The remaining buffer counties will be Marin, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Mateo, Santa Clara, and Sonoma. Alameda, Solano, Contra Costa and Napa are the counties under complete quarantine. Lake and Madera Counties were released from provisional quarantine a few days after the outbreak of the disease about two weeks ago.

The effect of the lifting of quarantine is to restore complete freedom in the movement of livestock within the counties involved.

Hecke believes that the epidemic danger as far as further spread is concerned has been practically wiped out, but the problem remains of raising a fund to indemnify livestock owners whose cattle have been sacrificed to prevent a spread of the disease.

ENGLISH INDUSTRY RAPS KRUPP AWARD

London Stirred When German Firm Gets Contract for South African Steel.

LONDON, Mar. 13.—Something of a sensation in the British steel trade has been caused by the awarding of a contract to Krupp by the South African Government. The contract amounts to 1,300 tons of steel materials.

The High Commissioner for South Africa, in London, said that tenders were invited from British and foreign firms, and Krupp made the lowest bids and therefore received the orders.

"British firms should have received this order," commented Sir Robert Hadfield, chairman of the Sheffield firm, Hadfields, Ltd.
