash in on our resources, our unsurpassed location, and our beautiful park and auto camp?

A SPLENDID ENDORSEMENT

The unanimous endorsement given yesterday by the Kiwanis club to the \$10,000 Park bond issue is to be commended and the fact that 44 representative business and professional men voted one hundred per cent for the resolution is significant. The most encouraging feature of the action, however, is that the 44 Kiwanians not only voted unanimously for the resolution but pledged themselves to work and vote for the bond issue. No half-way endorsement characterized the action of the Kiwanis club. It was whole-hearted, loyal and the sort of endorsement that counts in the results.

Three of the commercial and civic organizations of Ashland have gone unreservedly behind the bond issue and proposed improvement: The Chamber of Commerce, Lithians and Kiwanians. The membership in the three organizations represents both a fine type and progressive body of citizens, who are not content to stand still and who are possessed of the belief that if they are to grow their city and community must prosper and grow. This is the spirit that will drive Ashland forward.

Interest and enthusiasm in behalf of the bond issue are increasing daily, and there is every indication that it will carry by a decisive vote.

THIS VERSATILE MONTH

POLAR FLIGHT IS DANGEROUS, BRITON WARNS

Experienced Explorer Has Doubts if Shenandoah Can Make Junket Safely.

FROZEN FOG IS PERIL

Arctic Mostly Water 2,000 Fathoms; Is Crater That Vomited Up Greenland.

LONDON, Mar. 6.—Grave doubts as to whether the Shenandoah will succeed in reaching the North Pole safely in case the trip is undertaken were expressed by Capt. Joseph Bernier, the famous veteran Arctic explorer, in an interview here.

A Canadian citizen, Captain Bernier has made ten expeditions to the Arctic, and has announced his intention of shortly making an

eleventh with the object of formally taking possession of the islands in the North Pole area in the name of Britain. His knowledge of that area is said by many to be unrivaled.

"To my mind," said Bernier, in discussing the Shenandoah project "the task which the Americans are setting themselves is a very great one indeed."

"Having had a very long experience of the Arctic regions, the question I ask myself is, how are the airmen proposing to overcome one of the worst difficulties, that of frozen fog?"

"The wind which comes from the South cools when it gets over the ice and freezes, with the result that a solid mass settles on everything in the vicinity, the rigging of a ship, for instance, becoming very quickly coated with a thick mass of ice."

"The encountering of such a fog is fraught with considerable danger even to a ship, but the airmen must be subject to a very grave disadvantage if they happen upon it, for it will settle thickly upon the envelope unless the navigators have an extraordinary amount of luck. In this event it may be necessary for them to

land, but all they will have below them will be pack ice, which is very rough and rugged."

"I certainly view the project as one attended by a very great amount of risk."

"In my view, the North Pole consists only of water to a depth of about 2,000 fathoms. In effect, it may be said to represent the hole caused by the eruption which led to the formation of what is now Greenland. Nasen and other explorers have helped to prove this."

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a petition of the members of the Park Commission has been presented to the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ashland praying that a special election be called to authorize bonds of the City of Ashland, Oregon to be issued in the amount of \$10,000.00 to provide funds for improvement features in and to the Ashland Municipal Auto Camp. By reason thereof, the said Mayor and Common Council, by Resolution dated February 19, 1924, duly made, and adopted, called a special election of the voters of the City of Ashland to be held March 12, 1924 for the purpose of voting on the following bonding proposition, namely:

Shall the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ashland issue "Municipal Auto Camp Improvement Bonds" of the City of Ashland up to the amount of \$10,000.00, said bonds to be of the denomination of \$1000.00 each, and numbered from one to ten inclusive, and to be serial in character, the first \$1000.00 of said issue to be made payable one year from the date thereof, and \$1000.00 made payable each year thereafter until the entire issue shall have been paid, said bonds to constitute a general obligation of the city of Ashland, and to bear interest at the rate of not more than six per cent per annum, payable semiannually until redeemable at the office of the City Treasurer of said City of Ashland, Oregon; PROVIDED, further, that the proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be expended by the Ashland Park Commission in such manner as they may deem best for the enlarging, equipping and betterment of the Ashland Municipal Auto Camp Ground; and PROVIDED, further, that from the revenues of said auto camp ground there shall be set aside each year in priority over any other purpose or purposes and as a municipal auto camp improvement bond redemption fund, a sum sufficient to meet the payments of principal and interest on said bonds as they become due.

Furthermore, NOTICE IS GIVEN, that W. H. Gowdy, Mrs. Hal McNair and Mrs. Lula Howard are appointed as judges for the FIRST WARD and W. F. Loomis, J. M. Beaver and G. W. Trefren as judges for the SECOND WARD; that the City Hall will be the voting place for the First Ward, and the City Fire Station on Fourth Street as the voting place for the Second Ward. The polls will be open from eight o'clock in the forenoon until eight o'clock in the afternoon and all persons who are qualified electors under the Laws of the State of Oregon and who, immediately preceding said election, shall have resided thirty days in the City and ten days in the ward, shall be entitled to vote in their respective wards at such election.
