VETERAN SAYS TRUTH IS STRANGER THAN FICTION

To the Tidings:

Truth is stronger than fiction. In 1864 when I was captain of cavalry, I was stationed at Vienna, Madison Co., Ala. I had by company all summer and part of the time another. Our duty was to patrol a territory between the M & C. R. R. and the Tenn. River, about 30 miles and between Flint and Paint Rock river, about 25 miles, or about 750 sq. miles. There was about 100 Puritan rangers in that district commanded by Parson Johnson. We generally found them when we heard the whistle of buckshot. Mary Reed was born Jan 3, 1863 near Vienna, W. E. Palmer, of Co. H 133 Illinois, was born in Delaware, April 1, 1863, Martha E. Parker was born in Knox Co., Tenn. A Dahuff was born in Ohio 8-4-1841, served on Co. 1 9th Ind. Infantry and Co. H 12th Ind. cavalry. Comrade Palmer and Mary Reed were married in 1907; Amos Dahuff and M. E. Parker were married June 26, 1889. At the soldiers and sailors reunion here last September the four of us met in the park. 59 years after these war events narrated. The four of us live here. AMOS DAHUFF, Ashland, Ore., 440 Palm Ave.
