TIME FOR DAUGHERTY TO GO

With all fairness and with all due respect to those who have been selected to fill positions of honor and trust in our governmental affairs, it is time for the nation and the Coolidge administration to be relieved of Attorney General Daugherty. It is a notorious fact that Daugherty was the most unpopular of former President Harding's appointees. The selection of Daugherty as head of the department of justice was severely criticised. Criticism was not limited to opposing political parties but came freely from those aligned with the Harding administration.

Charges of incompetency against the attorney general have never dwindled. They have been continuous since 1921. The persistency with which these charges have appeared has made Daugherty a handicap in administering justice and made him a load to his administration. Even though his character may be unimpeachable and above reproach, and his ability unquestioned, the fire of criticism directed at him and the pall of suspicion that has hovered over him have destroyed his usefulness.

That he is a millstone around the neck of the administration none will deny and that President Coolidge permits him to continue is creating widespread comment. The most enthusiastic and consistent admirers of the president are wondering why he fails to give Daugherty orders to vacate the office. President Coolidge succeeded to the presidency at an hour when America was submerged in gloom. He began his duties with the good wishes of men and women of all parties. All wished him well, and although we are entering a presidential campaign when partisanship asserts itself to a marked degree, the feeling towards the chief executive is the best, and it seems all the more exasperating to his friends that he will continue a policy that is jeopardizing his popularity and his availability as the republican candidate for reelection.

Testimony before the committee investigating the department of justice reveals that the Dempsey-Carpentier fight films were shipped into a score of states and exhibited in violation of federal laws and that some of the members of the rotten conspiracy reaped huge financial rewards. Whether Daugherty ever received any of the bribe money or not can be disregarded in its entirety and still the fact remains that he has been culpably negligent in his duties. This is a rather charitable view of Daugherty's part with respect to the fight film scandal, and there are many who are inclined to believe that somewhere in the many underhand transactions that have been going on for the past three years, the attorney general figured directly. There will be no cessation of criticism until the administration and the government are rid of him for all time. The longer he retains his position the more difficult it will be to obtain justice in the various fraud and bribery cases, and the more difficult it will be for President Coolidge to command the republican nomination to succeed himself.

THE AROUND THE WORLD FLIGHT

Cheered by thousands, among whom were friends and dear ones, three daring American aviators sailed from Santa Monica yesterday morning and will be followed by the fourth member today. The quartet is risking health, life, everything, to bring to America the honor of being the first nation of the world to circle the globe by air, and to win for themselves the distinction of being the first to circumnavigate the universe. As one reads of the extensive preparations, the auspicious start, and contemplates the distance and the dangers that beset the brave men it brings a realization that romance and adventure well from the human hearts of today as in centuries past. Men still continue to risk their lives in romance and in adventure. That the attempted flight around the world is fraught with many dangers none can deny. The lives of not a few brave pilots of the air have been sacrificed in continental flights. The path leads over the frozen floes and fields of the north. It follows across the dangerous Pacific, which is considered the difficult and most dangerous leg of the long journey. But irrespective of danger or fate, the quartet is sailing on its way, each member possessed of a determination to win and bring honor to himself and to his native country.

The adventuresome spirit and the undaunted bravery of the pilots and their assistants are worthy of hearty commendation. They reveal that the world, though often accused of deteriorating and backsliding morally, mentally and physically, is still the footstool of men who know not the meaning of danger, or if they do are willing to

face it for their country's honor.

The best wishes and prayers of a hundred million Americans go with the pilots. May they bring success to themselves and to America.

SPOTLESS TOWNS

At Corvallis there is to be a city-wide "clean-up week." Nine civic organizations of the city are backing the plan.

Prizes will be given as follows: Sorority and fraternity having the best kept grounds; sorority showing most improvement at the end of the week's campaign; city resident whose premises show most improvement during "clean-up week;" school district with best campaign record and school district with best appearance. The city will be divided into blocks with a captain directing the clean-up in each block.

Lewiston, Idaho, aims at a reputation as "Lewiston the Spotless." Pullman, Washington, has an organization composed of business men, mothers and Boy Scouts. They intend to make the town "spotless" in all the conventional meaning of the word. But they intend to go farther. They want the buildings and lots along every main thoroughfare leading into the city to be improved. They intend to make war on unpainted, tumble-down shacks. They want no more lots littered with tin cans. The women of Eugene have organized to beautify their city by planting trees along all thoroughfares and so arranging them as to present a symmetrical and well ordered effect. Naturally, in their scheme of things a thoroughly clean city will be included.

Nearly every city understands the desirability of an attractive approach by the way of the railroad station. Portland woke to the discredit of a Union depot fronted by shacks, and made, with railroad cooperation, an improvement which is a lasting credit to the city.

Few cities, however, understand that with the remarkable change in conditions brought about by the automobile, every main traveled thoroughfare has become as important a point of ingress or egress as a railroad depot. Unsightly approaches mar the reputation of many towns.

The town that makes "Main street" attractive has done half a job. When the city is so renovated that its citizens are proud of it, transients will speak of it with praise and pleasure.—Oregon Daily Journal.

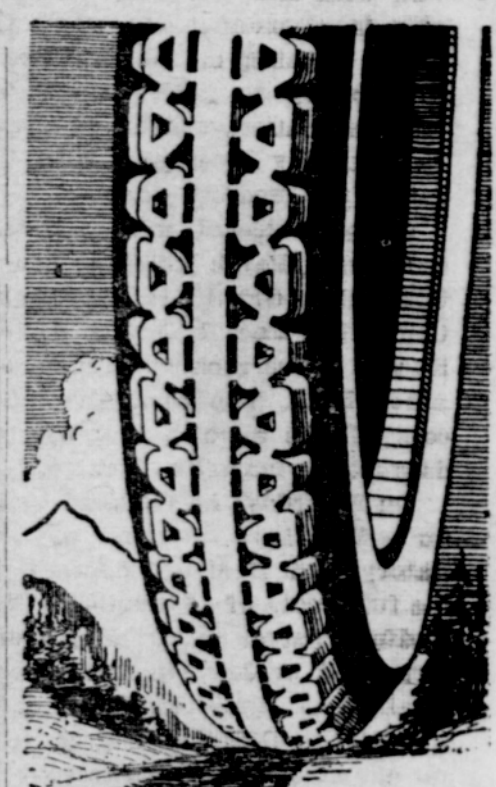
