Historical Review of The First School in Rogue River Valley

(Continued from page 1)

between the logs were chinked with pine blocks left from the splitting of the shakes with which it was covered. One or two windows on either side were made by cutting out a segment of the logs and covering the opening with muslin cloth (flour sacks).

The school furniture consisted of two long tables placed lengthwise of the room with benches on either side for seats; these benches were made of slabs with holes bored through them and round legs of oak inserted from under or round side of the slabs. Several smaller benches were made for the smaller scholars. The teachers desk and seat may have been on rough lumber as a sawmill built by Grainville Naylor during the previous winter, was sawing some lumber up the creek, where Lynch's mill formerly stood.

The door was built of lumber, I think though it was hung on wooden hinges and was operated with a leather latch string. Water was brought from a spring just under the hill near the creek.

The school house faced the public road to the West, where now is the Pacific Highway. There was neither fireplace nor stove, as it was strictly a summer school; the ventilation was excellent and sanitary in a marked degree.

The oak thickets on either side supplied toilet facilities, and a good sized club or board pounded on the door, summoned to books. A daughter of a pioneer family residing near Jacksonville, Mary Hoffman by name, was employed to teach the first term of three months. He salary I do not remember, but there was a fee of ten dollars collected for every pupil, and there was some twenty-nine of these, by far the larger number of whom were nearly or quite as old as the teacher.

As there was no book store in the valley, the scholars had to depend upon such books as were brought across the plains with them, and they were of all the varieties in use in the several states, scarcely any two families having the same series, but by using tact and lending one to another, our teacher managed to get along surprisingly well.

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GREAT CHURCH CRUSADE WILL BE BROADCAST

Cathedral Sheltering Tomb of Woodrow Wilson to Be Religious Center.

REVIVE CHRISTIANITY

Founders Say Faith Falters at Crisis; Foremost Clergy to Aid in Movement.

WASHINGTON, March 7.—A great crusade for the revival of Christianity, it was announced here today, will go overland and into the air from the tomb of Woodrow Wilson in the National Cathedral.

A widespread preaching movement, having as its nucleus a college of preachers at the cathedral, will be directed by the National Cathedral Foundation.

Radio audiences of more than 250,000 will be reached by sermons in the Bethlehem Chapel of the edifice.

The founders of the college, who contend that Christianity is caught in one of the decisive crises in its centuries of struggle, said some of the nation's foremost preachers, clerical and lay, were joining the movement.

To Reach Masses

Not alone will pulpits be used. The college, whose first sessions are to begin this summer, will utilize auditoriums, baseball grounds, university stadiums and amphitheatres.

It is the feeling of the movement's sponsors that the appeal must be to masses to compete with the great national interest in athletics and amusements.

An important adjunct to the National Cathedral's College will be a huge religious library.

A fund of \$10,000,000 to further the preaching mission is to be solicited. George Wharton Pepper, Senator from Pennsylvania, is chairman of the campaign, and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon is treasurer.

This explanation of the college and its purposes was given by the founders of the movement:

Noted Men to Aid.

"As a first step, men of great reputation, who have won renown in Europe and America for their scholarship and ability in preaching and teaching, will be secured from time to time. Each Sunday

afternoon Bishop Freeman or one of these noted visitors will reach at the Cathedral, either in the Bethlehem Chapel or out of doors. The service and the sermon will be broadcast.

"In addition, these men will be sent to various industrial and educational centers, to carry to masses of Americans, outside rather than inside the Church, the fundamental principles of Christianity.

"Meanwhile there will be increased activity at the Cathedral center on Mount St. Alban. It will be made a source of help and inspiration, a real spiritual home, for the clergy and for all who may resort to it. Special services, lectures, instructions, discussions, classes will be provided to meet the needs of different groups. As the great edifice progresses toward completion, so will the spiritual organization strive to keep pace with it.

To Make Haste

"As rapidly as possible the permanent organization of the 'College of Preachers' will be perfected. This means a group of resident students, young men, recently ordained, marked by mental gifts and preaching power. They will be under competent direction and leadership. As a result of this training of the best material the Cathedral will have its own staff of preachers available for the service of the church. The Cathedral library will be completely equipped with necessary books, covering all fields of Christian learning and activity, as it is possible to make it. Students will be welcomed, as there is room, who desire some special training, or to procure some special line of research.

"Convinced that the permanent security and prosperity of this country rests upon a revival of Christian faith and morals; con-

vinced that the spoken Word is the power which alone, as history proves, can reach effectively the men and women outside the church, and in the hope that Washington Cathedral may serve

as a power-house for the spiritual life of the church and the nation, this foundation seeks to perform this service for Christianity in America through its 'College of Preachers.'
